When the ballot is received the person may mark it in the comfort of his own home and mail it back to the clerk in the envelopes provided for both the ballot and the stub.

Not only is this less time consuming and more pleasant to the voter, but it also saves the time of the election clerk who has to take the ballot out to the car when one comes to vote but is unable to walk up the stairs to the polling place.

## Tragedies Mar Weekend

Texas Highway Patrolman Gayle L. Holmes of Spur and King County Sheriff, Paul Vinson of Guthrie were shot and killed late Friday night when the two were summoned to Northcutt store and residence midway between Paducah and Guthrie, to answer a complaint that a number of men were drinking and causing a disturbance, officers said.

Patrolman Holmes, 26, was dead on arrival at Richards Memorial Hospital and Sheriff Vinson, about 35, was killed at the scene, according to reports.

A third officer, highway patrolman Leon Littlefield, was not hurt in the shooting.

Reports indicated the shooting broke out after the three officers were escorting a man

from the house to a patrol car when another man stepped onto the porch behind them and began firing with a high powered rifle.

Charged with both slayings was Jimmy Partido, a Guthrie resident.

Vinson was serving his second term as sheriff. Holmes had been a patrolman since 1969.

Other tragedies included the death of Jerry Ronald Kuehler, 14, of Rhineland who was pronounced dead at the scene following a bicycle-car accident on FM 267 near Rhineland Friday night about 9:25.

Mark Kuehler, 11, of Rhineland was reported in satisfactory condition in the Knox County Hospital after receiving a broken leg.

Investigating Highway Patrolman Brian Williams of Knox City said the boys were traveling south about one-half mile north of Rhineland when their bicycles were in collision with a car driven by Ralph Don Adams of Rhineland, whose car was also traveling south.

The boys' parents are Mr. and Mrs. Larry Kuehler of Rhineland.

Funeral services were held Sunday at Rochester for Holmes and at Rhineland for Jerry Kuehler. Services were held Monday at Paducah for Vinson.

## Rites Held For Patrolman Killed In Line Of Duty

Funeral services were held for Gayle L. Holmes Sunday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock in the First Baptist Church at Rochester. Rev. Jackie Lee, pastor of the First Baptist Church of O'Brien, officiated.

Burial was in the Rochester Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge.

Gayle, 26, died Friday night, May 19, after being shot while answering a disturbance call at the Northcutt Store about midway between Guthrie and Paducah.

Born October 8, 1945, in Knox City, he graduated from Rochester High School. On February 26, 1966, he married Betty Ruth Henry in O'Brien. For the last three years he was stationed at Spur with the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Highway Patrolman Holmes was a member of the O'Brien Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, of Spur; one daughter, Shawna, of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Grady Holmes of O'Brien; three brothers, Lynn, Glenn Allen, and Devey Wesley, all of O'Brien; one sister, Donna of O'Brien; paternal grandmother, Mrs. Bertha Holmes of Rochester; and Lillie Oxford of O'Brien.

**Shop Lifting Occurs Here**

Several shop lifting incidents have been reported in Knox City during the past two or three months, according to local merchants.


