Mr. and Mrs. Hicks (Tom and Pauline) are veteran newspaper publishers, having owned and operated various newspapers in East Texas and West Central Texas.

Hicks started in the newspaper field at an early age in Ranger and Breckenridge. In 1948, Tom newspaper and since that time have acquired several others, some in which they still maintain interests.

The Hickses are the parents of two children, both married. Their children are a son, Tommy Hicks, who is publisher of the Dublin Progress, and a daughter, Mrs. Wendell McNeely of Jefferson. They have five grandchildren.

The new Herald publishers, Mr. and Mrs. Hicks have for the past year resided in Stephenville. They will be quartered temporarily at K Courts until suitable housing facilities are arranged. It is their intention to either purchase or build a home in Knox City. The Hicks are members of the Baptist Church.

The Hickses are proudly contemplating their venture in Knox City and said that after looking at that were obtainable they had selected Knox City for the fine schools, churches, and friendly people. ## USE OF COTTON MARKETING QUOTA CARDS DISCONTINUED

A simpler method of operating the cotton marketing quota program will go into effect this year when farmers start taking their crop to market, according to A. J. Navratil, chairman, Knox Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The new method discontinues the use of marketing cards as a means of identifying cotton for marketing quota purposes. It applies to 1966 and succeeding crops of both upland and extra long staple cotton.

The Chairman explained that, through the years, few cotton farms were "overplanted," and such penalties as were applicable were collected without difficulty. Doing away with the cotton marketing cards — the white ones for penalty-free cotton and the red ones for overplanted cotton — will save thou-

sands of dollars in administrative costs.

Starting this year, then, ASCS county offices will maintain a list of overplanted farms within the county as well as farms from which the cotton is otherwise ineligible for a loan because program provisions were not met fully.

Notices will be sent to operators and producers on such farms regarding the penalty due and the lien on the crop. Notices listing the names of producers and the farm numbers of overplanted farms will be furnished to surrounding county offices, and others such as cotton buyers, ginners, loan clerks, and cooperatives. Any marketing quota penalties due will be collected at the time cotton is first offered for sale in much the same way that the penalties now are collected.

**FARM and RANCH Notes**

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

Knox County 4-H members, parents and adult leaders are making preparations to attend County 4-H Camp, August 10-11. The Camp this year will be held at the West Texas Utilities Clubhouse on Lake Pauline east of Quanah.

The Camp will begin with registration from 10-11 a.m. Wednesday, Aug. 10, and end after noon the next day. A program of study groups, swimming, softball, washers, volley ball, horseshoes and a big night party has been planned.

The planning committee included the 4-H Adult Leader Association, Mr. C. H. Herring, president and Pam Roberts, 4-H Council Co-chairman. The other 4-H members involved were Rickie Herring, Rhineland; Susan McCamies, Benjamin and Oona Navratil, Gilliland.

The cooking committee will be under the direction of Mr. Elmo Todd of Truscott. The swimming will be conducted by Mr. Jerry Peery, Benjamin High School Coach.

Everyone will bring coats and bedding desired. They will also need to bring their own plates and eating utensils and a bag of cookies. A sack lunch for the noon meal Wednesday will also be needed.

We would especially like to invite as many parents as possible to attend. Children under 4-H age accompanied by their parents are welcome too.

Cost of the camp is \$2.00 with cost of swimming (.50) and the snacks extra. Adult leaders that help with camp are admitted free.

We would like to warn cattle-men that the hot, dry weather of July and August at hand, growing cattle cannot be expected to continue gains on Bermuda grass with additional feed.

In Texas A&M experiments, steers averaging about 500 lbs. each were grazed on Bermuda grass. Half were given five pounds of sorghum grain each day and the other half got none. Those that received no supplement gained 12 pounds per day from April to July 7, and gained only 4 pounds per day from July 7 to September 15. On the other hand, animals that received the supplemental feed gained 1.7 pounds per day during the first period and 1.1 pounds during the last period.

We would advise that if a cattleman wants additional gain on his cattle, grain should be fed at the rate of at least one per cent of the animals body weight per head per day. To finish cattle out for slaughter it will require as much as 2.5 per cent body weight in concentrate feeds or a full feed.
