

GM Builds New 'Two-Way' Plant in Texas



Construction work has begun on the new General Motors "dual purpose" plant (above) at Arlington, Texas, where GM's Buick-Oldsmobile-Pontiac Assembly Division will build a Grumman-designed airplane for the United States Navy and assemble passenger cars simultaneously. The flexible layout of the plant will permit combined aircraft-automotive operations or it can be converted in a matter of days to either total aircraft or total automotive production, depending upon military requirements. The "dual purpose" plant idea was first proposed a year ago by C. E. Wilson, GM president, as a means of maintaining strong military and civilian production levels without disruption of plant facilities or working forces. Most of the Buick, Oldsmobile and Pontiac cars produced in the Arlington plant will be for distribution in Texas.


