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## Funeral Services Held Sunday for J. J. Denton, 79

Funeral services were held at the Knox City Baptist Church Sunday at 4:00 p. m. for James Jobe Denton, 79, a Knox County resident for 56 years.

Mr. Denton died in the Knox County Hospital at 11 a. m. Saturday. He became ill Friday night, and drove to the hospital early Saturday believing he had indigestion. He suffered a second heart attack at 7:00 a. m.

Rev. E. V. Becker, pastor of the church, officiated at the final rites. Mr. Denton had been a member of the local church 38 years, and had served as a Sunday School teacher. Burial was in the Knox City cemetery.

Born June 13, 1873 in Habersham County, Ga., Mr. Denton came to Knox County in 1897. He was married on Dec. 27, 1897 to the former Lula Cypert, who survives him.

Other survivors are six sons, Parker, Jobe, Bill and Morris Denton, all of Knox City, Tommie of Grand Prairie and J. J. Denton of Spur; two daughters, Mrs. R. B. Carnes of Plainview and Mrs. A. C. Sharp of Spur; 19 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

## Herring Resigns O'Brien School Job

At a meeting of the O'Brien School Board Tuesday night, Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Herring tendered their resignations, effective July 1. Also resigning was R. H. Meixner.

Mr. Herring had been superintendent of the O'Brien School System the past two years, and had two more years on his contract. Under his administration several improvements have been made, including a new dressing room and showers for the girls, new playground equipment, additional lights for the football field, and an improved plant and campus in general.

Mr. Herring stated that it was with deep regret that he was leaving the O'Brien Community. He praised the community highly, saying the spirit of the student body is above average, the church work in the community is outstanding, and the people of the community do not mind personal sacrifice in order to have a good school.

Mr. Herring has accepted a position as superintendent of the Hobbs Independent School, near Rotan in Fisher County. Mrs. Herring was also employed to teach in the system.

Mr. Meixner, coach and high school principal at O'Brien the past year, resigned to accept a call to the ministry. He will move his family to Avoca and serve as pastor of the Methodist Church in that community.

The O'Brien School Board will meet Monday night, June 8, and Monday night, June 15, to interview prospects for the positions of superintendent and coach. Two other teachers are needed in the O'Brien School, either elementary or secondary. Applicants for any of the positions may contact Mr. Herring or Milton Rowan, president of the board.



Two Munday youths, Virgil Weaver and Wensell Norvill, died as a result of this accident on the Knox City-Munday highway Friday night.

The accident occurred when the car in which the youths were riding crashed into the rear of a tractor-drawn hay baler.

Virgil Weaver, 16 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Weaver of Munday, was killed instantly, and Wensell Norvill, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. O. Norvill, died Saturday afternoon in a

Wichita Falls hospital. Joe Estill Sharp, 16, driver of the 1953 Chevrolet involved in the crash, was dismissed Monday from the Knox County Hospital after undergoing treatment for a head injury, bruises and shock.

All three boys attended the Munday high school.

Jesse Cassilas of Knox City, driver of the tractor, was critically injured, but Wednesday was reported to be doing well.

The car and baler, as well as the tractor that was pulling the

baler, were completely demolished. The car and baler came to rest 34 yards from the point of impact, while part of the tractor was 40 yards farther down the highway.

Highway Patrolman George Leedy of Seymour, who with Sheriff Homer T. Melton investigated the accident, said that according to reports from other motorists who had passed the tractor shortly before the accident, it was apparently traveling without tail lights on the hay baler.

## John Gipson Named Secretary 7-County Bankers Association

The Seven County Association is composed of Baylor, Haskell, Knox, Jones, Shackelford, Young and Throckmorton counties.

## Postoffice Box Rents To Be Increased

Knox Citizens, as well as others all over the nation, will pay more rent for their postoffice boxes beginning July 1. Postmaster Jeff Graham announced this week.

Boxes that have been costing local postoffice patrons 60 cents a quarter will now cost 90 cents; boxes that cost 75 cents will cost \$1.10; boxes that cost \$1.00 will cost \$1.50; and boxes that cost \$1.50 will cost \$2.25.

The Postoffice Department has increased the basic rates in computing box rental, which is based on stamp sales at each post office. Graham pointed out that this is the first time the basic rates have been changed since 1907, and the increased rates are designed to conform with the increased cost of providing equipment and maintaining service.

When box rents increased at the local office a few years ago, Graham said, it was due to the stamp sales passing the \$10,000 mark for the first time.

The basic rate change, he added, is in line with Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield's announced plan to "bring the postoffice department out of the red."

Box rents for the quarter beginning July 1 and ending Sept. 30 must be paid between June 20 and July 1.

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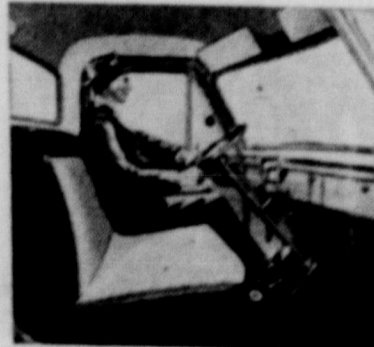

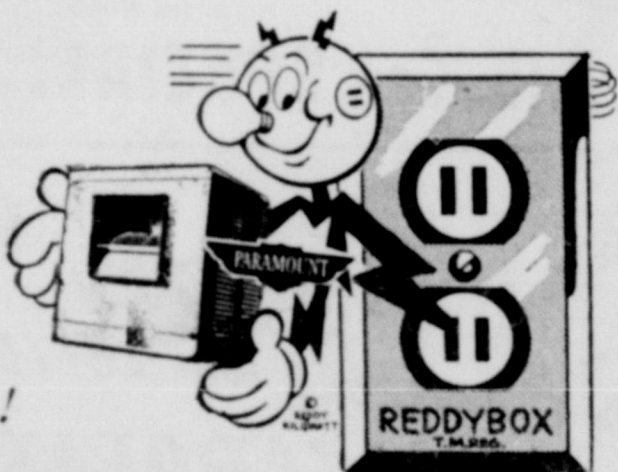

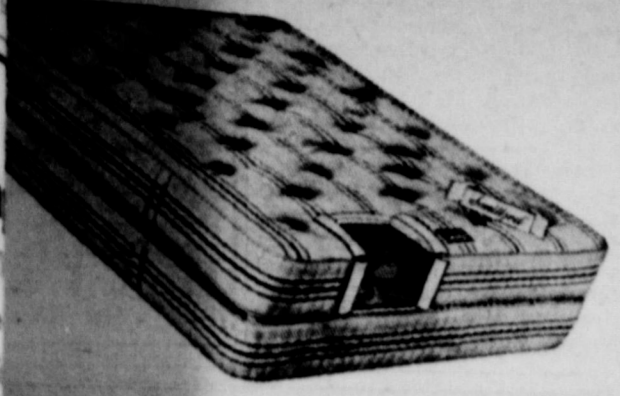
