Mrs. Cain, State Chairman of Ju-
venile protection, spoke to the par-
ents of Knox City at the Baptist
church last Tuesday evening.

Mrs. Cain came to Knox City as a
representative of the Texas Congress
of Mothers and the Parent-Teacher
Association, an organization spring-
ing out of the need of better homes and
more love, care and protection of
children. Mrs. Cain stated that there
are too many children fed upon
the crumbs of parenthood where the
mother and father feed the entire
load to the public in either form of a
vacation or society.

A home is not an easy thing to
make, she further said! It takes the
love, the prayers the sacrifices and
all the good that there is in a man
and a woman to make a home. In
addition to working for good homes,
we must all work for better communi-
ties, suppress the evil and make
clear the path of youth.

The minds of boys and girls like
their bodies, can become helplessly
dwarfed, crippled and twisted by
immorality and delinquency. Parents
are either stepping stone or stumbling
blocks for their children and
Mrs. Cain earnestly urged the par-
ents of Knox City to become useful
stepping stones.

The services Tuesday evening was
opened by a scripture reading and
prayer led by Uncle Joe. Mrs. Cain's
address followed and was enlightening
to those attending Mrs. Cain's
message was one of appeal for bet-
ter homes as well as one filled with
information as to the reasons for
child delinquency.

SATURDAY ACCIDENTS ARE NUMEROUS

Duncan Boy Gets Leg Crushed

There were several car accidents
happening in Knox City Saturday af-
ternoon and evening, in which a
small boy and two larger boys re-
ceived minor injuries.

About 5:30 Saturday afternoon, a
Mexican, driving into the city made
a bobble in attempting to park his
car and ran upon the side walk, knock-
ing a nine year old boy down
and injuring one leg. The Mexican
has been working for Mr. Ben Fer-
mer some three or four years. Mr.
Farmer lives 6 or 7 miles west of
the city. The Mexican drove into
town and upon seeing a space in
which he could park, turned his
wheels in the space but failed to get
onto his brakes in time. The car
bumped upon the sidewalk in front
of the picture show. A small boy by
the name of Duncan was standing on
the sidewalk and was knocked down.
The force of the knock crushed the
bone in his right leg just above the
knee.

The Mexican accompanied the in-
jured boy with his parents to a doc-
tors office where the former made
attempts to pay for the accident.
No settlement was made however,
Mr. Duncan stating that the boy
was not badly hurt and that unless
his condition became worse, there
will be no settlement to make.

The Mexican was honest and deep-
ly concerned about the accident. He
was in a Dodge sedan and had two
companions.

The boy injured, with his parents
lives near Stamford.

Mr. White and Mr. Parr Collide

About nine o'clock Saturday night
Mr. Sam White and Mr. Parr Collid-
ed. Mr. White was driving a Dodge
Standard Six, in second gear going
south on main street. Mr. Parr, in a
Ford touring, was parked in town
and made a fast back turn. Mr.
White hit the rear of the ford and
ruined the front of his own car. The
Dodge had one fender torn off, a
bumper off, an axle bent and the
radiator cut in two. The repairs to
Mr. White's car will amount to about
\$60.00 while it is reported the
Ford was not hurt.

Saturday night is my unlucky time
in town, said Mr. White. If some one
doesn't run into me, they will stop
in front of me and I hit them, he
said. With the setting of the sun he
further said, I think I'll get home
on Saturday night.






