## Local Youths in Austin to Attend Legion Boys State

In Austin this week to attend "Boys State" at the University of Texas are Dwayne McNulty and Bill Bolin.

The objective of Boys State, which is sponsored by the American Legion of Texas, is to educate youth in the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities of American citizenship.

The local boys are sponsored by the Teague-Carpenter Post of the American Legion and by the Knox City Lions Club. They were selected for the trip because of their scholarship, character, ambition, leadership ability, and the ability to get along with their fellow students.

The Boys State program originated in Illinois in 1934. It has been adopted by the National Organization of the American Legion and is now in operation in 45 states.

Over 500 boys are in attendance at the Texas Boys State. All are high school juniors. Registration began Sunday at 9 a. m. at Roberts Hall on the University campus.

Each "citizen" was assigned to one of two political parties when he registered. The state is divided into counties, precincts, judicial districts, cities, villages and rural communities in order to give concrete instruction in the different types of governments. The boys organize their own city, county and state governments. They choose their own officials in accordance with regular election procedures. They learn the duties of the various officers, from the precinct to state level, and argue their own bills in the Legislature.

Citizens of Boys State will be dismissed at 9 a. m. Saturday, June 16. Dwayne and Bill will give reports to their sponsors at a later date.

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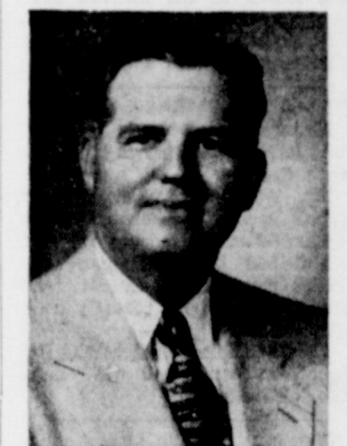
## World's First Bale Of 1956 Cotton Is Northern Star

S. N. Reed, manager of Northern Star Seed Farms, learned by telegram Saturday that the world's first bale of 1956 cotton, ginned by the Hidalgo Gin Co. of McAllen Saturday, was grown from Northern Star No. 11 planting seed.

The bale was produced by A. Bingham of Mission and his partner, Bill Burke. The bale arrived in Harlingen at 4:23 p. m., a few minutes ahead of a second bale grown by Ray Barwick of Mission. The first bale reaching Harlingen each year receives a substantial cash prize.

The premium bale, which was picked from 30 acres, ginned out 475 pounds from 1400 pounds of seed cotton.

## Darrow in Charge of Lone Star Distribution



Joe C. Darrow, a Lone Star Gas Company vice president, has been placed in charge of all distribution properties of the company, according to an announcement by Chester L. May of Dallas, senior vice president. The properties consist of company-owned and operated gas systems in Knox City and 450 other cities and towns in Texas and Oklahoma, May said.

With headquarters in Dallas, Darrow takes over his new assignment June 16 after serving as general manager of the Fort Worth Division of Distribution from 1951 until January, 1954, and as vice president in charge of the division since that date.

Darrow, a native of Milford, Texas, attended the University of Texas and went to work for Lone Star in 1927 as a construction timekeeper. He was appointed local manager at Hugo, Okla., in 1932, then held district managerial assignments at Rasca, Terrell, and Brownwood until 1946 when he was appointed superintendent of distribution operations for the Dallas Division of Distribution. He was transferred to Abilene in 1949 as superintendent of Lone Star's West Texas distribution properties. Two years later he was appointed to the Ft. Worth division as general manager.

## Potential Completed On Tankersley Well

Potential has been completed at the W.W.F. Oil Corp. of Lafayette, La., No. 1 Roy Tankersley, Section 195, Block 45, H&TC Survey.

The new Haskell County oiler is four miles southeast of O'Brien, and 3,500 feet north of the East O'Brien Strawn field.

Daily potential was 93.45 barrels of oil flowing through a 12-64 inch choke with packer set on the casing and 110 pounds tubing pressure. The well is producing from 30 perforations at 4824-30 feet opposite the Strawn sand.

## Wheat Quota Vote Is Set for July 20th

Marketing quotas for the 1957 wheat crop have been proclaimed by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson, H. H. Partridge, chairman of the Knox County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminds farmers.

"This proclamation does not automatically put quotas into effect for the crop," the chairman said. "The announcement also set July 20 as the date for a referendum when wheat growers who are affected by the quotas will vote on whether or not to put the quo-

tas into operation. A two-thirds vote favoring the quotas is necessary if the quotas are to be in effect."

Growers who are affected by the quotas, and therefore are eligible to vote in the referendum, are those farmers who will harvest more than 15 acres of wheat as grain in 1957.

In his proclamation, Secretary Benson said: "This marks the fourth consecutive year that abnormally large wheat supplies have required the proclamation of marketing quotas for the next wheat crop. It is the third successive year for which the national acreage allotment has had to be set at 55 million acres, the minimum specified by law."

"All the wheat we are likely to need from 1957 production, determined according to the formula in the legislation, could be produced on an acreage of about 12.4 million acres. If it were not for the legal 'minimum', the national allotment could have dropped to that level."

"The plain fact is that, in spite of valiant attempts to channel more wheat into exports, we still will have enough wheat for the marketing year beginning July 1, 1956 to take care of all our domestic and export needs for more than two full years. The carryover, again, will exceed a billion bushels. While we are hopeful about holding down the carryover into 1957-58, wheat continues as one of the most serious problems in the whole farm economy."

"This situation points up the need for the Soil Bank," Benson concluded, "which farmers can use to bring about additional adjustments in production without further reducing their incomes."
