There are penalties for roping the steer around the neck, for picking up only one heel, and for jerking the steer down. This sport requires both roping skill and timing between the

Horses used by the ropers are also specially trained to either "head" or "heel", and generally do not do both.


Mrs. James Hewitt Undergoes Surgery

Highway Improvement Includes Childress District

CHILDRESS -- Highway improvement projects in the Childress District are included in the 1976 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program, recently approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer Lewis White of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation said work in this area includes:

-- \$215,300 to seal coat 19.4 miles of portions of State Highway 86 and State 70 in Briscoe, Dickens, and Motley Counties, and a section of Loop 21 in the City of Spur.

\$547,000 to seal coat segments of selected Farm to Market Roads in Cottle and Dickens Counties. Also included is some seal coat work on F.M roads in Hall, King, and Motley Counties - for an overall total of 79.7 miles.

Similar programs had been conducted annually until last year. At that time there was no such program because of the financial crunch facing the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Funds remain short for highway work in Texas, and most other states in the nation, because of soaring inflation and diminishing growth rates of available revenues. Department officials, however, note that such programs cannot be deferred for long without serious effects.

Types of work included statewide in the Safety and Betterment and F.M. Road Improvement Program will provide extra measures of safety, increase traffic capacity and convenience, and rehabilitate old and obsolete sections. Programs such as this are necessary to prevent deterioration of the highway

system and a resulting de-

cline in mobility. All funds available to the Childress District were utilized this year to prevent pavement deterioration", said White, "and, those segments of highways included for seal coating were selected on the basis of protecting our facilities, where the need is the most urgent in relation to funds available at this time".

The statewide program provides for improvement of a total of 3,164.8 miles of highways and F.M. roads with 58 percent assigned to U.S. and State-numbered routes, 39 percent for F.M. routes, and three percent reserved for later assignment.

Letter To The Editor

This is an Open Letter concerning the Miller Creek Dam completed over two years ago, and there is no water in it yet. This represents some 7,000,000 dollar Bond Assumption by Knox City, Munday, Goree, and Haskell. Some one and a half million was Knox City's share.

The Bonds were voted to be paid for by the sale of water to the Cities at 50 or more cents per thousand gallons. Then this was placed on the Ballot at the next Election and Knox City voted for it. Property was assessed at high evaluation by the Water District. The city was called upon to begin at once to begin payment of large amounts at once to the Water District, even before the Dam was completed. The city, in turn, notified Knox City residents, through the paper, that they would have to increase our City Taxes by 40 percent until the water would be available - then it would be removed. (This was not a Legal Tax because it was not voted on by the people.) So the tax went on the city

Government Surveys and approval by the Corps of Engineers planned for the location for the Dam and drew its Specifications. Serious mistakes were made. The Swenson Ranch would drain into it, but they overlooked some seven large tanks that would handle the run-off of the Ranch during the average year. The land East and on South of Weinert would sink into the ground, so that very few could have wells that would not go dry. Most farm houses had cisterns or had to haul water. It would not stay in tanks. About once in ten years, that area gets enough run-off water to fill the Lake.

If you should let that water stay in the lake, and not use it, the lake would seep dry in one year. How would you get water for the next nine years? A lot of water fell last year and filled a part of the lake. Then they locked the gates and wouldn't let us go in there. Now, there is only a creek bed full of water.

The lake itself goes through several feet of salt formations. This helps the water get out, and it would increase the "Gippy" condition of the water, after already having collected the minerals from the lands in the entire run-off. That layer of blue sale is Nickel Nitrate, the green is Copper Sulfate, most of it is white and it includes Magnesium Sulfate (Epsom Salts). Potassium Nitrate. Calcium Carbonate, and others. Of course, none of them are pure. Then, the sites 750 of some fifty old oil wells, and some that are still pumping, drain their salt water residue into the lake. Those wells and their salt water drained into surface tanks and evaporated. Rains have washed the salt toward the lake.

SUMMARY: That lake will have more "Hard Water" in it than we have in the water of any of our towns. Every town in West Texas has "Hard Water." Drink it and like it as it is good for almost everyone.

What should we do about it? Just refuse to pay the Water Taxes. To the city, pay only 60 percent of your taxes as they will discontinue paying the Water Taxes also. If they do not allow this - we still have "The Right of Petition." We will call an election and take the 40 percent off the books. Remember now that the government has insured these water bonds. Let's let them worry about it.

Schools Participating In Lunch Program

Knox City Schools will take part again this year in the Texas Education Agency's School Lunch Program.

Students may buy lunch for 50 cents (grades K-4) or 55 cents (grades 5-12), breakfast for 25 cents and extra milk for 10 cents. Adult teachers' lunches will be 80 cents and breakfast 35 cents. Seconds are available at breakfast and lunch, ala carte.

At the beginning of school, each student is given a letter telling about free breakfast, and lunches and a form to be used if the family wants to apply for them. Because of this program, every school child is guaranteed at least one warm, balanced meal a day, and by being better fed is better able to learn.

Using the following income scale as a guideline, families may want to apply for free or reduced-price school breakfasts and lunches for their children. Families who are suffering from unusual hardships, such as unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of their income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child. disaster or casualty losses. loss of income due to unemployment or the caring of foster children, are also eligible to apply for the free meals

Each student who was receiving free or reduced-price meals at the close of school in the spring can begin school this year receiving free or reduced-priced meals until the new applications are processed.

All records of the School Lunch Program are confidential. No student knows who is receiving free or reduced meals. Each applicant is advised by letter whether his application has been approved or not. All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay.
