

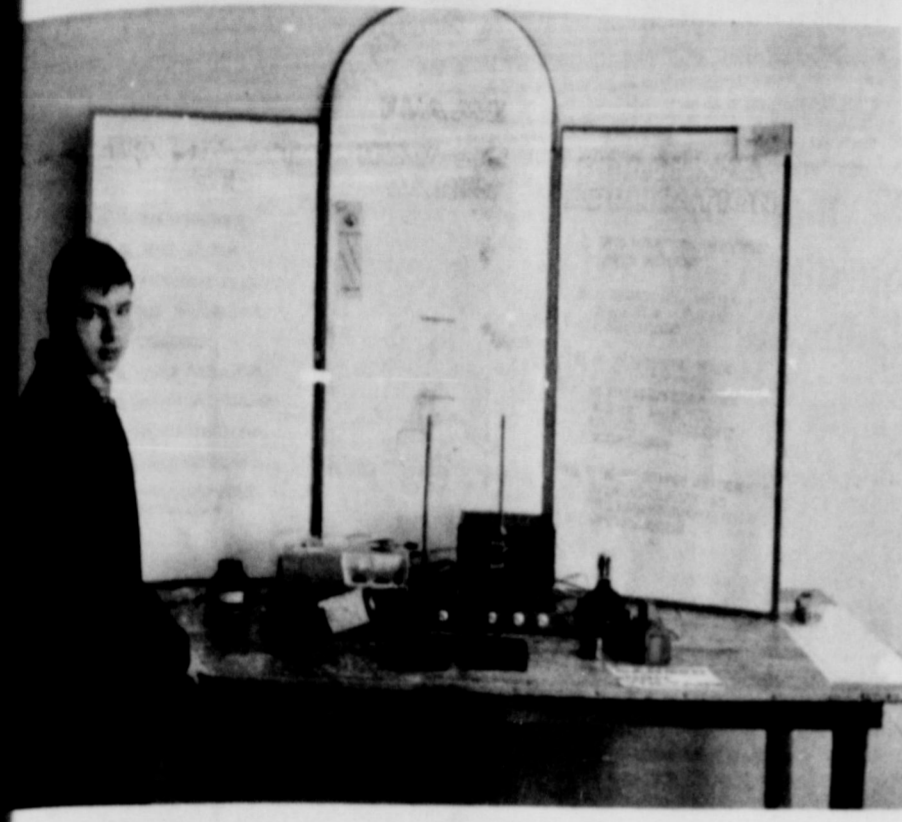

needs of families with dependent children will have dropped by May 1 to about 50 percent.

With removal of maximum grants in the AFDC program, a new method of grant control will be applied. The family budget will determine total recognizable needs. The percentage factor then will be applied, reflecting the extent to which money is available to meet those needs.

As the AFDC caseload increases with no additional state money available, the percentage factor will drop. If more funds become available, the percentage will rise.

Studies by the department show that the family which must depend solely upon AFDC grants, those with no income at all, will fare better under the new system. Many families with income would not fare as well; however, they would have as much money to live on as the family without income.

On the other hand, the new system includes provisions to encourage AFDC recipients to work, through certain exemptions on earned income and credit for work-related expenses.

The reduction last fall in AFDC grants resulted from increases in the number of families on the rolls and the failure of Texas voters in November to approve a constitutional amendment raising the state's total welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million annually.

The constitutional ceiling on assistance payments limits all four programs — for the elderly, the blind, and the disabled as well as for dependent children.

An increase in the ceiling or its removal — would enable the department to receive more federal matching funds for its assistance programs.

Deadline Nears For Inspection Of '69 Vehicles

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today reminded motorists that only one month remains before the 1969 motor vehicle inspection deadline.

To date, an estimated 2.8 million vehicles have received the inspection required by state law. The Department of Public Safety said some 3.2 million additional vehicles remain to be inspected prior to midnight, April 15.

Speir said 42.2 percent of the vehicles inspected so far required mechanical adjustments prior to issuance of an inspection sticker. The defect found most often has been misalignment of headlights.

The Department of Public Safety urged motorists to get the inspection soon to avoid long lines which will develop at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

Texas has 5,466 licensed inspection stations. The required inspection fee is \$1.75.

Seymour Girl Speaks To Local Lions Club

The Knox City Lions were entertained Wednesday, March 12, when a senior student of Seymour High School, Susu Elliston, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Elliston, related her experiences of last summer as an exchange student in Europe.

Susu had been somewhat concerned about the food in Europe and whether or not she might find it desirable. She noted that at the end of her first month in Europe, she had gained five pounds. That first month was spent in Sweden in the home of a large family, the Lindbergs. Mr. Lindberg operated a grocery store, the only regular store of any kind in the small Swedish town.

She learned that the school system was vastly different from the American way, and students are required to learn a foreign language. They study English for six years, beginning with the 4th grade level. Susu found that conversing with the teenagers of Sweden presented no problem at all.

Following her stay with the Lindberg family and before returning to America, she joined a group of American students and enjoyed a guided tour of Germany, Switzerland, Belgium, France and other countries of Central Europe and England.

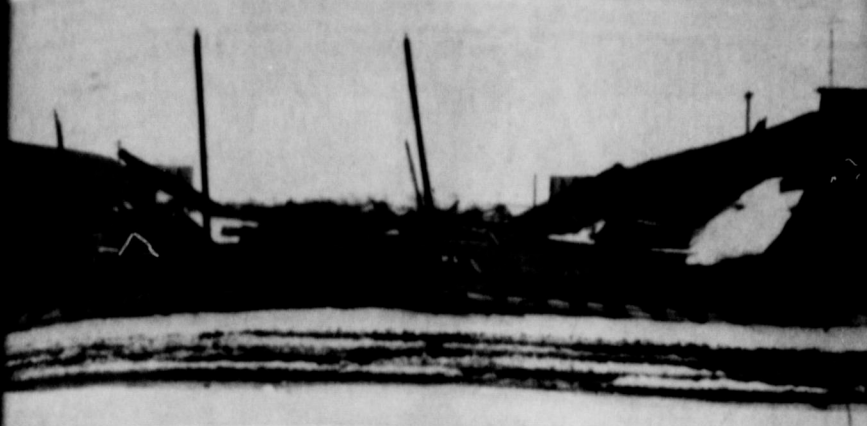

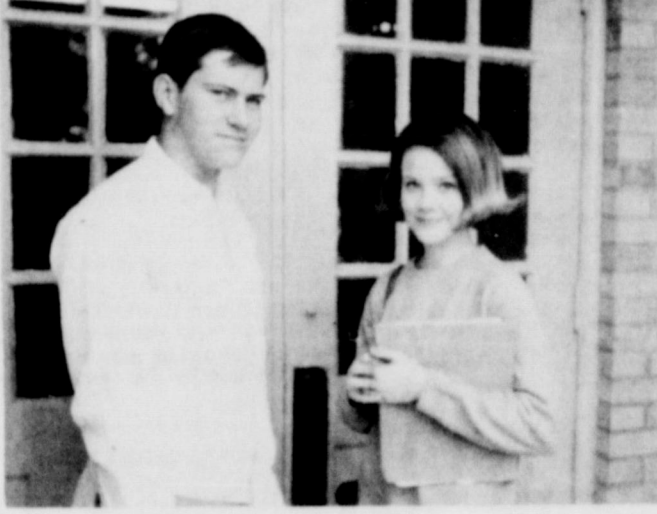

TDPS States Breathalyzer Proves Useful

The Breathalyzer, a portable instrument used for determining the alcohol content of the blood by a simple "breath test," which was put into operation November, 1968, over the state of Texas is proving to be quite useful in the Northwest Texas area, announced Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety for this Region.
 During the months of November and December of 1968, there were 1164 suspected drinking drivers who took various types of tests to determine the amount of alcohol in their blood. Of this number 957 or 82% took the Breathalyzer test as compared to 207 or 18% who took other types of tests.
 Major Bell stated that the Breathalyzer not only will help in convicting a drunken driver, but assists in absolving a person who appears intoxicated, but may actually be suffering from epilepsy, a heart attack, an overdose of insulin, or many other pathological conditions.
 The magnitude of the problem is reflected in studies conducted by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Based on a ten-year traffic death toll of 27,000 in Texas, the use of alcohol may have accounted for about 50% of these fatalities.
 Bell stated, "It is hoped that the use of the Breathalyzer will hit hard at the problem and help reduce the traffic deaths in Texas."

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th. Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BENJAMIN:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Benjamin, Texas on the 5th. day of April, 1969, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."
 "AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said city, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to wit:

Polling Place, City Hall, Benjamin, Texas.

Presiding Officers, Mrs. Clodell Duke, Presiding Judge and Pat Barton, Alternate Presiding Judge.

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two (2) Clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Benjamin, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th. Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the require-

tion within the City of Benjamin, Texas.

Section 7. If any part of this ordinance or any requirement thereunder shall be held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of any other part or other requirement herein.

Section 8. It is deemed as imperative and public necessity that this ordinance be passed upon its first reading, and it is declared an emergency ordinance, and is MADE, PASSED AND ENTERED AS HEREIN ORDAINED by the unanimous vote of the City Council of the City of Benjamin at a regular meeting, all members being present except one, on this the 6th. day of February, A. D. 1969, and shall take effect immediately upon its passage and publication.

FARM PROGRAMS AND TAXES DISCUSSED AT MANAGEMENT MEETING
 Norman Brints, Area Extension Farm Management Specialist, discussed Farm Programs and Record Keeping Income Tax Purposes at management meeting of the Chamber of Commerce in Munday, March 11.

Producers were asked to look at the alternative of deciding the percent of the crop to plant, such as corn or feed grain. In case of a marketing agreement, some farmers who have sandy soil may want to consider for harvest on part of the land. To be considered, the possibility of income greater by planting corn diverted acres even though voluntary diversion rate will be reduced.

A contract price has been offered for number one producers who have not yet wanted to check and see if contract offer is still available.

Mr. Brints stressed the importance of proper records and of a conference with your lawyer ever makes out the best report in order to obtain this extra effort will in income tax savings.

In case of cow and calf records should be clear of the income received from the breeding herd to use the capital gain procedure.

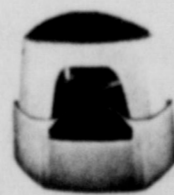
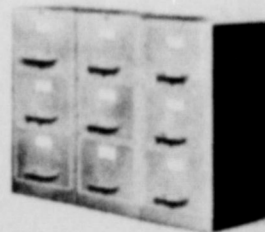
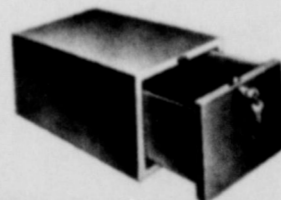

Lieb Reports On "Gully Plug" Used Recently By The SCS

KNOX CITY—Mr. V. G. Lambeth operates the Fred H. Harlan farm north of Goree and has recently solved a serious erosion problem on his farm.

According to Arche Lieb, district conservationist, the problem was solved by use of the "gully plug" or grade stabilization structure as the Soil Conservation Service calls it.

Heavy spring and summer rains in 1967 caused flooding in areas of Knox County and many farms were damaged. The Harlan farm was no exception. Runoff water from surrounding farms washed a gully some 200 feet long and 50 feet wide across a strip of rangeland and into a 70 acre field of valuable irrigated cropland. Harlan applied for assistance through his Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District. Lieb, assisting the District at Knox City, helped Harlan prepare a complete soil and water conservation plan for the farm. The long range plan called for a set of parallel terraces on the dry cropland and a grade stabilization structure to stop the gully along with other management practices. Shortly after the plan was completed Lambeth applied for cost-sharing assistance under provisions of the Great Plains Conservation Program. The plan was accepted and Lambeth entered into a contract with the Department of Agriculture to carry out the plan.

Harry Smith, Agricultural Engineer assigned to assist the Knox City Unit, designed the grade stabilization structure according to Lambeth's conservation plan. The design called for a 30 inch drawn down hood inlet pipe with earth fill. The earth structure will catch and hold the runoff water while the pipe lowers it safely to a stable grade below the structure. The structure was completed during June of 1968 and the gully was stopped before it could cause additional damage to the farm.

Applying for assistance through his Soil and Water Conservation District, Lambeth received technical help from the Soil Conservation Service and 70% cost-share assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program.
