Knox City is fortunate to have these excellent facilities available to our residents, as well as those from near-by communities. The home is within two blocks of both The Knox County Hospital and Dr. R.G. Howell Associates where Dr. Howell and Dr. Ted Alexander Jr. are on call.

Local Man's Mother Dies

Mrs. Rado Taylor, 80, longtime Woodson resident and mother of Glenn Taylor of Knox City, died Wednesday at the Brazos Valley Care Home where she had been a patient since January 16.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Thursday in Satterwhite Chapel of Grace, with burial in the Woodson Cemetery.

Born Rado Wright on January 13, 1895, in Hot Springs, Arkansas, she married Anderson F. Taylor at Lusk on September 15, 1915. They had farmed in the Woodson area since. Her husband died in 1974. Mrs. Taylor was a member of the Jehovah's Witnesses.

Survivors in addition to Glenn, include a sister, Mrs. Ethel Luke of Woodson; a brother, William Wright of Graham; and three grandchildren.

Celebration To Be Sunday

W.C. Glenn Day Is Proclaimed

Thursday, February 6, 1975, has been proclaimed Will C. Glenn Day by Benjamin Mayor Vernon D. (Butch) McCannies on the occasion of his 97th birthday.

However, a special celebration in his honor will not be held until Sunday, February 9, in order that relatives living out-of-town may be present for Mr. Glenn's birthday party in Benjamin Community Center from 2:00 until 4:00 p.m. The party will be hosted by the women of Benjamin Methodist Church of which he is a member.

Mr. Glenn, Justice of the Peace of Precinct 1, has served more than 10 years in this office and was re-elected to a four-year term last election. In his political career, Mr. Glenn was elected in 1916 as Knox County Tax Assessor-Collector and served 10 years, later serving four years as a county commissioner.

Born seven miles west of Lawrence, South Carolina, he was the youngest member of the family of three girls and three boys. His father died when he was one year old, and he lost his mother when he was 11.

After staying with an older sister for a year, Mr. Glenn started out on his own and on occasions when he would be "dead broke" would stay awhile with an aunt. He tried his hand as a jockey for scrub racers for a short time and finally came to Texas in his early teens. He first stopped in the Blacklands in Lamar County east of Paris and got a job with a farm family.

He suffered a severe bout of typhoid and almost died after 40 days in bed. After overcoming this illness, he moved west to Young County for a short stay and hired out to help bring 140 wild horses to Knox County north of Goree.

It was here that he met and married Florence Benedict in 1902. They moved to the Antelope Flat community, near Truscott, in 1907 and

lived there until 1912, when they moved to Knox City.

In the latter part of 1916, the Glenn family moved to Benjamin, where at one time Mr. Glenn owned and operated the Gulf Service Station.

Mrs. Glenn died in March, 1949, and a son, Wallace, died in 1959. Another son, Jack, died in the early 1940's. He has a son, Dial, who lives in Amarillo and a daughter, Mrs. Willie Mary Denman of Dumas. Mrs. Denman retired this year after teaching for 31 years.

He also has three grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Mr. Glenn explained that the good Lord must have taken care of him all of these years, as he almost died twice, once with typhoid fever and again in 1918 during the flu epidemic.

Mr. Glenn lives alone. He is very active in spite of his years, driving his car and conducting the duties of his office.

Friends and neighbors will want to remember him on "his day" and congratulate him Sunday on his many achievements.

May we add "Well done, Mr. Glenn!"

Hounds Win District 7-A Championship

Tuesday night's victory over Haskell wrapped up the District 7-A crown for Coach Jerry Lowrey's Knox City Greyhounds. With only one district game left, the Hounds are now 9-0 in district and 22-1 for the season. They will host Paducah Friday night, ending district play. The Hounds soundly defeated Haskell, 86-32. Don Swearinger netted 18 points for KC while Johnny Larned had seven for Haskell.

In last Friday night's action the Hounds came from behind to defeat Crowell 59-54.

The Hounds took an early 15-6 lead at the end of the first quarter, but saw it melt away in the second quarter to a 29-29 score at halftime.

In the third quarter Crowell managed to take a two point lead 43-41.

The Wildcats had a six-point lead with the final quarter drawing to an end. With 59 seconds left in the game, the Hounds pressured the Wildcats and scored eleven points for the victory.

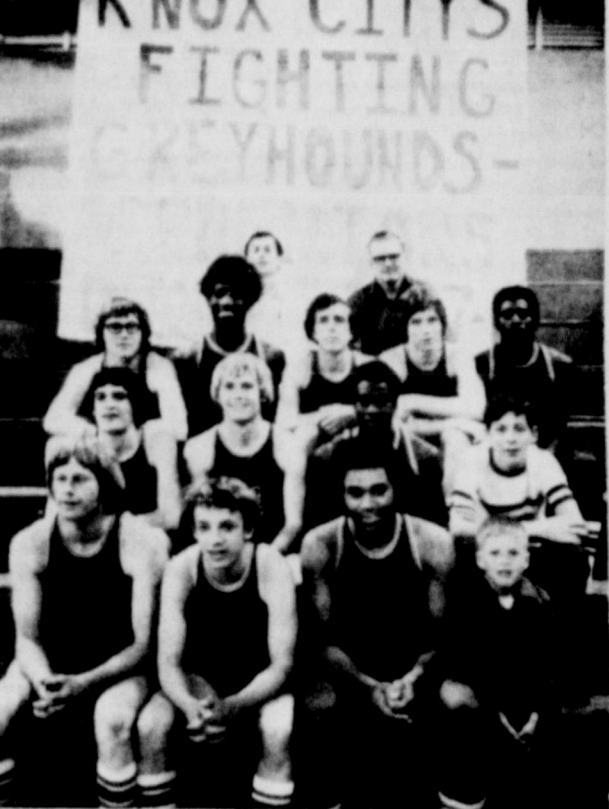
Jimmy Don Moore scored 23 points to lead the scoring for Knox City.

NOW IS THE TIME TO GET SS CARD

"If you do not have a social security number and anticipate needing one in the near future, now is the time to apply for it," according to Carl R. Beisner, Claims Representative, from the Vernon Social Security office.

"This holds true for the individual who has lost his social security card as well as an applicant for an original number. It usually takes six to eight weeks for the issuance of an original." A recent change in the law requires all United States citizens age 18 or over who are applying for a social security number for the first time to furnish proof of age, identity, and citizenship. All foreign-born applicants, regardless of age, must produce proof of age, identity, and citizenship or alien status.

When an individual is assigned a social security number, the primary purpose is to control the recording of all earnings he has in covered employment. Later, it is used to control monthly benefits payable on his record and for processing claims. The recent trend of using the social security number as a standard personal identification number necessitated changes to safeguard his record.

Further information and applications for numbers may be obtained by contacting your nearest social security office. In Vernon, the office is located at 1701 Cumberland.

Farabee Cautions Against Excessive Spending

AUSTIN -- 30th District Senator Ray Farabee has expressed his concern over excessive legislative spending. Farabee, who is a member of the Senate Finance Committee, said he feels there needs to be careful consideration of any spending and further indicated his support of Lt. Governor Hobby's plan to create a reserve fund for state government. Senator Farabee emphasized that "...the creation of such a fund is good business sense, and that's the kind of thinking needed to keep this state out of financial trouble."

Senator Farabee also lauded Governor Briscoe's proposal to reduce state employees by 5%. Explaining that such reductions would be accomplished through attrition and not firings, Farabee said, "I believe state employees would benefit from such a

policy since the state would have more money to bring about future pay raises instead of increasing payrolls beyond what is needed for efficient state government." The turnover rate among state employees is approximately 24% annually.

One of the major problems facing West and North Texas is a lack of water. Commenting on the problem Farabee said, "I agree with the Governor that the water problem has to be dealt with before it becomes a situation similar in proportion to the energy crisis."

Many important issues are to be considered this session and Senator Farabee noted that a new information service is available for citizens of Knox County and the entire state. Information on the status of legislation can be obtained by simply calling 1-800-292-9693 toll free.

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Employment Commission Seeks Occupational Data

In a time when government and private sources spend billions of dollars for educational and occupational training, the Texas Employment Commission has launched a data-gathering effort which will have practical application.

TEC, with the assistance of employers, is gathering data which will permit accurate projections of the future worker-skill requirements of Texas industries, and permit a study of the occupational composition of industries in this state.

Called the Occupational Employment Statistics program, it has the sanction of the Governor's Office, the Texas Education Agency and all concerned groups involved in the development and expansion of human resources. "This project," says TEC Chairman and Executive Director Harold K. Dudley, "will assist both public and private educational and training programs, including vocational training, to become responsive to the manpower needs of industry."

The Commission, cooperating with the U.S. Department of Labor, is asking a sample of Texas employers for statistical information about their work force. The information, to be held confidential, will yield valuable data which decision makers can use to assure the proper design and funding of training programs.

TEC's Manpower Data Analysis and Research Department, directed by Horace N. Goodson, is conducting the data-gathering effort.

Employers selected at random within each industry size group are mailed a questionnaire asking for the number of employees and apprentices in each occupation within their particular industry.

This is the first time the Texas Employment Commission has gathered occupational employment data on a statewide basis. Success of the effort depends on good response rates from sample employers. The employer may or may not be queried at three-year intervals.

The OES program is designed to:

--Provide accurate profiles of occupational resources by industry, and trends in the number of workers employed by occupation.

--Identify the areas where people with various skills are located.

--Help determine future

worker requirements by industry and occupation.

--Identify emerging and disappearing occupations.

The data thus gathered will be essential in planning and developing educational training programs which will more closely provide persons with the skills that are needed by Texas employers.

Long range occupational demand projections may also be made from this data.

Skill levels by industry will be available so that a firm may compare its own occupational profile with that of the industry of which it is a part. No individual firm data will be available.

The OES program will collect data on different industrial segments of the Texas labor force over a three-year cycle. Some 5,500 questionnaires were mailed for the first sample.

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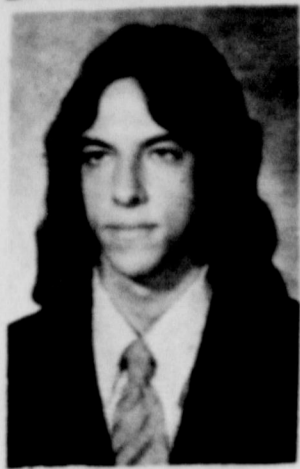

G.E.D. Tests Set Feb. 13

General Education Development Tests will be given in Rule High School Thursday February 13 at 8:00 a.m. Five tests will be given in English, Literature, Social Studies, Science, and Mathematics. If a person passes these five tests, the Texas Education Agency will issue a High School Equivalency Diploma. This diploma meets the educational requirements for employment as well as partial requirement for college entrance or job training schools.

A fee of \$15 is charged for all five tests and it takes about two hours for each test. A person must be eighteen (or at least 17 years old) and have been out of school one full calendar year. If a person is seventeen when the tests are taken, the diploma will not be issued until the person is eighteen.

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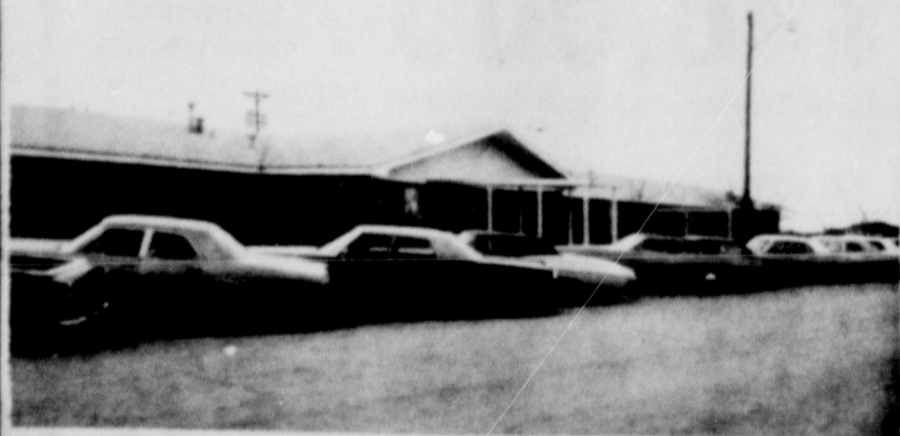

About Your Social Security

Persons who receive both Veterans Administration (VA) Benefits and the gold-colored Supplementary Security Income (SSI) checks should notify the Social Security Administration of the amount of the raise they receive in their February VA check, according to Carl Beisner, claims representative of the Vernon Social Security Office.

The amount of SSI a person receives can be affected by changes in amounts of other benefits, such as VA. If a person getting SSI receives a VA increase and fails to report it to Social Security, they may become overpaid and have to refund later.

Mr. Beisner advises persons who receive pensions from both VA and SSI to get in touch with Social Security Administration before the end of February.

SS Announces Medicare Enrollment Jan.--March

Medicare offers a general enrollment period January 1, 1975 through March 31, 1975, for Part B (Supplementary Medical Insurance) to those eligible for Medicare not already having this coverage, announced Carl R. Beisner, Claims Representative, from the Vernon Social Security office.

"Although everyone has a seven-month initial enrollment period, beginning three months before his 65th birthday or 25th month of entitlement to social security disability benefits, not everyone avails himself of that opportunity to enroll for Part B of Medicare," Mr. Beisner continued.

"Eligible people not already enrolled can do so during a general enrollment period," he added.

General enrollment periods occur during the first three months of each year. Those enrolling at that time are covered by the insurance beginning the following July.

Part B of Medicare covers physicians' services and the use of durable medical equip-

ment primarily. Each enrollee pays an insurance premium of \$6.70 monthly plus a 10% penalty for each 12 months' delay in enrollment. Enrollment under Part A (Hospital Insurance) is not limited to enrollment periods once a person becomes eligible.

Mr. Beisner suggested that anyone interested in Part B who is over 65 or has been receiving social security disability benefits for more than two years call his nearest social security office.
