AAA Program Highly Recommended in Report to Marvin Jones

N. E. Dodd, chief of the Agricultural Adjustment Agency, transmitting the agency's report to Marvin Jones, war food administrator, today praised the farmer-elected committee-man organization of AAA as "the spearhead for agriculture's remarkable wartime accomplishments."

Dodd said that the committeeman organization provides "the framework that enables six million individual farmers in thousands of farm communities to work together as a team" to solve many of agriculture's problems both in peace and war.

"Without question, the post-war period will bring problems and a need for world-shaking adjustments of a different kind," the chief said. "Whatever comes, farmers know that when individual action is not enough, the farmer committees have proved themselves an effective framework for action."
