

WHAT DOES KC NEED

What does Knox City need to make it grow, be a better place to live?

This is the question asked by the Herald this week in an informal telephone survey taken at random to gather some opinions of local citizens on the needs of the town.

The most frequent answer was industry, but other ideas from area residents differed.

Here are some of the answers to this question: Milton Bradberry--"Just more people--that's what I say. So many have been leaving Knox City in the last few years. They've got to have work."

Mrs. John McCown--"I know we surely need more for the youth to do, but I don't know what would be the best to put in here for them. But they do need more activities."

Mrs. Jessie McCord--"When I think of things that might help Knox City, I think of the youth first. I think Knox City should have a Public Library if at all possible. Another thing would be to try to attract industry to make more employment."

Mrs. Clyde Bouldin--"I wish some of the stores would stock more of a variety of merchandise, so it wouldn't be necessary for people to go out of town for some things."

N. H. Mansfield--"A canning factory for vegetables is what we need. If we had one, we could get more people interested, employ more people and grow more crops."

Mrs. D. H. Henry--"Anything that's good."

Mrs. O. A. Green--"I think for one thing that zoning would be a good thing. We have about two houses in each block. It's kind of late to start on this kind of thing. I think about the homes and neighborhoods more than anything. Zoning would be a good idea to help keep all of these up."

Mrs. J. C. Eaton--"I'd sure like to see them get a garment factory. I'd like to see us get more red lights, one at the corner of the bank and post office would benefit a lot of people."

Mrs. J. O. Corley--"I believe that if we had something that people could work at we'd draw more people--like some kind of factory or something like that. We might get a sewing factory for the ladies to work."

Ottis Cash--"We'd like to have some industry, but I don't know how we'll go about that."

Mrs. Martie Rodriguez--"We're fixing to move to Hobbs, N. M., but we sure would like to see more work around here. We sure do like it here."

A. L. Conger--"I can't think of anything. I think it's a pretty nice town just like this."

R. P. Barnard, Jr.--"I think it would help keep the town cleaner to put trash barrels at the turning-around points on the highways for people to dispose of their litter. If we had some 2' pipe for metal racks, barrels could be located near the Jiffy Burger on the southern edge, the L. V. Worley area on the eastern edge, and near the John A. Smith place on the northern edge of town. It might be that some of the oil companies would donate the barrels, and these could be replaced as needed."

A. W. McBeath--"I'd like to see the town go on. I think if the government would let the farmers alone, they would be better off. I haven't kept up with it the last 10 or 12 years, but this was always pretty good farming country."

Mrs. Martin Smith--"Something that we've talked about in study club that Knox City needs is to clean off the vacant lots. When they are grown up, lots sure are bad for the looks of our city. They're a health menace, and they discourage strangers driving around looking for homes. I don't know who should do it, but something should be done."

Mrs. Salem Hutchinson--"I guess we need a lot of things, but I just couldn't tell you what."

Jesse Moss--"We need some kind of factory for women and men to work and make things. I think a shirt factory might work."

Guy Henderson--"We've been getting along pretty good, but there could be some changes made that would do good. Anything that the town suggests and puts over, I'm confident that it would be for the good, and I would support it."

SCS District Reports On Year's Work

During their regular meeting in December the Wichita Brazos District Supervisors reviewed their annual report of 1965.

According to Jack Idol, chairman of the board, work completed during the year was outstanding and good progress was made; however much conservation work remains to be done in the district in the years ahead.

Arche Lieb, Soil Conservation Service Work Unit Conservationist at Knox City reported the following accomplishments for the year. Seventy-one conservation plans were prepared on 18,335 acres. Sixty-two conservation plans were revised on 52,902 acres. Practices were applied on 432 farms. Assistance was given 1,452 times to farmers and ranchers in the District. Thirteen Great Plains Conservation Program contracts were certified on 5,101 acres. As of July 1, 1965 99 GPCP contracts were in effect on 96,150 acres in the District.

The Supervisors feel the GPCP will continue to be important in getting conservation applied on the land in the years ahead. They will continue to provide leadership in this program in the District.

Brush control was applied on 4,446 acres; 195,647 ft of terraces and 6,426 ft of diversion terraces were completed. Land leveling was completed on 335 acres and 27,430 ft of irrigation pipelines were installed. Grassed waterways were installed on 116 acres.

Range seeding was applied on 500 acres and pasture planting on 409 acres. Conservation cropping systems were reported on 54,556 acres and cover cropping on 5,547.

Jack Idol concluded by stating the supervisors of the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District wish to express their appreciation to all groups, individuals and agencies who helped make 1965 an outstanding year of progress in the District. The supervisors feel the best way to accomplish the conservation objective is by the combined efforts of all groups, agencies and individuals assisting the District.

Supervisors of the District are: Jack Idol, chairman, Benjamin; L. D. Offutt, Munday; H. W. Smith, Weinert; Emil Navratil, Gilliland; and W. L. Ballard, Rochester.

Show And Tell

On a certain day in some classes and just anytime in others, students bring something to school to "show" to their classmates and stand up in front of the room and "tell" them about it.

"It's a way of sharing something that's happened to them," explained third grade teacher Mrs. Kenneth Halbert. She said that students bring things from home, toys, collections, World War I relics, bugs, old-fashioned churns, foreign words or even "becoming an aunt" to show and tell classmates. The teacher stated all of her students participate, and they feel left out if they don't have something to show.

This is a program which has just grown up through the years from students loving to bring things to school, said Mrs. Mary Jo Lankford, principal, but only in the last few years has this source of enthusiasm been apped. "Show and Tell" enables students to learn new things she added, and also gives students subtle training in public speaking.

Dimes March Set For January 31

The annual "Mother's March" to climax the March of Dimes campaign for this year will be held Jan. 31, Mrs. Doyle Graham, chairman of the Knox County National Foundation, announced Tuesday.

Mrs. Graham said that Mrs. John Grindstaff Jr. will serve as chairman of the "Mothers' March" in Knox City, sponsored by the 1946 Study Club. The march will be held on Jan. 31 in communities throughout the Wichita Falls District. Mrs. Graham added that chairman for various other parts of the drive are now being contacted.

The National Foundation's March of Dimes Drive is held annually in January throughout the nation.

"The National Foundation now is primarily interested in fighting birth defects since the dreaded polio is now conquered," Mrs. Graham said. "The year 1965 produced new evidence of the magnitude of birth defects as the cause of the second largest number of deaths in this country.

"In clinical medicine, the expanding network of March of Dimes Birth Defect Centers across the country is having enormous impact in providing specialized treatment, not before available, and in changing patterns of pediatric practice. The number of centers financed with March of Dimes funds will jump to 69 as of Jan., 1966, compared to 51 a year ago."
