





### **On The Home Front**

NO SUGAR PROFITEERING

Public opinion should be brought to bear on sugar profiteers. That is the advice of Max L. Mc-Cullough of Dallas, the regional director of OPA.

Consumers who find sugar prices at retail stores much more than one cent higher on a five-pound bag than they were the first week of December last year should pro test to the storekeeper, Mr. Mc-Cullough says.

"Maximum retail prices will have to be set on sugar unless prices are voluntairly kept in bounds," he explained, "but until that action is taken, the force of public opinion should be brought to bear There is, in general, no justification for a retail advance of more than one cent per five pounds, except in a few localities where other adjustments apply. Any increase much greater than that is profiteering, pure and simple."

He added that the rationing will come again when we get a OPA, and there will be a fair plan will be instituted shortly by sharing of supplies for everyone. In the meantime, he added, scarcity is absolutely no justification for price increases. Mr. McCullough warned that



Here is one menu she has pre-pared that is a far cry from the run-of-the-mill family meal.

LEMON MILK SHERBET 1 envelope plain, unflavored gela-tin (1 tbsp.)

4 c. milk 4 c. milk ½ tsp. salt 1½ c. granulated sugar ¾ c. lemon juice 1 tsp. grated lemon rind

1 tsp. grated lemon rind Soak gelatin in ½ c. of the milk in a bowl for 5 min. Then set bowl over boiling water, and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Combine rest of ingredi-ents with remaining 3½ c. milk. Stir in relatin. Turn into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator, and with temperature control at coldest set-ting, freeze, until set, without stir-ring. Serves 5 or 6.

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


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
