Capt. Littlepage landed in the States on Nov. 11th with the 79th General Hospital unit.

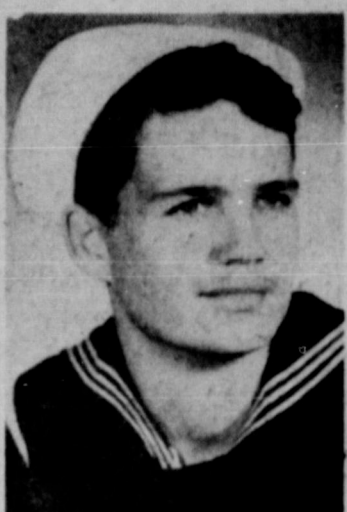

Pfc. Gerald Averitt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Averitt, has received his discharge from the Navy, November 15th, at Banana Grove, Florida, after three years service.

Gerald received training at San Diego and North Island, Calif., after entering service on October 29th, 1942. He was schooled in radio work and served 22 months in the Pacific theater as radio operator aboard a Navy Catalina plane. His plane was shot down in the early stages of the war against the Japs, but the crew was rescued in sight of the enemy. Gerald participated in action over Oahu, Midway, Elice Island, Tarawa, Makin, Kwajalein, Majuro, Eniwetok and Saipan.

Gerald, Mrs. Averitt and their baby will make their home here at the present.

County Committeemen To Be Elected Next Week In AAA Conservation Vote

Farm Editors Pay Visit To County 4H Club Youths

Two nationally known news editors of farm journals visited six 4-H Club members of Knox County, Tuesday, November 13th.

Mrs. Beth Pascal, associate editor of the Farm Journal and Miss Laura Lane, extension editor of College Station, were attracted to Knox County for news stories regarding 4-H Club activities because of the outstanding records that are being made here.

The club members visited were Edith and Faye Ryder of Gilliland, Olen Ray, and Fred Lewis and Buddy Crenshaw of Benjamin, Nadyne Allen and Johnnie Jackson of the Vera community and Joe Edd Sweatt of the Sunset community.

Faye and Edith Ryder have accomplished a very outstanding piece of work on account of their activity in planting and cultivating two hundred and ten acres of crop land and during the growing season had made replacement of tractor parts without assistance of a mechanic, and they also kept in repair other farm equipment. These two Ryder girls also proved their ability as paperhangers and interior decorators, after the crops were laid by, improving the kitchen and one bedroom.

Olen Ray was an outstanding calf feeder in 1944, and is making another calf feeding record in 1945 with two Hereford steers that he plans to show at the 4-H Club Show in February, and will perhaps show them in Wichita Falls, if his steers are in the top ten in the county.

The Crenshaw boys were visited because of their record of having fed the reserve champion steer in 1944, and are well on the way towards winning some premium money with two steers they are feeding now.

Nadyne Allen was visited because she is one of the 4-H Club girls who prefers taking care of livestock rather than household duties. She is giving the boys of the Vera community some stiff competition in the calf feeding game.

Johnnie Jackson was visited because of her being selected as Gold Star girl in 1943, and is doing an outstanding piece of work now with her flock of 146 laying pullets. This number of pullets were raised from 200 baby chicks that were purchased in February of this year. Johnnie sold 50 cockrels as fryers which paid for a good portion of the feed bill.

Joe Edd Sweatt of the Sunset community was visited because of his outstanding record in the production of grain sorghums seed and exhibited to Mrs. Paschal and Miss Lane 208 letters that he had received for orders of seed from 27 different states.

Pictures were taken at each stop of the boys and girls 4-H Club demonstrations. These pictures will be used in connection with 4-H club news items.

A final appeal to "get out and vote" has been directed to Knox County farmers by Chairman Emmett Partridge, of the county AAA committee. Farmers in seven communities will ballot NEXT week on the AAA committeemen who will represent and assist them the coming year.

A big turnout of voters will demonstrate that Knox County farmers believe in the elected committeemen system which enables farmers to run their own farm programs. Mr. Partridge said. On the other hand, a small turnout might be interpreted to mean that farmers are not interested in having their programs run by farmers.

With many reconversion problems ahead, the AAA committeemen will have heavy responsibilities in 1946. They will be handling details of government programs and also voicing the opinions of local farmers on recommendations for new or improved programs.

Doctor's Oppose Pending Legislation

The State Medical Association of Texas has informed the Texas delegation in Congress of their support of the Hill-Burton Bill and their unqualified opposition to the Pepper Bill. Both pending measures deal with public health affairs.

Dr. Holman Taylor, secretary of the State Association, has written the Congressmen that the legislative committee of the organization has voted approval of one measure and condemnation of the other.

The Hill-Burton Bill was approved because it seeks to provide hospitals in communities where they are badly needed and where they would be self-supporting.

The Pepper Bill, known as the Maternal and Child Welfare Act of 1945, is disapproved by the doctors because its provisions would place a large percentage of the physicians now practicing in the United States under the direction of the Childrens Bureau of the Department of Labor. This, they declare, would mean the regimentation of doctors and the destruction of the time honored relationship between patient and physician.

"The Pepper Bill extends the emergency maternal and infant care program, through which the wives and children of servicemen were afforded free medical care, to all the mothers and children in the United States regardless of their financial status," Dr. Taylor explains. "Children are designated as everyone under 21 years of age. This would mean that about one-third of the population of America would be entitled to free medical care by the government directed and compensated doctors. This is socialized medicine presented in a plausible, sugar-coated form.

"The measure, with its high tax burden, should be defeated since we believe that socialized medicine in any form, is contrary to the best interests of efficient and skillful protection of the public health."

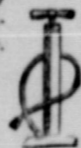

HEALTH LETTER

With the approach of cold weather, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued some timely advice concerning room temperature and its relation to health.

"It is very important that inside temperature be maintained at around 68 to 70 degrees," Dr. Cox said. "Thousands of homes are continually overheated in winter, and a degree of heat is often demanded that would not be tolerated in the summertime."

In a room that is overheated, the body pores are open, and the moment that the outside temperature is encountered, much harm may result. Colds, influenza, and even pneumonia may take advantage of this bodily abuse, and take a serious toll in sickness and even death.

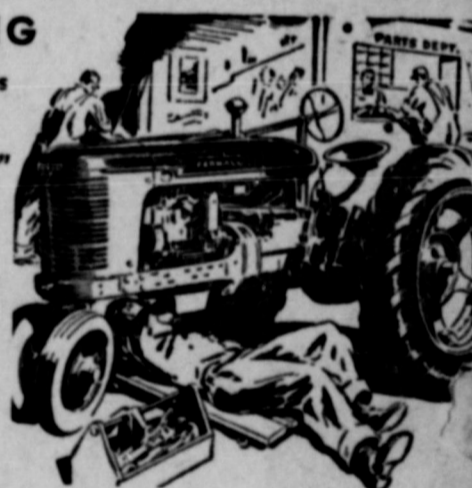
