## Knox Vets Will Get \$186,000 If Patman Bill Passes

World War veterans in Knox county will receive a total of approximately \$186,000 if a bill now pending in congress authorizing the full payment immediately of Adjusted Service Certificates is enacted into a law, according to figures compiled by the veterans' administration and included recently in the congressional record.

Copies of the figures here have been received by The Herald from Wright Patman. Estimates of the amounts veterans in every county in the United States are contained in the list.

For the entire United States the amount would be \$2,200,000,000, for Texas the amount would be \$96,641,820.30, and last but not least the amount received by territory under the West Texas Chamber of Commerce would be \$28,000,000.

Estimates of total amounts which would be received in some of the counties adjacent to Knox are: Baylor, \$121,000; Cottle, \$154,000; Foard, \$103,000; Haskell, \$273,000; King, \$19,000; Throckmorton, \$86,000; Stonewall, \$93,000.

**GOD IN CREATION**  
 Genesis 1:1-6; 24-31

Before we can consider an act in time the fact of an adequate cause must be established. The Omnipotent God is that fact. He is self-existent. One. A recently issued book entitled **THE DISCOVERY OF GOD**, by James H. Esweden, is most practical and deals with the absolute fact on the basis of science, philosophy and religion. It is very readable for such a profound subject. A comprehensive statement is found in Dummelow's "ONE VOLUME COMMENTARY: The scientific account of creation is written in the first chapter of Genesis in letters shall that all can read. Both accounts are from God and should be received accordingly. Get all you can from geology and astronomy. In fact there is no conflict between science and religion. In the end you must accept God as the first Cause and declare as in Genesis 1-1, "God created the heavens and the earth."

Now get the very last word about the order of development of nature as presented by the scientist and you will find that the same order of detail is given in Genesis. Ages of time are indicated by the student of nature but God records the process in just a sentence: "And God said, let there be light, and there was light." In time the earth, just a small bit of the universe, came into its present form. The sea and the dry land were given their appropriate life and birds flew in the air.

The supreme act in creation was man. "In our image, after our likeness" is part of the portraiture. Compare him with the animal life and a marvellous difference is noted, for man is a reasoning soul. This was effected by another and independent creative act on the part of Jehovah.

**CONGRESS OF PARENT TEACHERS MEET IN QUANAH ON APRIL 12 AND 13**

**CROWELL, Texas, March 30**—Plans are complete for the 1932 conference of the 13th district of Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers which will convene in Quanah on April 12 and 13. This conference with Mrs. R. L. Kincaid, district president in charge, will be held in the Methodist church of Quanah.

The theme "The Challenge of Children's Character" as a subject, thought a program will be which is meant to be inspiring, educational and entertaining.

Parent education in the National Congress of Parents and Teachers is one of its first objectives. **IN LITTLE OLD NEW YORK**

Nearly 350,000 men and women in New York work underground. This includes men who work on the subway trains, platforms and ticket offices; those building in New York have as many as six floors below the street level and on some of these floors are shops of various kinds.

The Cities Service Building in New York is the first building in this city to have double-deck two-story elevators, which take on and discharge passengers on two floors at once. And they are absolutely safe.

The Empire State Building here when entirely rented will house 25,000 tenants. The building consists of 34 floors of offices, 14 floors in tower, 180 sub-basement floors 192 floors in all is 1,250 feet high and was constructed at a cost of \$65,000,000. Window washers never get through washing the 6,000 windows in the building. They work from the top down and when the first floor is reached they are ready to start over again.

The Waldorf-Astoria hotel has a radio in every room and is wired for television. Through the center of the building is a private driveway 90 feet wide by 200 feet long.

The largest hotel in the east is in Brooklyn. It is the St. George hotel and has 2,632 guest rooms.

The Equitable Building in New York, better known as 120 Broadway, houses 16,000 persons.

The other day an Italian "bought" the information stand in the Grand Central Station for a fruit stand. The "sale" was discovered when the poor man tried to back a post-cart full of bananas into the station.

More than 400,000 Italians live in New York. The city has a Negro population of nearly 300,000.

There are more than 4,000 push cart peddlers in the city.

New York mails 70,000,000 letters every 24 hours.

There are 250,000 dogs in New York and despite the automobile nearly 23,000 horses.

New Yorkers love to ride a taxi. It is known that taxi fares in New York total a half billion dollars a day. Surely a curious city.
