A big shiny silver cup was presented last Thursday to the commander and crew of the aircraft carrier USS Oriskany for rescuing 44 crew members of the stricken freighter, August Moon.

Sam Stubbs, MN3, of Knox City has been a member of the crew of the Oriskany four years this month. When Stubbs finished his boot training in San Diego, he was assigned to this ship and was flown from San Francisco to Japan to be put aboard.

Sam was due to be discharged in August of this year, but extended for the duration of the cruise and will receive his separation papers December 16. He is the son of Mrs. Mildred Stubbs of Knox City.

The ship's commander, Capt. John Henry Iarrobino, received the silver trophy from Mrs. James Lu, director of the Eastern Sun Shipping Co., owners of the August Moon. The Oriskany went to the rescue of the 10,000-ton freighter when it ran aground last week in the South China Sea.

The Knox City Greyhounds played a much closer game Friday night at Merkel than the 41-0 score indicates.

Early in the game Merkel received a KC punt running 70 yds. for a touchdown. Kick was good for the extra point.

During the second quarter of play, the Greyhounds suffered a number of injuries. Three of the team's starters were crippled to the extent that they were unable to return to the action. Quarterback Jerry Myers received side and hip injuries and Tackle Gary Wheeler received a back injury. He and Myers were taken by ambulance to Abilene for observa-

tion, being released after a few hours. Halfback Bobby Flanders suffered an ankle injury. The Badgers racked up 21 more points and at half time, the score was 28-0.

Other long runs to pay dirt hurt the Greyhounds. One run for 83 yards in the third quarter, and another for 55 yards in the fourth quarter, marked up defeat to the sum of 41-0.

Social Security Man to be in Knox City October 5th

Edwin S. Draughton, officer in charge of the Vernon Social Security office, will be at the new City Hall on Wednesday, October 5, from 10:00 a.m. until noon.

He will take applications and answer questions pertaining to social security.

All people in Knox City and Knox County desiring to file applications for social security benefits or ask questions about social security are invited to meet Mr. Draughton at this convenient location. He is available to speak to interested groups about social security at any time. There are no charges for these services.

In a typical month of 1965, approximately 7,000 special internal Revenue Service cases were awaiting review by the Social Security Administration. These involved two or more individuals who used the same account number in filing income tax returns.

In about half of these, earnings were reported and credited to the wrong individual's account. To prevent this from happening, each person should take extra care in giving his account

These plates are produced by private concerns and are not accepted by the Social Security Adm. for issuance of a duplicate.

If you lose your card or it becomes damaged or torn, go to your Social Security District Office and have a duplicate issued.

Special Group Of Age 72 Residents To Qualify For Social S. Benefits

Even though they were never employed under social security, an estimated 35 residents of Knox County now 72 or over will be eligible for \$35 monthly social security benefits starting with October 1966, according to Edwin Draughon, district social security manager.

Special application forms will be mailed shortly to all the eligible persons who have enrolled for Medicare, but anyone now 72 who failed to apply for Medicare will have to get the blanks from the social security office.

Unlike other benefit claims, these special age 72 claims under the Prouty amendment will have no retroactivity. Payments will begin in the month the application is received in the social security office, but not before October.

Payments will not be made to anyone who receives Railroad Retirement or regular social security benefits, nor to those who receive state old-age assistance payments, Civil Service annuities or other Federal or State pensions. In some instances, if the pension is less than \$35 a month, payments under the Prouty amendment can be made to bring the combined amount to \$35.

Resident aliens will be eligible if they have been legally admitted for permanent residence and have lived in the United States continuously for at least five years immediately preceding the month of application. Moreover, any applicant, regardless of citizenship, must reside in one of the 50 states or the District of Columbia to qualify.

When both husband and wife are eligible the wife will receive \$17.50 monthly and the husband \$35.

Detailed information or help in preparing the application may be obtained at the social security office, 1728 Fannin Street, Vernon, Texas. The office is open daily from 8:30 a. m. to 4:45 p. m. and from 8:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. on Saturday.

Streams In Desert Places

Farm And Ranch News

A tour of demonstrations in the Munday and Knox City Areas will be made Wednesday, October 5, beginning at 8:30 a.m. The tour will leave from the Knox Prairie Seed Office in Munday.

Two potential cash crops for irrigated land in Knox County will be seen first in demonstrations on the Ira Bowden farm. Soybeans and Sesame will be seen growing. The Sesame is a new variety Baco, which can be combined. The soybeans were planted after Irish potatoes were harvested.

Sweet potatoes will be observed on this farm and on the Brown brothers south of Rhineland.

The last stop on the tour will be the S. D. Jones, northeast of Knox City. This farm is located just west of the Moorhouse Feedlots. Here nematode resistant cotton will be observed. Auburn, a picker cotton and two new stripper cotton varieties will be observed on this farm which is heavily infested with rootknot nematodes. These are the only varieties that will produce a crop on this farm.

These are examples of result demonstrations conducted by the Crops Committee to help improve Knox County Agriculture. Leon Burkhart, Knox City Chairman, invites everyone to come out and have a look.

The Knox County 4H Adult Leaders Association will meet Thursday night, 8:00 p.m. in the Benjamin school. Mr. C. H. Herring, Rhineland is the president. All parents of 4H members and anyone else interested is invited to attend. Plans for 4H for the coming year will be made.

Ranchers in Knox County are weaning some of the Heaviest calves ever grown here this fall. Beavers Ranch, Benjamin, sold their steer calves last Saturday averaging 570 pounds. Ranges will go into the winter with plenty of cured grass for winter grazing.

Here is a tip for the housewife when she goes to the grocery store egg counter to help her decide which size eggs are the best buy.
You can figure the price of eggs by dividing 12 by the weight

of the size of egg you are considering. On the average, small eggs weigh 18 ounces; medium eggs, 21 ounces; and large eggs, 24 ounces. Another rule is the 7 cent rule. Buy the large size egg if the difference in price is less than 7 cents per dozen. For example, if the large eggs are 63 cents and the medium eggs, 59c,

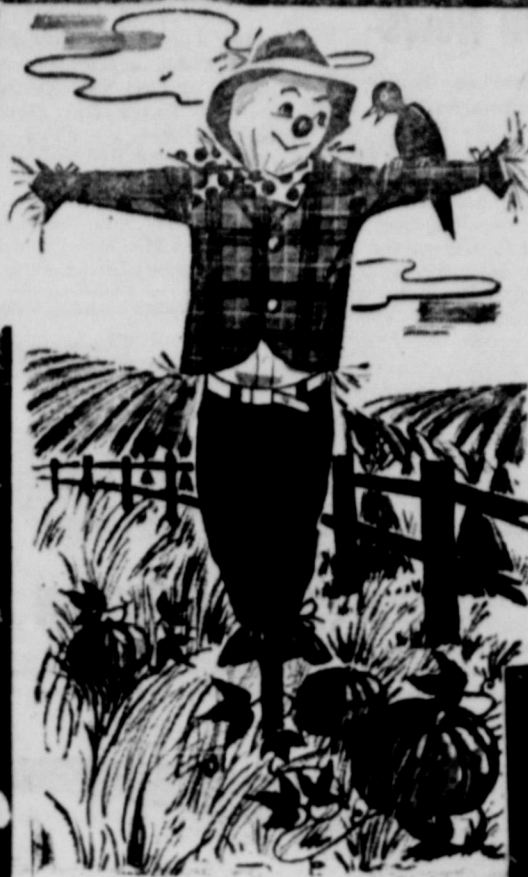

Local Youth Are Invited To Enter Lions Club \$25,000 Educational Grant

The youth of Knox City, O'Brien and Benjamin have been given a challenge to develop a plan for world peace by their local Lions Club—a challenge that could earn one of them a \$25,000 educational or career assistance grant.

The Knox City Lions Club, together with Lions Clubs throughout the world, is sponsoring a world-wide essay contest for the world's youth on the most important world subject today—Peace. The contest offers \$50,000 in total awards, of \$1,000 each and including the \$25,000 first prize, eight semi-final world regional awards of \$1,000 each and travel expenses for the eight winners to Chicago, Illinois in July, 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be chosen from the eight. Also, more than 20,000 local, district and multiple district awards will be made.

"We are hopeful one of our young people will win this world-wide prestige award," President Zeb Smith of the Knox City Lions Club said in announcing the contest for this area.

The contest, open to young people who will be 14 but less than 22 years of age as of January 15, 1967, during the Association's Annual International Convention in New York.

"The Peace Essay Contest is divided into eight world divisions for the \$1,000 prizes," President Smith said.

"Our Club's winner will advance to Lions District 2E1 competition in his or her effort to qualify for the multiple district contest," Mr. Smith said.

The contest sponsored by more than 20,000 Lions Clubs in more than 130 countries in the free world, will be the largest Peace Essay Contest in the world today.

"The purpose of the contest is to develop a formula for world peace because we feel peace is attainable," said President Smith.

"We want to alert our youth to the need for world peace and focus attention on that important goal," he said.

In announcing the contest internationally, President Lindsey said that Lions International, the world's largest service club organization is well qualified to sponsor such a contest.

Contestants should submit their entry in essay form, not to exceed 5,000 words.

"Judging will fall into four categories: 75 per cent of the essay's points will be devoted to content, ten per cent to organization, ten per cent to style and five per cent to merchandise," Mr. Smith said.

"If our winner can advance

through the judging stages up to the world finals he will receive an expense paid trip to Chicago to attend the Lions International 50th Annual Convention for the final judging of his essay in addition to the \$1,000 award."

Mr. Smith said he hoped local young people would accept the challenge and enter his club's section of the contest. Closing date for the club's contest is December 10, 1966.

"Students wishing to enter the contest should contact one of the Knox City Lions to get full details of the contest, he said.

The age limit for the contest, includes all youth 14 but less than 22 years of age as of January 15, 1967.

FARM and RANCH Notes

JOE W. DOBY COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

Cows that give more milk, wean bigger calves. Agricultural researchers at Texas A&M report their findings show the amount of milk produced by a cow has the single most important effect on weaning weight of the calf.

Recent tests at A&M's agricultural experiment stations give some insight into milk production of various breeds and crossbred cattle, according to J. K. Riggs, professor in the department of animal science at A&M.

In the A&M tests, Hereford bulls, gave just over 7 pounds of milk a day and weaned calves averaging 408 pounds. Brahman cows bred to Brahman bulls gave nearly 9 pounds of milk a day and weaned calves at 370 pounds.

Santa Gertrudis cows bred to a Santa Gertrudis bull gave over 13 pounds of milk a day and weaned calves at over 500 pounds — and Riggs pointed out these calves were slightly younger than the other calves at weaning.

On the crossbred side of the fence, when Hereford-Brahman cows were bred to a Brahman bull, the cows gave over 13 lbs. of milk and weaned calves at 422 pounds.

When Hereford-Brahman cows were bred to Hereford bulls, the cows gave nearly 13 pounds of milk and weaned calves that averaged 489 pounds.

According to Riggs, research has brought out the following:

Milk yield is significantly affected by breed or cross of cow, age of cow, and sex of the calf nursing the cow.

Mature cows produce the most milk and wean the heaviest calves. First-calf heifers produce the least milk and wean the lightest calves.

Cows with bull calves produce more milk than cows with heifer calves. Bull and steer calves are heavier than heifer calves at weaning time.

Texas Still Tops In Supporting Our National Defense

Texans are continuing to play a major role in support of our nation's national defense establishment. Figures made available to the Armed Services Committee on which I serve show that total spending in support of defense personnel and bases in Texas last fiscal year was \$2.7 billion.

During fiscal year 1966 there was a total of 242,668 defense personnel in Texas with an annual payroll of \$1.3 billion. Of these, 181,355 were military personnel making \$842,694,000; and 61,313 were civilians making \$44,357,000.

During fiscal 1965 the net value of defense contracts for work by Texas companies was \$1.4 billion, an increase of \$52.3 million and 6.2 percent of national defense contract spending as compared to only 5.3 percent the previous year.

During the same period the Texas payroll for military and civilian defense personnel increased \$13.7 million because of pay raises even though the defense payroll was 13,653 fewer defense personnel than at the end of fiscal year 1964.

It is significant that our state continues to make a large and effective contribution to the national defense particularly in this time of crisis. Texans always cooperate fully with the defense bases and personnel in our state, and our workers and industries have fully met the requirements placed upon them.

The Army has 810 more civilian personnel and 2,342 less military personnel now than last year. The civilian payroll is \$17.2 million and the military payroll is up \$20.5 million.

The Navy has 27 more civilians and 815 more uniformed personnel in Texas this year. The Navy civilian payroll remained the same while the payroll went up \$10.8 million.

The Air Force at 19 major installations had 3,254 more civilians and 16,217 less military personnel in the state last year. The Air Force civilian payroll was \$47.5 million more and the military payroll \$7.3 million more.

The luncheon speaker was Fred Higginbotham of Dallas, who is associated with Blue Cross insurance. His topic included pertinent information on the Medicare Program.
