

## Water Problems To Be Discussed At Meeting Tonite

A meeting to discuss the area's water problem—including the pollution of the fresh water supply by salt water—will be held at the American Legion Hall tonight (Thursday) at 8:00 o'clock, with representatives from several area towns present.

According to Rip Collins, Board of Commerce secretary, the meeting is in preparation for the Railroad Commission hearing in Abilene June 7, when the commission will investigate reports of improper disposal of salt water from a few oil wells in the area.

According to Collins, representatives will be present at the meeting tonight from Seymour, Benjamin, Munday, Goree, Aspermont, Haskell, O'Brien, Rule, Rochester and Weinert. Everyone who is interested is invited to attend.

"Nothing is of more vital importance than our water supply," Collins said, "and the whole future of the area depends on working out a solution to the problem confronting us. We hope a good representation is at the meeting tonight, as well as at the meeting in Abilene."

## City Officer Warns Traffic Violators

City Marshal Alvin Roberts said this week that the worst traffic problems he has encountered since assuming his duties are speeding, bad parking and loud mufflers.

"Many drivers enter the 30-mile zone at 50 or 60 miles an hour, or more, and don't begin slowing down until they approach a red light," Roberts said. "This is dangerous, and it's something city officials want me to stop."

He said loud mufflers or bad mufflers are illegal, and "must come off." He also asked that drivers observe the red "no parking" zones, and that they park between the lines at the curb. "These lines were painted to allow more cars to park," he said, "and they benefit our merchants as well as drivers."

Drilling rig was to be moved in today for the test, scheduled for 5,900 feet. Location is 300 feet from south and east lines of section 3, J. Mitchell survey.

In King county, Skelly Oil Co. will drill a 6,300 foot Ellsburger wildcat two miles north of the Katz Strawn pool. It is site No. 1 M. L. Hendrix (Mrs. J. B. Hendrix) 660 feet from northeast and 1980 feet from northwest lines of section 82, block 13, H&TC survey.

## West O'Brien Oil Test

Possibility that the O'Brien West Strawn Pool may develop into a major oil field was indicated this week by tests on the Clark & Cowden and Others Pool No. 1, a mile west of O'Brien.

Operator was preparing this morning to drill in, after setting 7 inch casing at 4910 feet. Top of the pay was encountered at 4909 feet, with the pay extending to 4934, where the hole was bottomed.

On a drillstem test at 4910-34 feet, with tool open 18 minutes, gas was to the surface in 5 minutes and oil flowed in 13 minutes. Recovery was 1620 feet of pipeline oil, 270 feet of muddy oil with a salty taste, and 15 feet of salt water. Bottom hole pressure was 1830 pounds, flow pressure 1380 pounds and hydrostatic pressure 2445.

Results of the drillstem test indicate, operators say, that the well may be one of the best in Haskell county. It is the southern-most well in the O'Brien West field, and is 1/2 mile east and 1/4 mile south of the discovery well, the Clark & Cowden Turner No. 1. It is on a Turner, Thomas and Harrow unit lease.

Standard Oil Co. is drilling its No. 1 Turner in the field. With the two wells drilling, there are eight wells in the field.

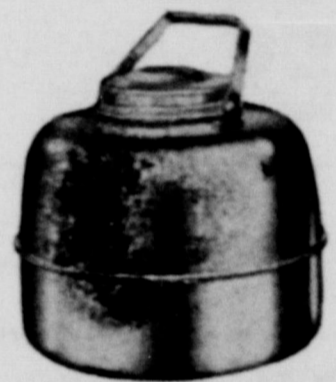

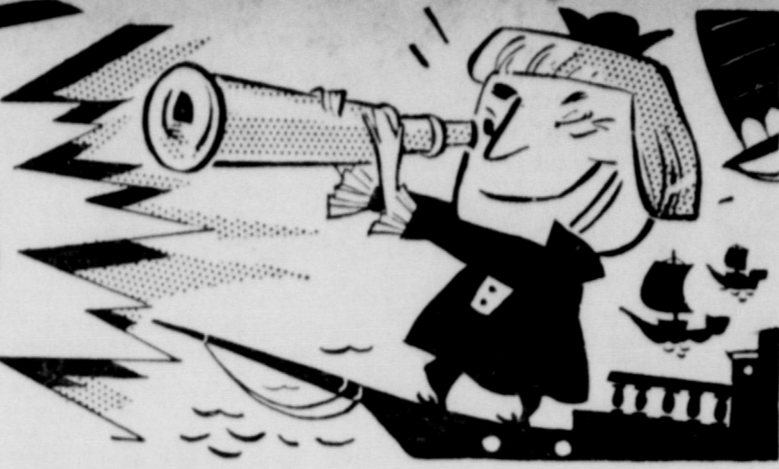
