His breeding plots are located on the busn farms two miles west of O'Brien. This cotton is known as the Northern Star Variety, and has been bred to take the place of Half and Half as it has a medium thin rind boll and is an early maturing cotton stapling 7-8 in the dry years to 1 inch in wet years. There is 4800 acres under contract and growing in this variety. It is the intention
