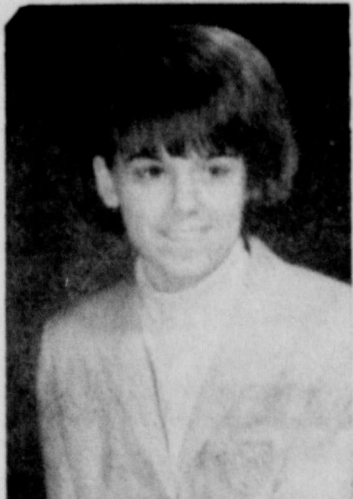
The students visited the local newspaper plant after a project study had been made and following individual letters seeking permission for their planned visit.

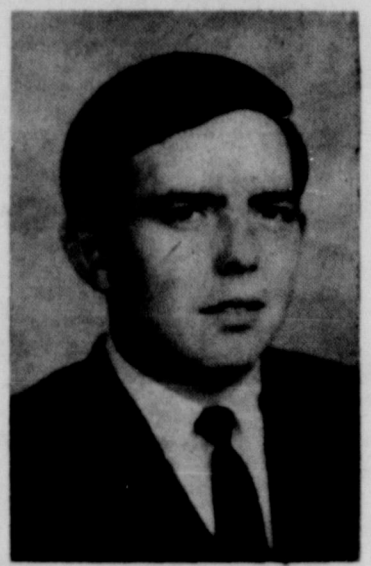
### SALUTATORIAN

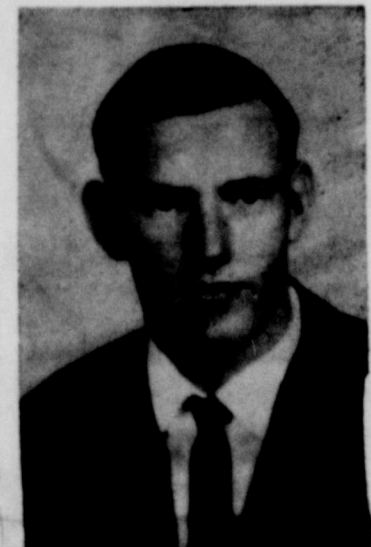
LEWIS McPHERSON

K C Teacher To Do Advanced Study

Mrs. Kenneth Halbert, one of the third grade teachers in Knox City Elementary Schools, has been notified that she is the recipient of a scholarship for six weeks' advanced study at Austin College in Sherman this summer.

Mrs. Halbert was one of 27 participants selected from rural and semi-rural elementary schools in the states of Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas, from kindergarten through grade 6.

It will be the NDEA General Institute for Elementary Teachers of Disadvantaged Youth (Title XI). The program emphasizes increasing teacher's understanding of the disadvantaged child and of his own function as a change agent, and increasing his ability to utilize various methods and materials for more effective teaching of the disadvantaged child.

Special emphasis is placed on assisting the teacher to plan means of implementing change in his own classroom and community. The program embodies general lectures, discussion groups, films, field trips, demonstration by master teachers, supervised practicum, group counseling, laboratories devoted to preparing instructional materials for the participants use, and individual conferences.

The Institute will run from June 5 to July 15.

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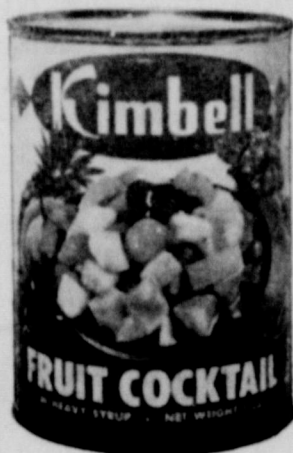

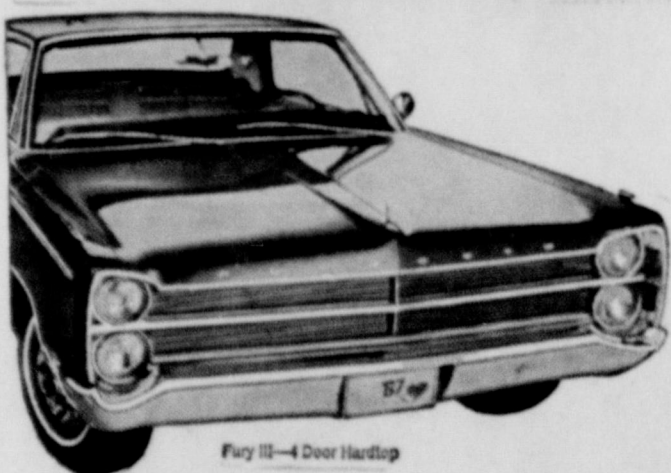

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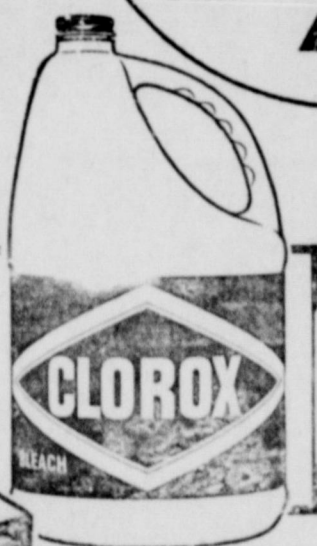

## USDA Officials To Hold Shirtsleeve Conf.

Ralph T. Price, chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, today announced three farm policy meetings to be held this month.

The meeting for this area will be held on May 24 from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. at the Lamesa High School Auditorium, 14th & Ave. F, Lamesa. These meetings are being scheduled as requested by the Secretary of Agriculture in order to learn the current thinking of county, area and state leaders of farm organizations and of individual farmers. Agency officials are to report to the Secretary the comments and recommendations of those in attendance.

Secretary Freeman recently held three such "shirtsleeves" meetings with farmers in major Midwest States. He returned to Washington convinced that such face-to-face talks are worthwhile in reaching important policy and program decisions.

"Along with the statistics I get from our economists," he has said, "I constantly need the personalized and highly specific information that comes out of people's experience. I also need the best ideas I can get from farmers and their leaders as to how to improve our programs and improve farm prices and income."

As a climax to their studies in geography on their community and services sold or rendered, the group toured the Citizens State Bank, the City Hall, the Fire Dept., the City Jail, the Knox County Herald, the M-System Food Store and the U. S. Post Office.

There were 46 pupils making the tour.

The teachers expressed their appreciation to everyone who assisted in explanations during the field trip. They said that the students enjoyed it very much and that it was quite an educational tour for all of them.

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
