436 Enroll In Local Schools

Enrollment in the Knox City Schools Wednesday was 436, a slight decrease over last year's enrollment at the same time. However, Mrs. E. F. Branton, elementary principal, said more children, mostly Latin-Americans who are permanent residents, have not enrolled yet.

Last year's enrollment on Wednesday after school opened was 441, with 118 in high school and 323 in elementary school.

High school principal E. A. Youngblood reported a total enrollment Wednesday of 111, which was the high school average daily attendance figure at the end of school in May, but a loss of seven from the enrollment at the beginning of school last year.

Mrs. Branton reported a gain of two students in elementary school.

The junior class is the largest in high school with 34 members. There are 26 freshmen, 27 sophomores and 24 seniors.

Ray Talley of San Antonio, M. Sgt. Herman Talley of Abilene, Albert James McKey-nolds, Aderle Herring and Donald Hewitt, all of Odessa, Jammie Reid of Rochester, and Winston Dunlap of Cottonwood.

Pvt. Dunlap was a 1953 graduate of Knox City High School, and attended Chicago Art Institute before enlisting in the Marines. Survivors include his mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. Barnie Humphries of Wichita Falls; a brother, Leo, and a sister, Georgia Faye; a half-brother, Eddie Humphries, a half-sister, Sherry Humphries, and his grandmother, Mrs. J. W. Hewitt.

Sears Swine Show To Be Held at Munday Saturday

The Knox County Gilt Show will be held Saturday, Sept. 8 at 10 a. m., at the Vegetable Growers Shed in Munday. County Agent Roy England announced this week.

This show is a continuation of a program promoted by the Sears Foundation whereby each year eight Knox County 4-H club members are awarded registered Duroc gilt pigs.

In return, each 4-H member agrees to raise a litter of registered pigs and return one gilt to the program, thus continuing the program in perpetuity. In addition to the gilts, one boy is awarded a registered boar pig and agrees to furnish boar service to each of the eight members receiving gilts.

The Sears Foundation also furnishes cash prizes for the county and area shows as well as for an area heavy litter contest.

The county champion gilt, to be named Saturday, and the county boar, owned by David Albus of Rhineland, will journey to Iowa Park Sept. 15 to compete with other county winners in an area contest.

This year Knox County will have only seven gilts competing, due to one 4-H boy losing his gilt to the summer heat during August.

Roy McClung, Baylor County agricultural agent, will judge the show promptly at 10 a. m. Saturday, England said.

Lions to Support Research Foundation

'Hounds to Meet Throckmorton In Season-Opener Here Friday Night

It will be dog-eat-dog tomorrow (Friday) night when the Knox City Greyhounds and the Throckmorton Greyhounds tangle on the local field in the first football game of the season.

This will be the first meeting of the teams, and although Throckmorton is a class A team, the only one on the Knox City schedule, the game is expected to be a close, hard-fought contest. Last year Throckmorton lost to Newcastle, a team Knox City defeated. They were hit harder by graduation than the local lads, with only four returning lettermen at the beginning of the season. It was reported that Raphael Manuel and Tommy Rogers, the only two lettermen in the line, and Jim Hudson, a center, quit the team Monday, but it is also reported that Manuel and Rogers may be back on the squad in time for Friday night's game.

Sparkplug of the visiting team may be Marley Cribbs, 125-pound letterman back. The other letterman is Larry Hibbits, a junior back.

Coach Dutch Kline has a heavier team than Knox City, including a 200-pound tackle, 180-pound tackle and 180-pound end. There are thirty boys on the Throckmorton roster.

District 10-A is a new district, and includes Eastland, Albany, Clyde and Wylie.

Knox City coach Les Cowan can field 14 lettermen, but is minus seven of last year's "starters." The team is considerably lighter this year than last, and a lack of depth in several positions may hurt the team. However, after ten days of twice-a-day practice, Cowan says the team is shaping up and the boys are getting in shape.

They may make some mistakes, he adds, but with six practice games scheduled they are expected to be a clicking ball team by the first conference game, with Aspermont Oct. 26.

Among returning lettermen are all-district end Bobby Driver, and fullback Bobby Day, who was named on the all-district second team. Other lettermen ends are Ross Lankford and Jerry Anderson.

Holding down the quarterback spot are Montie White, 160-pound sophomore, and Joey Watkins, 140-pound junior.

Ladell Driver and Doug Bradley will be at the halfback posts, with Hoyt Lovelace, a 150-pound senior, available either in the backfield or at guard. Bill Gilpin, 160, and Don Bible, 170, are the top tackle candidates, but non-letterman Loyd McCullar, 160, may give them a run for their money.

Bill Yarbrough, who won all-area honorable mention in 1955, and George Davis look like the top guards. Rip Collins, 165-pound senior, holds down center.

Several non-lettermen show a lot of promise, Cowan said, and will see a lot of action. They include halfback Benton Bolin and tackles Tim Edwards and Sam Anderson. Among outstanding freshmen are end Don Johnson and backs Raymond Rodriguez and Ken Reynolds.

After Friday night the 'Hounds next two games are away from home, at Trent Sept. 14 and at Hermeigh Sept. 21. The will be hosts to Woodson Oct. 5 and Moran Oct. 12, and will end their practice schedule at Strawn Oct. 19.

Three races will be held in front of the fire hall and west of Porter and White feed store beginning at 4 o'clock. The 6-man hose race and the 2-man race will be held in front of the fire hall and water polo will be held west of the feed store. Knox City firemen will not participate in the races. First place winner in each event will receive \$10, and \$5 will be awarded the second place team in each event. Holcomb said a fire equipment company usually gives additional prizes.

FHA Loan Services Are Broadened

How credit needs of a larger number of farm families can be served by the Farmers Home Administration under recently enacted legislation was discussed at a meeting of agency officials held in Mineral Wells Aug. 27.

The new law provides broader authority to assist family-type farmers with loans to improve and operate their farms. It also authorizes, as a part of the rural development program, loans for operating and developing farms where the farmer has part-time employment off the farm. Included in the broader authority are loans for refinancing existing debts, and an increase in the maximum amount that can be advanced for operating loans.

All of the present loan services of the Farmers Home Administration which includes loans for the operation, development and purchase of family-type farms, farm housing, soil and water conservation, and loans to meet emergency credit needs will continue to be available.

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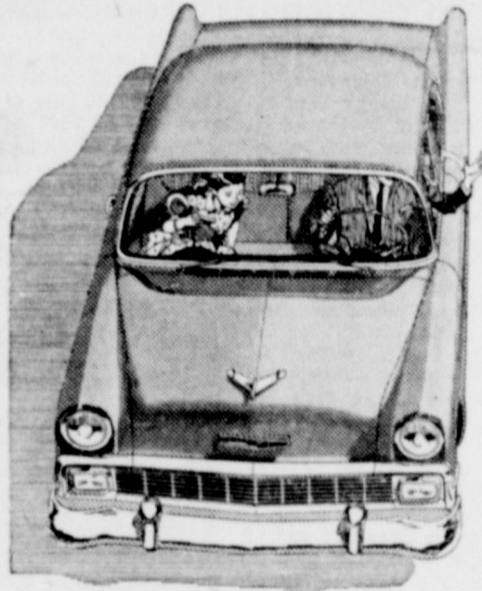

STREAMS in Desert Places

"Blessed are they that mourn: for they shall be comforted." (Matt. 5:4)

First we spoke of the mourning of inadequacy. Second we see the mourning of repentance. CONSERVATION RESERVE... is for ALL FARMS



All farm land regularly used to produce crops, including tame hay, is eligible for the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announces. Farmers participating in the Conservation Reserve will sign contracts through County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committees to shift land from production to conservation uses. Contracts will be for 3 or 5 years if the land already is in an approved cover crop; for 5 or 10 years if approved cover must be established; and for 10 to 15 years if trees will be planted. Up to 80 percent of the costs of conservation practices may be paid by the government. In addition, annual payments on the land will be made during the life of the contract. Farmers also may participate in the Soil Bank's Acreage Reserve if they have allotments for wheat, corn, cotton, peanuts, rice, or tobacco.

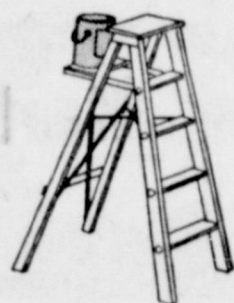

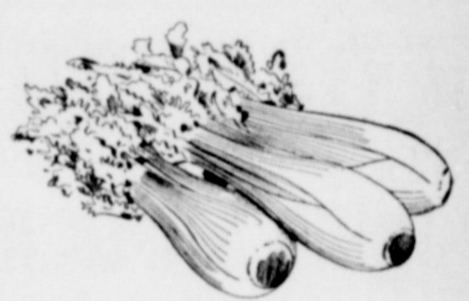

"WATER CYCLES" NOT FOUND IN RECENT STUDY

Predictions of rainfall cannot be made on the basis of weather cycles of "wet and dry years." Recent studies of 31 locations in the High and Rolling Plains of Texas show that cycles play little or no part in annual rainfall figures dating as far back as 89 years. Drs. R. J. Hildreth and Gerald W. Thomas of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, who made the studies, state that an optimist can find traces of cycles at some locations, but no statistical significance of cycles is revealed in the records.
"Average or normal rainfall seldom occurs," Dr. Hildreth said. "The records indicate that farmers and ranchers in the High and Rolling Plains should figure that more years—52 to 69 percent—will be below average in rainfall than years above average.
Prolonged droughts have occurred on the High and Rolling Plains at least two or three times during the period weather records are available. The famous drought of the 1930's, which led to the dust bowl period, shows up in records at most locations. Another bad drought period occurred around 1917. At most locations the recent drought began in 1951 and is the longest and most severe on record. Records go back to 1866 at Abilene.
In most cases, it is not the first year of low rainfall that is disastrous, but the two, three or four years in a row of low rainfall. During the dust bowl period Amarillo had eight consecutive years of below average rainfall.
The study and publication of the results—"Farming and Ranching Risk as Influenced by Rainfall"—is the first of a planned series to include several other areas of Texas, the Edwards Plateau, Trans-Pecos and Rio Grande Plain, where drought also has affected farm and ranch income.
