Engineers Revise Proposed Cost of Brazos River Dams

R. B. Campbell, a director of the Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation District, reports a review of business taken up by the board of directors at a recent meeting in Mineral Wells.

The district board was informed that a new type of spillway construction adopted by the Army Engineers and the Texas Board of Water Engineers would considerably increase the cost of future dams on the Brazos watershed.

Engineers are preparing estimates and plans on three district dams, the Leon Lampans, both in Bell County, and the De Cordova Bend dam in Hood County.

The board voted to hold its July 16th meeting at Abilene, at the invitation of Director C. M. Caldwell.

V-E Day Closing Plans Announced

The following schedule has been agreed upon for the day that Germany surrenders or the day that is announced by Supreme Commander Eisenhower, with the official ending of the war with Germany.

This schedule was worked out by a committee appointed jointly by the City and the Knox City Lions Club.

The committee feels that the day should be observed as a day of thanksgiving and reverence and not as a day of celebration.

- 1. Immediate closing for the remainder of the day if word comes before 1:00 p. m.
2. Immediate closing for that day and all of the next day if word comes after 1:00 p. m.
3. If word comes at any hour on Saturday or Sunday, will close all day Monday.
