More protection against wintry blasts will be the result of a widespread Lone Star Gas System construction program to be completed early this year, at a total cost of nearly three-quarters of a million dollars, according to company offi-

The work started last summer includes more than 25 miles of pipe 2.550 horsepower capacity, a river crossing, gathering lines to new gas




