Seymour golf pro Pinky Arledge and Bill Moss, also of Seymour, teamed up for a nine-stroke victory on the final day

of play here Sunday, in the Knox City Partnership Golf Tournament for a 190 total score.

Hanson Signs Contract With Baltimore Colts

Stan Hansen, middle linebacker on the 1970 West Texas State University football team, has signed a contract with the Baltimore Colts. It was announced Monday last week. Hansen inked the free-agent pact with George Young, director of player development for the world-champion professional football team at Lubbock Monday, June 21.

He will report to the Colt training camp at Western Maryland College July 11.

Hansen, son of former residents Mr. and Mrs. John Hansen of Amarillo, was team captain his senior year at WTSU. He was a three-year starter and as a sophomore played middle linebacker. As a junior, he was used at defensive end and returned to the middle secondary spot for his final year.

The 240-pounder is six foot

three. He was All-State his junior and senior years in high school at Las Cruces, New Mexico, and was selected to the Prep All-American team sponsored by the Coach and Athlete Magazine his senior year.

Hansen is the grandson of Mrs. Molly Shaver of Canyon and the late E. B. Shaver Sr. He is married to the former Sharon Anderson of Stinnett, Texas.

Price Increase July 15

With the increase in the State Sales Tax rate on July 1, plus the increase in postal rates, the publisher finds it necessary to increase the price of a single copy of The Knox County Herald from 10¢ to 15¢ including tax, and from \$5.00 to \$6.00, in-

cluding tax, on subscriptions to those who live farther than 50 miles from Knox City. At the present time, the price of \$3.50 for local subscriptions and those who live within the fifty mile radius, will remain the same.

The increase in prices will become effective Thursday, July 15.

It is always with regret that we raise prices but due to the rising costs of publication plus the additional sales tax and postal increase, it is necessary that we make these changes.

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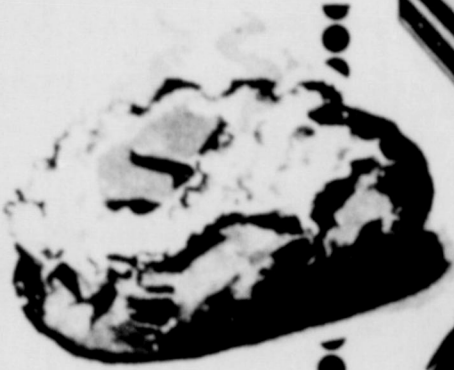
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
