R. O. Dunkle, County Agent, has ust received the following telegram from M. L. Wilson, National Director of Extension

"Minimum 1945 producer price of 27 cents per dozen for candled eggs announced for Tuesday moring papers by Administrator Jones. Price will be supported by purchases from dealers pon certification they in turn have paid producers no less than support

"In areas where marketing facilities for purchasing candled eggs from producers cannot be made available, produrer price will be 24 cents per dozen. In these areas WFA will stand ready to purchase eggs from farmers at 24 cents per dozen straight run. Purchasing agents to be designated in all areas prior to beginning of heavy egg production. WFA hopes candling facilities can be provided all areas, to avoid storage and transportation difficulties, WFA 1945 purchases will be on basis

"To cover all sections of country. purchases of dried and frozen eggs o be correlated with purchases of hell eggs for support price purposes.

"WFA will have need for substantial quantities of high grade eggs for export and armed forces. Domestic emand for graded eggs and demand of governmental agencies expected to maintain usual grade differentials in price. Notify extension editor comelete story being air mailed or special







Among the novelties may be seen an Eskimo raincoat made out of seal gut and sewed with grass thread; seal and walrus skin gloves; women's dress boots; walrus hide shoes; black rawhide boots; scrapers; wooden combs; spear heads; a jade adze; hide knife and soap-stone lamp, all from Point Barrow, Alaska.

In another case is an ivory knife for skinning seal, models of boats. and sleighs made ot of ivory, a cribbage board, seal skin bags, Eskimo dolls dressed in fur, a seal harpoon and an Eskimo fan with wooden center surrounded by fringe of white reindeer hair and used by girls when

Other articles are a boy's cap made of 12 squirls tails mixed with mink and trimmed with beads, a reindeer horn, walrus tusks, a grass rug with designs in seal stitched on with lin en thread and edged with muskrat, an Eskimo wolf dancing hat, a grass basket, scoops and hats made of driftwood, food bowsl made by heating driftwood and bending it to the desired shape, and seal skin rugs trimmed around the edge with fur from the bellies of muskrats.

ne United States and other nations FARM MACHINERY BEHIND elating to any phase of the petroeum industry be submitted to the ne time, was contained in a joint tatement issued by Grady Vaugn, of Dallas, and Glenn H. McCarthy, of fouston, co-chairman of the State-Committee of Oil Operators. 'he Statewide Committee has waged vigorous campaign against ratifiation of the Anglo-American Petro-

The joint statement came upon the eels of a report from Washington to withdraw the Anglo-American Petroleum Agreement from the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Senator Tom Connally, of Texas, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relation ! Committee, has said that so many protests against the Agreement have been received by members of tha committee that there is little liklihood that his committee would even con-

Reports from Washington indicate the the Administration will attempt to revise the objectionable features of the Agreement before asking the Senate for ratification.

A substitute treaty has been drafted by the P. I. W. C. This substitute treaty creates an international oil commission with advisory powers only. The Anglo-American Petroleum Agreement proposes to set up an international oil commission with life and death powers over the petroleum resources of the United States.

The oil industry, school officials, public officials and civic groups see in the Anglo-American Petroleum Treaty a threat to the economic life of Texas. A large portion of the state's revenue is derived from taxalevied on the petroleum industry. Under the provisions of the Anglo-American treaty this revenue could be cut off by the international commission simply by placing Texas oil resources in an international peteum pool and regulation of the oil industry from a foreign capital.

The Statewide Committee belives that further attempts will be made to put the Texas oil industry into some sort of an international cartef and the Committee's request that all such treaties and agreements be submitted to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee at one time so that they can be disposed of at one open

Agreement was submitted to the Senate for ratification without the con tents being made public. Only after the Agreement was sent to the Foreigns Relations Committee did the oil industry and the people of Texas know just what the Agreement proposed to do with the oil resources of Texas and other producing states.

The joint statement said Speaking for the Statewide Comnittee of Oil Operators, is is our sinere belief that all proposed treaties between the Unitel States and other nations relating to any phase of the petroleum industry and the sale of ts products, should be submitted to oreigns Relation Committee of the United States Senate so that full and omplete hearings can be had in order that the industry and all interested parties will be allowed full and

Most medicine finds itself into the home though a doctor's prescription for some specific illness. For the sake of safety, left-over medicines should be destroyed immediately after they have fulfilled their purpose and never stored in the medicine cabinet for future unprescribed use in case of another illness, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Offi-

"Self-medication with the use of left-over drugs which were of great benefit to some previous illness can cometimes turn a simple ailment into very serious condition of actual polsoning," Dr. Cox said. "This is particularly true of the indiscriminate se of sulfa drugs which have been prescribed for some previous specific ondition."

Retaining in the medicine cabinet old left-over drugs can often bring three years ago one two-year-old child n this state, attracted by all of the bright bottles and colored medicine he found in a bathroom medicine cabinct, swallowed some pills which had ocen used for an adult heart condition and died within less than two hours time.

"It is wise to use medicines as indicated for the illness for which they are prescribed by your doctur, and when they are no longer needed, destroy the remaining medicine immediately," Dr. Cox said.

A bridge was built across the Pecos, Dr. Holden thinks at Anton Chico, and he points out that this was necessary because the Pecos in those days, according to all accounts, was a deep, swift moving stream. Especially would a bridge be necessary to get the sheep across the stream.

After leaving the bridge, the expidition probably reached the plains not very far north of Santa Rosa, N. Dr. Holden thinks Coronado stayed on the Llano Estacado from Santa Rosa to the Querecho village, near what is now the city of Hereford, on the plains about 150 miles east of Anton Chico. Eight days after leaving the bridge the party encountered the

It is likely the expedition crossed the Palo Duro to Tierra Blanco, so thinks Dr. Holden, thence to the North and South Tules, to Blanco. and possibly to the Yellowhouse.

Dr. Holden doesn't think the expedition reached the caprock, but much wandering occurred on the trackless plains. One account says The country is so level that men became lost when they went off a half a league. One horseman was lost and never saw again. No track was left where they went, and os on this account it was necessary to mark the road with cow (buffalo) dung, so as to return, since there were no stones or anything else."

Quivira, which is in northeastern Kansas, was reached by a route that parallelled the Canadian river, on one side or the other. The return trip to Tiguex took 40 days, which accord ing to Dr. Holden's estimate of travel of 15 miles per day, would cover the approximate distance of 600 miles.




