Work On Area Jr. College Goes On

A Talk in Haskell of interest in this area pertaining to the proposed junior college, being sought for this area was made by Mrs. Luther Burkett.

"We must all be ambassadors for an area junior college," Mrs. Burkett, Supervisor of Education in Haskell and Rochester schools, told members of the Haskell Lions club last week at its weekly luncheon.

"Since the project was launched to establish a junior college in this area, Jones County has been added, thus making it a five-county area now composed of Knox, Jones, Haskell, Stonewall and Throckmorton.

"This immediate area is located in dead center of one of the two largest 'blind spots' in the entire state where there are no junior colleges, thus it points up most graphically the advantageous positions in which the five-county area under consideration would be, so far as substantiating a need is concerned," Mrs. Burkett said.

"Petition for the junior college has already been presented to the state coordinating board," Mrs. Burkett pointed out.

She has worked on the project for two years.

"A meeting will be held in Stamford November 14 in the interest of the proposed junior college," she said.

TWO ELECTION BOXES FOR LOCAL CITIZENS

Residents who live west of the O'Brien Highway and north of the Munday Highway will vote at the City Hall in Box 9-A. All other Knox City residents will vote at the American Legion Hall in Box 9, where Jack Coates will be election judge.

POLLS OPEN 8 TO 7

The polls will open at 8 a. m. and will close at 7 p. m.

All voters are urged to obtain their ballots and to watch their markings. Officials have warned that in the event a ballot is not marked correctly, that ballot is thrown out, and therefore a vote is lost.

In order to help those who may not know the correct procedure, they advise that in case one is voting for one particular party, all other columns must be marked out.

If one votes for only one in a party, all others in that particular party must be marked out and also the opponents for that office in all the other columns.

Recommendations to Help Low-Income Families Adopted In Knox County

Meeting the needs of low income families in Knox County through improved literacy programs, the sharing of cultural resources, a newsletter for homemakers and the publicizing of inexpensive technical training schools in the area were recommendations adopted by members of the Family Living sub-committee of the Knox County Program Building Committee at a meeting in the Knox County Court House in Benjamin recently.

The need for literacy classes for illiterate and semi-illiterate adults was the first recommendation adopted for passing on to the

whole committee. It was suggested that the committee write school superintendents and presidents of school boards in the county to ask that studies be made of the need for adult literacy classes in their communities and investigations be made on the availability of funds for such classes.

In the discussion it was noted a nationally-known social worker has said 90 per cent of the young men who do not graduate from high school will be on welfare rolls by age 25, based on recent records.

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Freddie Smith Helps Team Win

Freddie Smith was quite a hero Saturday night after "saving the day" for his teammates at the Howard Payne-Stephen F. Austin College game at Brownwood.

Harry Cline's write-up in the Brownwood Bulletin had this to say:

"Howard Payne College will undoubtedly proclaim Saturday as 'Freddie Smith Day' after the 220-pound defensive nose guard not only put the points on the scoreboard, but also saved the day with a fumble recovery as the Yellow Jackets notched their first Lone Star Conference win of the year 3-0, over Stephen F. Austin College here Saturday night.

Smith, a junior from Knox City, nicknamed "fireplug" by his fellow defenders, kicked a 33-yard

field goal early in the contest that proved to be the winning margin for the Paymen.

SFA, which penetrated the HPC five-yard line twice, made a final quarter try and had a second and goal situation from the four-yard line with 45 seconds remaining.

As the rugged HPC defensive line blasted Lumberjack quarterback Mutt Henderson, the precious pigskin squirted loose and Smith came up with the ball and the key defensive play of the night.

Smith was injured in the Abilene Christian College game and the SFA game Saturday was the first full action the vicious middle guard has seen since other than limited kicking duties.

His layoff from contact and extra work on his field goal kicking paid off when Smith booted a perfect field goal from 33 yards out with a slight angle to his left.

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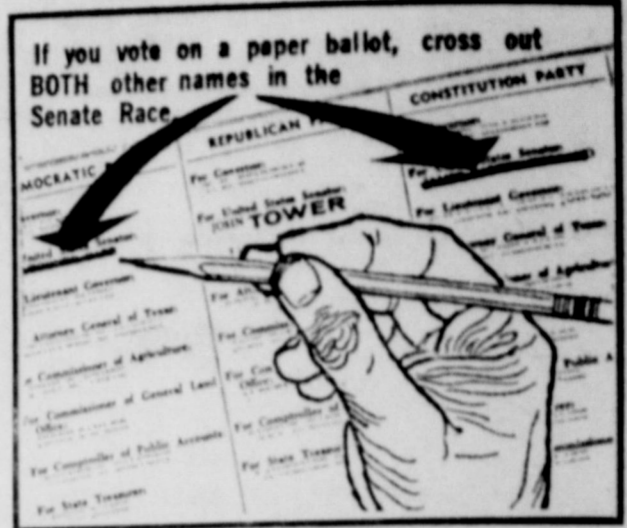

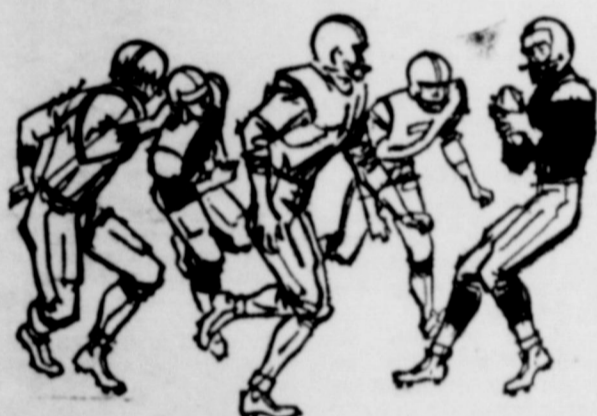

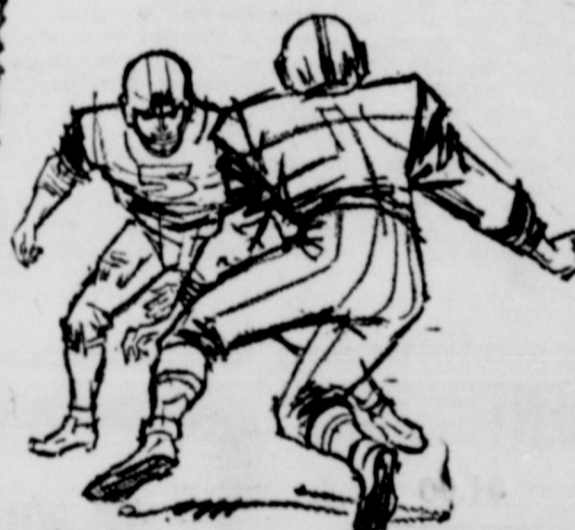

FARM & RANCH—
A shortcourse of interest to farmers, pesticide dealers and custom applicators will be held November 8 and 9 at College Station. It is the annual insect and Plant Disease Control Conference. The program has much to offer in the way of new research results. The conference will draw men from all over the state and the resulting bull sessions are also valuable in exchange information. The short course begins at 9:00 a.m. Tuesday, November 8 and ends at noon on November 9.

The sixth annual horse short course will be held November 6, 7, and 8 at College Station. The program begins on Sunday with a shetland pony show and a polo match. It will end Tuesday afternoon with a closed circuit TV demonstration at the Veterinary Medicine building. Diseases, feeding, training and a panel discussion on ethics will make up the program.

Frost and freezing weather will soon be widespread and with the change in weather plant growth is effected. When the growth of all members of the Sorghum family, including Johnsongrass, sudan, milo, forage sorghums and all hybrids, is stopped by frost, they sometimes develop a high prussic acid content and a hazard to grazing livestock. Certain chemical changes occur in the frost-killed plants, and are responsible for the prussic acid development. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal within a very short time after the damaged plant is eaten. Whether a poisoned animal can be saved depends upon how soon a veterinarian can get to it. Frosted Johnsongrass or sorghum should not be grazed until the damaged plants are as dry as good quality hay or for at least a week after the frost, it may be cut immediately provided adequate curing time is allowed. Silage made from frost-damaged plants is safe as soon as the ensiling process is completed. Young plants or second growth suckers are more likely to cause trouble than older plants nearing maturity. Too, the more luxuriant the growth, the more likely the plants will be dangerous if their growth is interrupted.

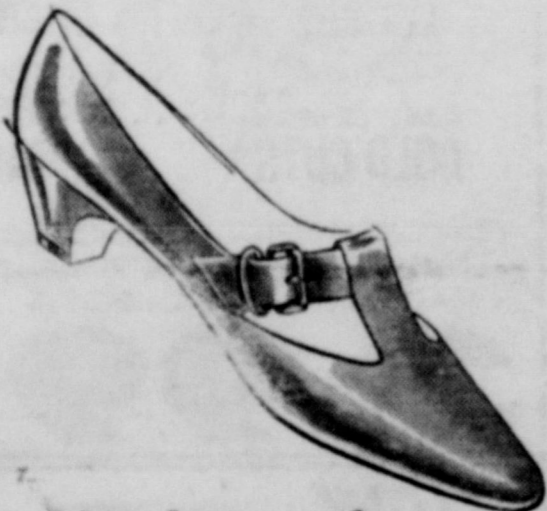
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
