## Benjamin Voters Approve Independent District

### July 15 Deadline For "New Grower" Wheat Allotments

The State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee has designated July 15, 1955 as the closing date for making application for a 1956 New Farm Wheat Allotment. J. T. Gilpin, manager of the Knox County ASC office, said Wednesday.

A person is not eligible for a new grower wheat allotment if he has any interest, either as landlord or tenant, in any other farm on which there is an old wheat allotment, Gilpin said.

Applications for new grower allotments will be taken in the ASC office in Knox City.

### Truscott Co-op Erects 100,000-Bu. Elevator

The Farmers Co-op Society of Truscott has announced completion of a new all-steel elevator with a capacity of 100,000 bushels. The new building, which is 180 feet long, 40 feet wide and 22 feet high, was completed last Thursday.

The building was erected by an Oklahoma City firm and Ray Oliver of Vernon was contractor. It is located near the old elevator, which has a capacity of only 9,000 bushels.

Lester Hickman is manager of both elevators.

### City Election Votes Officially Canvassed

Votes in the city election held April 5 were canvassed by the city council Tuesday night, and Mayor Guy Glenn says the reins of the city government will be turned over to the newly-elected officials about April 20, depending on completion of the annual city audit.

The official returns changed some figures in the unofficial results announced last week, but did not change the outcome of the election. Barney Arnold was elected mayor with 111 votes. His opponent Buddy Angle, who has been city alderman, received 102 votes.

G. W. Coats was the only alderman re-elected, with 139 votes. Russell Boyd was high man in the alderman race with 153 votes, while E. R. Carpenter received 143, Otis Cash 132 and Z. E. Cone 122. Lossers, all candidates for reelection, were Doyle Graham 121, Fuller Shannon 119 and O. A. Green 102.

### Pete Edge Buys Bell Service Station

Dearl (Pete) Edge announced this week that he has purchased the Bell Service Station across the street from the Harbert Hotel.

Edge farmed in the O'Brien area until last year, when he moved to Plainview. He sold his farm there recently and purchased the Tommy Richardson home north of Knox City.

### Graham to Preside At Convention of Texas Postmasters

Knox City Postmaster Jeff Graham, president of the Texas Chapter of the National Association of Postmasters, will be in Dallas April 17-20 to preside over the annual state convention of the organization.

Ray McNamara of Haverhill, Mass., national president, will be a guest speaker.

There are 1,547 members in the Texas chapter, and more than 600 are expected to attend the convention.

During the past year, Graham has attended 14 district meetings, reaching from Amarillo to Palacios. He has traveled 22,000 miles, including a trip to the national convention of postmasters in Philadelphia and another trip to Washington, D. C., on legislative business.

### Prospective Oiler Being Completed On Howell Ranch

Packer was being run today on the Skelly Oil Co. No. 3 Gertrude L. Howell, prospective producer in southeastern King County, near the Knox County line.

The well was perforated Wednesday night, from 5,098 to 5,106 feet, where a drillstem test in the lower Strawn sand recovered about 85 feet of free oil and 180 feet of oil cut mud. Shut-in pressure after 30 minutes was 1,150 pounds and flowing pressure was 85 pounds.

Another test was made in the Lorentzen sand, from 4866 to 4886 feet. Recovery was 260 feet of oil cut mud.

The test is located 660 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of Section 80. It is about a half mile from production.

### Soil Conservation Offices Moved

The offices of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District are being moved from the school grounds to the offices above the city hall.

Charley Cape, in charge of the office, said the move will be completed by Friday.

The SCS will occupy the front three rooms, which can be reached by a stairway from the fire hall, which is behind the city hall.

Cape said the new location is expected to be much more convenient for farmers having business with the district.

## TRI-COUNTY IRRIGATION MEETING TO BE HELD AT MUNDAY APRIL 20

A meeting of interest to all farmers in the area who are now irrigating cropland or plan to irrigate in the future will be held at the American Legion Hall in Munday Wednesday, April 20, County Agent W. J. Bryan announced Tuesday.

The all-day meeting, for farmers in Knox, Haskell and Baylor counties, will begin at 9:30 a. m.

Bob Thurmond, irrigation specialist from Texas A&M College, will be present to lead the discussion of such subjects as: Water rights of landowners; general layouts for irrigation; establishing and developing wells; when and how much to water different type crops.

"Mr. Thurmond is in my opinion one of the best irrigation men in the Southwest," Bryan said, "and I am sure he will have much information of value to farmers in this area."

There will also be a period for answering questions on the individual problems of farmers present.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Extension Service departments in the three counties. J. A. Scofield, district Extension agent, will be present at the meeting.

### Annual Senior Play To Be Presented Tuesday Night

Knox Citizens were reminded this week that the Senior Class will present the annual class play at the school auditorium Tuesday night, April 19, beginning at 8 o'clock.

Title of the play this year is "Here Come the Brides." Mrs. Otis Cash, class sponsor, says the play is a fast-moving farce full of laughable situations.

The cast includes Paul Burt, Shelby Bishop, Jimmy Leach, Jane Finley, Genie Guinn, Millard Lain, Chestene Watson, Joann Williams, Benny Bales, Annette Johnson and Rob Jensen.

Admission will be 25 cents for children in grade school and 50 cents for high school students and adults.

The Knox County Commissioners Court voted this week to underwrite the costs of Salk Polio Vaccine for all children in the county under 12 years of age, Dr. D. C. Eiland, county health officer, announced this morning.

"We will endeavor to see that every child in the county under 12 has the opportunity to take the vaccine," Dr. Eiland said. "All children in the first and second grades will receive it free, of course. For others it will be given on a private practice basis, by the parents' regular physician.

"If the family is unable to pay for it, it will be charged to them like any other service, and they will be expected to pay for it if and when they are able. Those unable to pay the vaccine may go to their county commissioner and will be given an order to any doctor in the county for the vaccine to be administered. The family will owe the doctor and the county until they are able to pay. The county will pay the doctors nothing.

"Under this plan," he continued, "we hope Knox County can have 100 percent vaccination of all children under 12, regardless of the family's financial status."

Vaccination of first and second grade pupils, with the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis furnishing the vaccine and doctors and nurses in the county donating their services, will proceed immediately when the vaccine is received, Dr. Eiland said. He hopes the vaccine will arrive in time to start the vaccinations some time next week. Shots will be given at the three clinics in the county—one in Knox City and two in Munday, instead of at the schools.

Knox County doctors will wait a consensus of opinion before deciding whether to give two or three injections, and at what intervals.

#### BAPTIST WMS CIRCLE MEETS WITH MRS. C. H. CORNETT

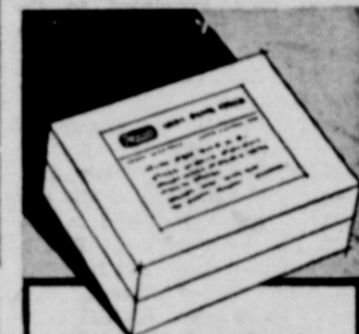
The Ruby Wheat Circle of the Baptist W.M.S. met in the home of Mrs. C. H. Cornett Tuesday morning for the circle program.

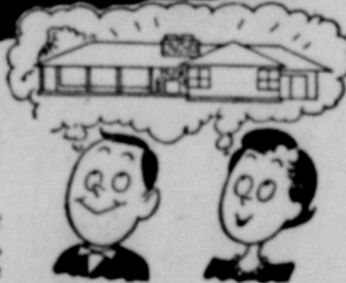
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## DON'T DRINK THE FIRST ONE

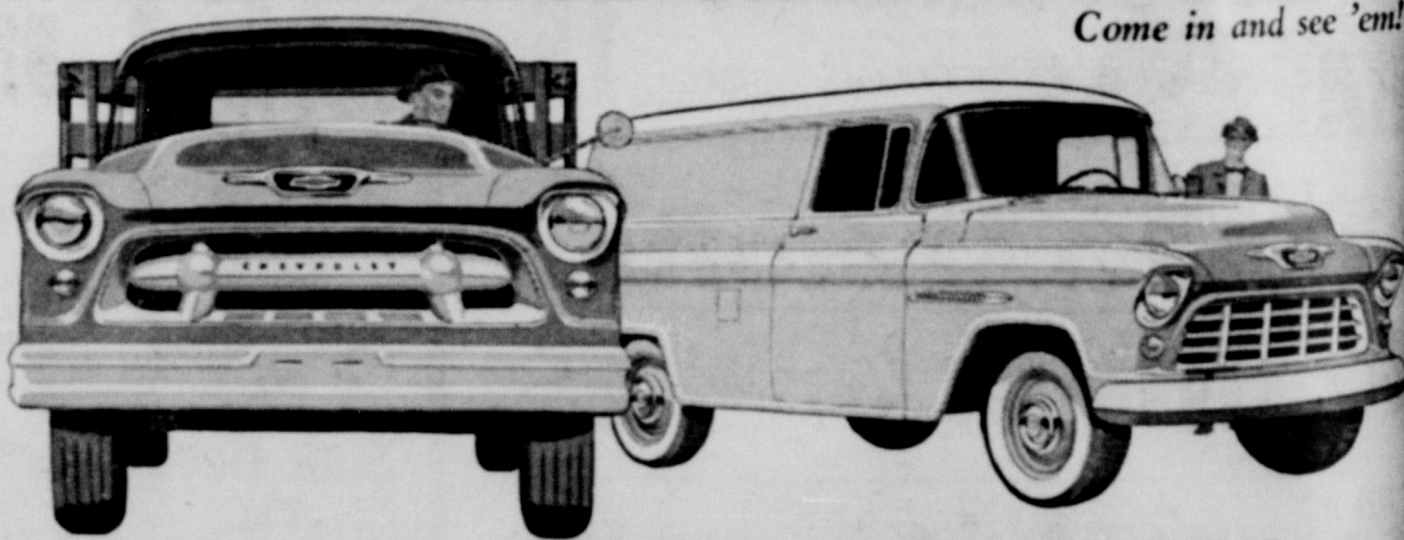

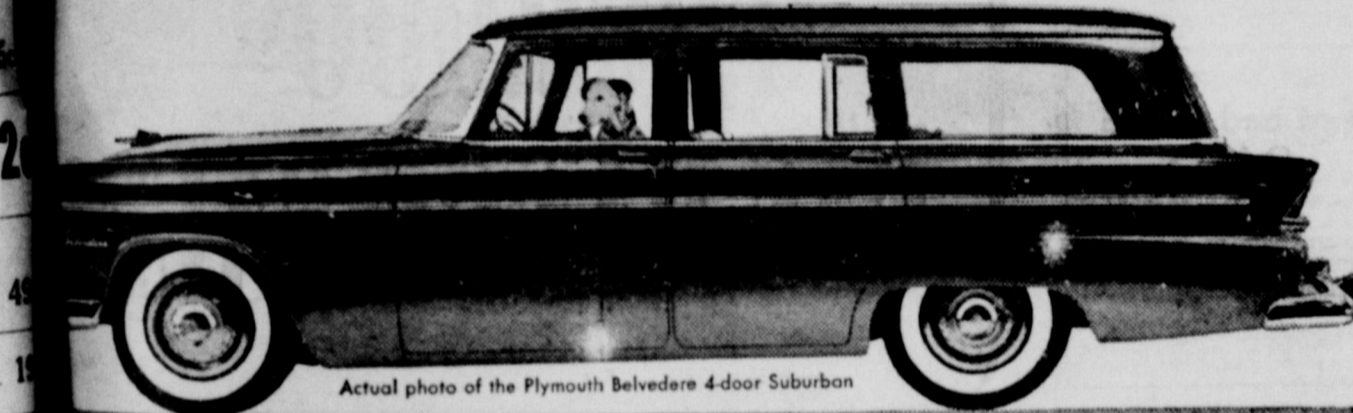

**Texas 4-H Business Continues to Thrive**

COLLEGE STATION. — The estimated value of demonstrations in agriculture, home economics and related fields owned by Texas 4-H club members is \$7,500,000. The 122,000 4-H members last year, report the state 4-H leaders, conducted a grand total of 239,754 different demonstrations involving practically every phase of agricultural production and home-making. The state 4-H leaders in their annual report show that 4,918 local clubs conducted active programs during 1954. Also that 45,418 members received training in farm and home safety; 22,451 in soil and water conservation; 42,640 in citizenship; 13,940 in group recreation; more than 4,200 in music appreciation and 20,800 received training in some phase of judging.

The records also show that 4-H members are farmers and livestock producers. Their corn acreage last year exceeded 11,500 acres and one of their members, Doyce Turner of Lamb county, set an all-time corn production record for the state of 204.3 bushels an acre. They planted over 14,000 acres of cotton; 4,700 acres of garden vegetables and carried out soil and water conservation practices on 26,614 acres.

They owned 573,128 chickens and turkeys; 6,123 dairy animals; 13,461 beef animals; 31,466 swine; 12,112 sheep and almost 5,000 were enrolled in the tractor maintenance program.

They canned and preserved 380,000 quarts of food while an additional 301,208 pounds of food was preserved by freezing. The 36,744
