## Cancer Control Month Is Proclaimed Here

Mayor R. Kenneth Crownover today proclaimed April as Cancer Control Month in Knox City and urged support of the American Cancer Society's Crusade to fight cancer.

The educational and fund raising Cancer Crusade was launched April 8.

In signing the proclamation, the Mayor said, "Cancer is the common foe of every man, woman and child, and will strike 32,000 Texans this year.... An estimated five live here in Knox City."

The Mayor and ACS volunteers planted a non-bearing Mulberry tree to serve as a living reminder to all citizens of Knox City to daily demonstrate personal involvement and action to help in the conquest of cancer.

The proclamation and tree planting was initiated in Austin by Governor Dolph Briscoe and Texas Crusade Chairman, Attorney General John Hill to officially launch April as Cancer Control Month. Governor Briscoe and ACS Crusade Chairman Hill urged all citizens to "observe, participate and support the ACS's educational and fund

raising efforts" and stated that the tree they planted would serve as a living reminder of man's efforts to control cancer.

Participating in Cancer Control Month in Knox City will be volunteers of the American Cancer Society. ACS volunteers will visit homes throughout Knox City and distribute educational pamphlets with life-saving information.

## GED Tests Set April 19

General Educational Development Tests will be given in Rule High School Saturday, April 19, at 8:00 a.m.

Five tests will be given in English, Literature, Social Studies, Science and Mathematics.

If a person passes these five tests, the Texas Education Agency will issue a High School Equivalency Diploma. This diploma meets the educational requirement for employment as well as partial requirement for college entrance or job training schools.

A fee of \$15 is charged for all five tests and it takes about two hours for each test. A person must be eighteen (or at least 17 years old) and have been out of school one full calendar year. If a person is seventeen when the tests are taken, the diploma will not be issued until the person is eighteen.



The meeting, held at the Houston Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of the 66 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were about 500 persons in attendance.

George W. Cunningham, president, in his annual report to stockholders, reported that 1974 was another record year for new business with

\$269,000,000 in loans closed. This was the largest year in loan volume in the bank's 58-year history and also in 1974, the bank reached \$1 billion in loans outstanding. W. Malcolm Harding, governor of the Farm Credit Administration and Dr. James R. Gibbs, vice president and economist of the Texas Commerce Bank in Houston, also addressed stockholders and guests during the meeting.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term loans on farms and ranches throughout Texas and currently has 35,000 loans for more than \$1 billion outstanding.

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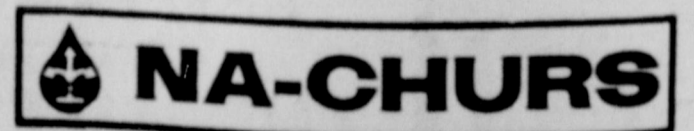
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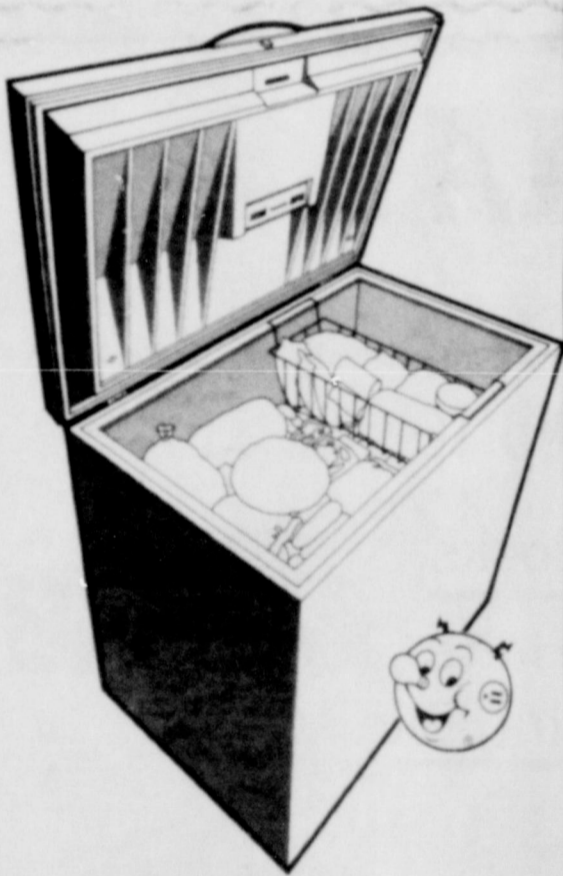
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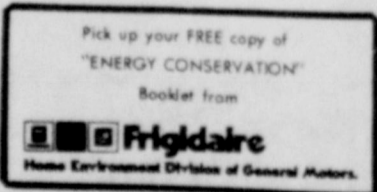

and up-to-date, a bride should give us her new married name," Mr. Beisner said. "Then earnings she had both before and after her marriage can be correctly credited to the same record."

A woman's work and earnings in jobs covered by social security builds retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for herself and her family.

A new bride can call, write, or visit any social security office to get her name changed on her record. "Or she can use a form available at any post office and many employer personnel offices," Mr. Beisner said.

Those who change their name because of divorce or for business or other reasons should also notify social security, he noted.

### Duplicate SS Cards Should Be Obtained

Lost your social security card? You can get a duplicate by notifying any social security office, and generally it can be handled by mail, according to Carl R. Beisner, claims representative, from the Vernon social security office.  
 "You can usually get a duplicate card faster if you've kept a record of your social security number and give it to us when you report your loss," Mr. Beisner said.  
 "Your duplicate card will have the same social security number on it," he said. "Your social security number is yours alone and remains the same for life."

A social security card is issued with two parts, perforated so the card itself -- the smaller part -- can be detached and carried in purse or wallet.  
 "The card you carry is the part you show to an employer to be sure he correctly copies your name and social security number into his records," Mr. Beisner said.  
 "The remaining larger part should be kept in a safe place as a permanent record of your social security number," he said.

People's earnings from jobs covered by social security are credited to their social security number to build retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for themselves and their families.  
 People should apply for a social security card several weeks before they need the number for a job, according to Mr. Beisner. Over 9 million duplicate social security cards were issued last year.  
 The Social Security Administration is an agency of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The Vernon social security office is at 1701 Cumberland. The mailing address is Box 1417, Vernon, Texas 76384.

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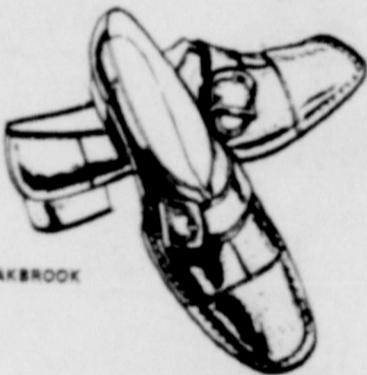

AUSTIN -- April 6-12 has been designated as Defensive Driving Week, announced the Texas Safety Association, and in the proclamation by Governor Dolph Briscoe, individual drivers are urged to help make Texas a safer place to live and drive.

In proclaiming the special week for Texas to coincide with National Defensive Driving Week, Governor Briscoe asked drivers for "maximum participation in driver improvement training."

"Traffic accidents take a terrible toll in human life, injury, and property damage throughout Texas, resulting in over 3,000 lives and over 120,000 injuries this past year," said the Governor's proclamation.

Defensive Driving Week was originated by the National Safety Council in 1972 to call drivers' attention to the magnitude of the traffic accident problem and to induce motorists to help solve the problem by improving their own driving. The National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course helps drivers better their performance behind the wheel, according to the Texas Safety Association. Drivers who complete the course are entitled to a 10% discount on auto insurance premiums, in addition to

becoming better drivers.

The Defensive Driving Course, says the Texas Safety Association, uses films and other visual teaching materials to train the average driver in the same crash avoidance techniques professional drivers use. The course is designed to teach drivers to recognize tip-offs to developing traffic accident situations and to take evasive action to prevent collisions.

There are about 500 Defensive Driving Course training agencies over Texas, according to the Texas Safety Association, and since the program began in the State, nearly 400,000 Texas motorists have become DDC graduates.

Driver who are interested in an auto insurance premium reduction and in being better drivers by becoming DDC graduates should contact their local DDC training agency or write the Texas Safety Association, Austin, for information.

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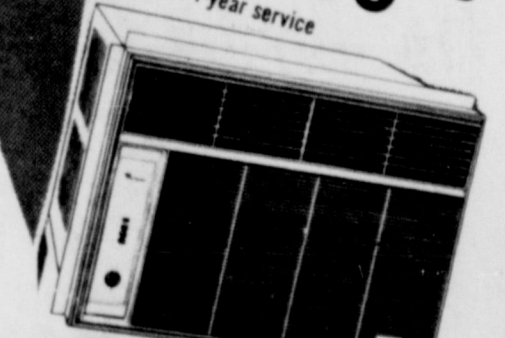

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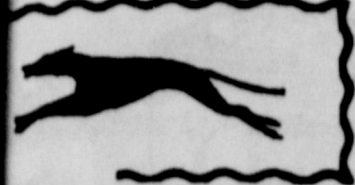

## Land, Grass Teams Compete

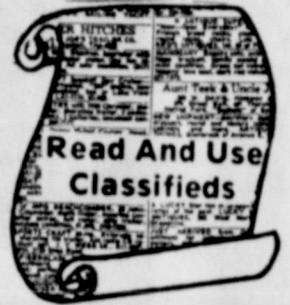
