



Station KFDX in Wichita Falls, on Channel 3, will be on April 1 with a 550 foot tower and will open on 12,000-watt output. In 60 days the station will be on it full power of 60,000 watts. This area should get the station at all times.





Lawton, Okla., on Channel 7, will have full powe soon of 10,000 watts.


Oklahoma City, Station WKY, will be on soon will a 100,000-watt output.
