To Control Boll Weevils

Producers Asked To Sign Up For Program

A drive to enlist all possible support for the Knox County Boll Weevil Association's Diapause Control Program is now underway, as will be evidenced by the letters mailed out this week to producers from the association and by the publicity campaigns in this week's Knox County News and the Munday Courier.

An office was opened Monday of this week in the back of the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation Service building on the eastern edge of the city limits. Mrs. Mary Burkenfeld of Rhineland has been employed by the association to assist producers in the sign-up operation.

The Knox County Boll Weevil Association had its beginning last fall. Annual dues were set at \$5.00 per member and officers were elected at a board of directors' meeting at Rhineland November 21, 1972. Vernal Zeissel was chosen president; Gaylon Hord, vice president; and Maynard Moore, secretary-treasurer. The executive committee, appointed by the new president, includes Charles Griffith of Benjamin, Claudell Bratcher of Vera, Emil Navratil of Gilliland and Sam E. Clonts of Knox City.

Other members of the Board of Directors are L.D. Welch and L.M. Bell, Gilliland-Truscott; Clyde Beck, Vera; Herbert Bellinghausen, Charles Reese, and John Crowover, Knox City; Bernard Brown and C.H. Herring, Rhineland; Lee Patterson and Loyd Robertson, Goree; Floyd Reed, G.W. Hawkins, Shelton Phillips and Levi Bowden, Munday.

A minimum of 20,000 acres of cotton is expected to be sprayed this fall as Knox County cotton producers now have the opportunity to help themselves with matching funds available from the Texas Department of Agriculture. The diapause control program will enable farmers to increase cotton production by killing boll weevils before they leave the cotton fields in the fall, thus preventing over-wintering.

The program calls for three aerial applications, starting about mid-September on five to seven day intervals. The cost to the farmer for the three applications will be \$2.70 per acre of cotton sprayed and the Texas Department of Agriculture will provide the matching funds to complete the contract spraying applications.

The important factor is that the Texas Department of Agriculture requires that the Knox County Association has

the funds on hand before it can qualify for the matching funds.

Farmers need to go by the office now and leave a check made out to the Knox County Boll Weevil Association, dated September 1, 1973, and the check will not be cashed before this date.

July 20, 1973, will be the last day to sign up for the control program, so officials are asking that when farmers go by the ASCS office to certify their cotton acreage, they will go to the back of the building and sign up for the diapause control program.

This program is of vital importance to producers, landlords, businessmen, and to everyone for the overall

economy of Knox County. Membership in the organization is open to all who lend your support to this program that has proved successful in other counties and send your \$5.00 dues to the Knox County Boll Weevil Association?

Jones County had already organized and the 20,000 acre mark was reached there last week. Test plots in Jones County carried on over the past several years revealed as much as 50-80 pounds cotton lint per acre increase over the untreated plots. The spraying program was carried out in Jones County Monday and Tuesday of last week.

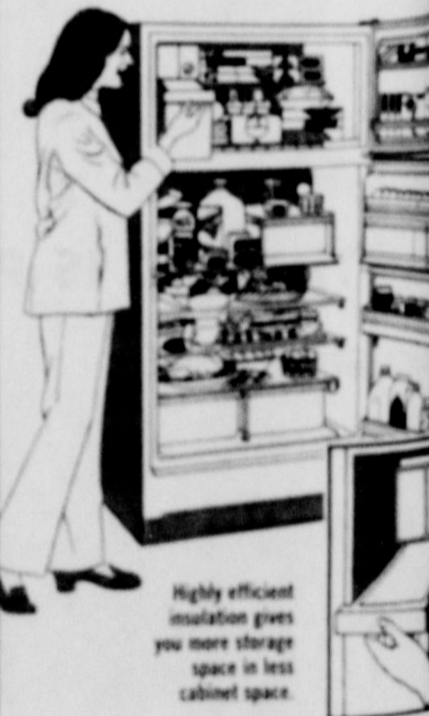

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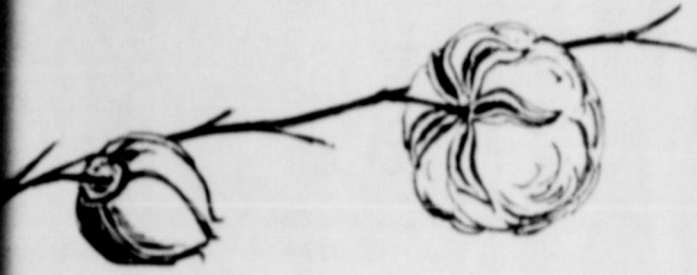
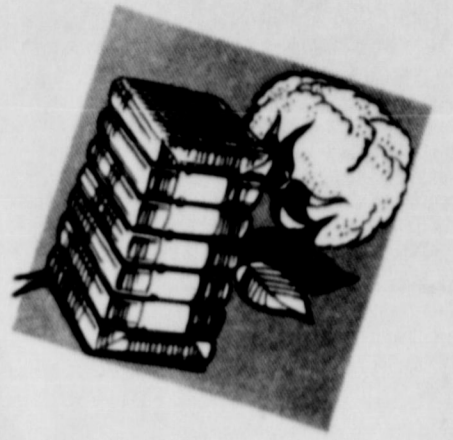

County Cotton Producers have the opportunity to help themselves with matching funds from the Texas Department of Agriculture to increase cotton production by the fall cotton boll weevil diapause program.

On Monday, July 9, 1973, an office opened in the back portion of the Knox County Courthouse in Knox City, with someone to assist you in placing your 1973 cotton acreage report. The diapause control program is to kill boll weevils before they leave the cotton in the fall, keeping them from going to over-wintering cover. The program calls for three applications, starting about mid-September on 5-7 day intervals. The total cost to the cotton producer for 3 applications will be \$2.70 per acre of cotton sprayed and the Texas Department of Agriculture will provide matching funds to complete the contract. If you have 100 acres of cotton your cost will be \$270. The Texas Department of Agriculture requires that we have our funds on hand before we can provide matching funds. You will need to leave a check made out to the Knox County Association, dated September 1, 1973 at the time you sign up to have your funds. This check will not be cashed before this date.

July 9, 1973 will be the last day to sign up for the Cotton Boll Weevil Diapause Control Program. Come on in to the ASCS Office, certify your cotton acreage and go back to sign up for the diapause control program and let's whip-up on that ole cotton boll weevil.

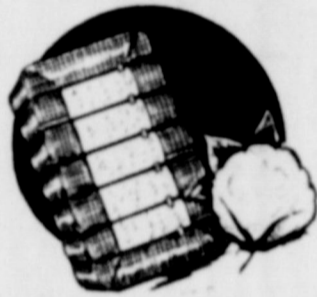
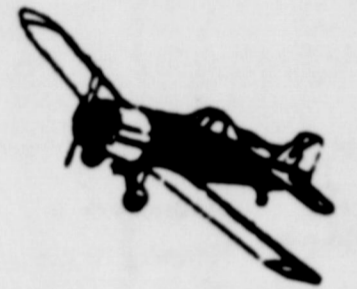

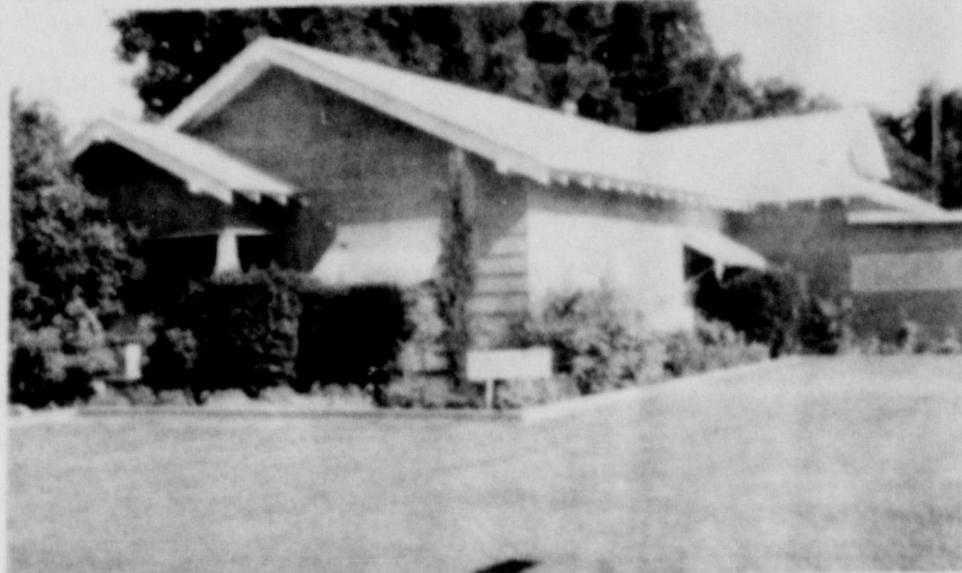

Petroleum Industry In County Plays Significant Role In '72

The petroleum industry in Knox County played a significant role in 1972 in helping to satisfy the unprecedented demand for Texas' crude oil and natural gas.

Knox was one of 190 of Texas' 254 counties which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a record production year for the state's No. 1 industry, according to figures compiled

by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association. The county ranked 137th in the state in the value of petroleum produced, \$3.4 million. The sale of crude oil brought almost all of that total.

But despite this record year, due in large part to nine months of production at 100 per cent of the maximum efficient rate, the nation's largest producer of petroleum could not produce enough to satisfy demand.

"To further stimulate production, we need a restoration of the open market force," said Robert A. Bushman of San Antonio, president of the Association.

"This would produce two much-needed effects: First, it would channel the state's petroleum products to the most efficient and highest priority uses; second, it would help provide part of the capital needed so desperately to build refineries and superports and to carry on expensive exploration and production activities," Bushman added.

This study by the Association also shows that production last year in Knox County resulted in the payment of \$433,000 to royalty owners. The state of Texas received \$160,000 in production taxes from county wells, with

most of that total based on crude oil output.

Oil and gas producers and developers spent \$511,000 drilling 28 wells in the county last year, with \$336,000 of that figure lost in 20 dry holes.

According to the Texas Employment 73 oil and gas industry employees worked in the county in 1972 and shared a payroll of \$480,000.

INVESTMENTS FOR COW CALF BUSINESS DISCUSSED

Major aspects to consider in cow-calf operations are investment costs and annual costs.

Estimates of the costs vary for intensified operations

and the more extensive ones, notes the agent. Intensified operations generally can be found over much of Central Texas and East Texas and the Gulf Coast area, including the Lower Valley. More extensive operations are found in the western area of Texas where several acres of land may be required to carry a cow unit.

The total annual cost with a 7 percent interest charge for land and improvement for an intensified operation is \$140 to \$179.50 per year per cow unit and \$166.50 to \$213.50 for the more extensive operation.

For intensified operations, land and improvement costs at 7 percent interest range from \$35-\$56 for producing a calf to weaning age while other costs will range from \$105 to \$123.50. Land and improvement costs for the more extensive operations range from \$70-\$105 with other costs totaling from \$96.50 to \$108.50.

Producers should estimate total investment costs per cow unit at \$980-\$1,300 for intensified operations and \$1,500-\$2,000 for extensive operations.

For livestock operators both owning and renting land and making new land purchases, the estimated costs will depend on interest and rental payments.

Food Stamp Program To Begin Oct. 1 In County

The first food stamps in Knox County will be issued October 1, according to a release from William E. McKinney, Food Stamp Program Director of the State Department of Public Welfare in Wichita Falls.

But before the statewide food stamps program is implemented here, there is much work to be done, he said.

Commodities is the food assistance program currently operating in this county. The 62nd Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a statewide food stamp program to replace all county food stamp programs and commodity food distributions. By November 1973, the 254 counties in Texas will be operating the statewide program administered by the State Department of Public Welfare.

However, before the first stamps are issued here, extensive preparation must be completed. Current commodity recipients will be notified that food stamps will replace the present food assistance program. Most commodity recipients should be eligible for food stamps also as well as others who might not receive commodity foods.

Certification for food stamp eligibility will begin at a later date. All persons who do not make much money or who are unemployed are encouraged to apply at that time. Welfare recipients are not the only ones who can qualify for food stamps.

Local issuance offices will sell the food stamps to all who are certified eligible to receive them. Participating households will be able to buy their stamps at the issuance office nearest them and at their own convenience. The long waiting lines which are now a problem at
