\$483,494.58 SECURED FOR HIGHWAY 16

COUNTY TAX RATE CUT **TEN PER CENT FOR YEAR**

At a recent meeting of the Knox County Commissioner's court the tax rate for the year 1938 was set at 85 cents. This is a reeduction of 10 cents from the 1937 rate. The road bond rate for the Knox City precinct was set at 15 cents, a reduction of 5 cents from the rate of last year. Precinct No. 4 gets a reduction of road bond tax of a cents. Precinct No. 2 is given a 10 cent rate for read bond pur poses, while Precinct No. 3 has no road bonds.

The new tax rate gives the Knox City precinct quite a saving in tax payments. The greatest reduction in recent years is shown in the road tax. In 1984 this precinct had a road bond tax of 60 cents, while the 1938 rate for this purpose will be 15 cents.

SENATOR GRADY WOODRUFF

Senator Grady Woodruff of the Decatur district is up again for re-election and has three opponents and a hot campaigh is underway in that district. While this editor is not a resident of that district any more we resided there for fouricen years and had occasion to watch Senator Woodrull and worked four months in the Senate during the regular session of the legislature last vear.

There is no question about the standing and ability of the Decatur Senator, as he was considered one of the outstanding senators in that body. ne was aiwa; s championing the cause of the common ; ecple and little business man, tarmer and stockman. He is the author of the anti-race horse bill and waged a fight almost single handed for more than thirty days for i's repeal. He was chairman of the Educational committee and secured the passage for all the appropriations for all the state schools and colleges. During the last called session of the legislature Senator Woodruff single handed defeated the Morse bill which permitted the sale of whiskey by he drink, after it had passed the House of Representatives. For two days and nights he spoke on this bill and finally killed it by a filibuster. We are not trying to dictate to the voters of that district whom they should support for State Senator but we do know that the majority of the gamblers and whiskey drinkers are opposed to him for he never votes for any bill that favors theri.

Last week a radio across the street was broadcasting a speech of Pressaent Roosevelt, who was talking in his most alluring manner. Yet, so far as we could see, there were but three listeners, and they did not stay on the job long. It seems that American people are getting fed up on political speeches, whether under the guise of opening a bridge, dedicating a dam, or what have you.
