Fire completely destroyed the frame range on South Pirat street Wednesday night，with the excep． tion of the Commercial Hotel and a small brick building occupied by the Home Telephone Company．
Considerable damage was done to the walls of the telephone building and the telephone cabie was pat out of commission．
The loss is placed at 820.000 with insurance on the telephone building and Boydatun warehouse，which a comple loss with its contents．
The buildings destroyed were owned by B．L．Boydstun，Mre．Y Hampton．

## A MODERN MIRACLE

Is The Proper Title For This
Story，Which Seems Al－ most Unbelievable．
That there are modero miracles is undoubtediy proven in the miracu－ lous escape of Mr．and Mrs．N．W． Smartt and their tive children last sunday evening at near 7 o＇clock when the car Mr．Smartt was driving reached Brushy Creek，four miles north of Cottonwood，suddenily dove down an embankment into the creek below，a distance of something like twenty feet，striking on its nose in the oozy sand and mud．
For a moment it stood thus and then the rear suddenly pitched for． beneath he car，Mr．Sern hag beneath the car，Mr．Smartt being
caught in such a manner that he was pushed down into the mud and water and would have been smothered to death but for his timely rescue by Tom Stipper，who lives a short dis－ tance away，and was attracted to acene by the screams of the four chilaren who occupied the back seat of the car and escaped with only ailght bruises．Mr．Smartt，his wife and baby，who occupied the front seat，were thrown through the wind－ shield，and both Mr．and Mrs．Smartt were severely hurt，Mr．receiving a severe cut below the right knee and bruised about the neck was badly ders and her ear was nearly torn off The baby was not so badly hart，but was atunned and for time it was thought to be dead
The family dog，which wiss in the back of the car with the children， when they plaged off the embank－ ment，was uninjured，but got a scare that will last him a lifetime， and when released from under the car，he gave a yelp and hot－tooted for the Smartt home near Admiral， where he was found shortly after－ wards howling at the top of his lungs． Dr．A．R．Hays accompanied by C．B．Holmes，responed to the S．O． S．call and the former assisted by the latter dressed the wounds of the injured ones．

## KILL THE GRASSHOPPERS.

Devastation of the grasshopper pest last year cost this county many great hordes of grasehoppers were upon them, valiant efforte were made to check them, and had it not been for the unceasing and effective work of poisoning and hording, mach of the black
Reports from the State Fato mologist discloses a wonderful im provements in the grasshopper situation since January of this year, at which tume, 90 per cent of the gga were in a hatchable condition, which would mean that literal again destroyed our crops. Fortunately, however weather condition
and parasites have, since that time reduced the per cent of hatchable ggs about 80 per cent. At the same time the number of egge lai ast fall is sufficient to cause serious infestation this season, if
only a swall number hateth. Favor able conditions for hatching will be occasional warm rains with interven ing hot days, and if added to this there should be a drouth in early summer, conditions will be maeh the same as last summer. Hatching may be expected immadiately if warm westher occurs, and the small hoppers will be found in spots in pasture lands, slong grasy fence rows, or in grass along ereeks. The attention of Callaban Conat farmers is cslled to the fact that a government foree is maintained to combst these and other crop pest and their service is ours for the ask ing. Let us report the first signs of grasshoppers this seassan in order get an even start with them. To
this end all persons who may dis. cover grasshoppers in any consider able number are urged to commun cate with me at once and we will take the situation in hand in effort to control them.
