Country Club Greens Vandalized

Two of the lush greens at the Knox City Country Club received considerable damage sometime Friday night or during the early hours Saturday when a car was driven around and around on greens two and five cutting deep tracks in the well-cared-for turfs. Caretaker C. E. Dodson made the discovery when he made his early Saturday morning rounds and notified Carl Shelton immediately. Mr. Shelton then reported the vandalism to Chief of Police Eddie Carr. Carr is investigating the incident and is being assisted by Knox City Deputy Pete Hatfield of Munday. As will be noted in a display ad in this week's News, a sizable reward is being offered by the Knox City Country Club for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons doing the damage. The Country Club greens have the reputation of being the best in the area and officials regret that the incident happened. They are anxious to learn the identity of the vandals. Officials estimate that it will take a year to replace the best grass if it has to be reseeded. If transplants can be made from the putting green, it will take less time, they said.

Time To Spray Pecans

The next four or five days is time to spray for the pecan nut casebearer, according to County Extension Agent Herman H. Collier. From observing the emergence of pecan nut casebearer moths, insecticides should be applied during the period of May 31-June 4.

Commercial orchard producers should time application exactly by inspecting large numbers of outlets for eggs and damage. Control measures should be carried out when the first pecan nut casebearer damaged outlets are found. The time at which controls are needed may vary from orchard to orchard.

Insecticides that might be used for casebearer control are Guthion, Zolone, Sevin, Malathion, and Toxaphene. Follow instructions given on the label for mixing and applying these insecticides. For best results apply insecticides to the point of run-off.

A second insecticidal application seven to ten days after the first will give maximum protection from the pecan nut case bearer. The need for a second application in larger orchards should be based on observation of the outlets for eggs. If egg-laying com-

times for four or five days after the first application, a second application will be needed.

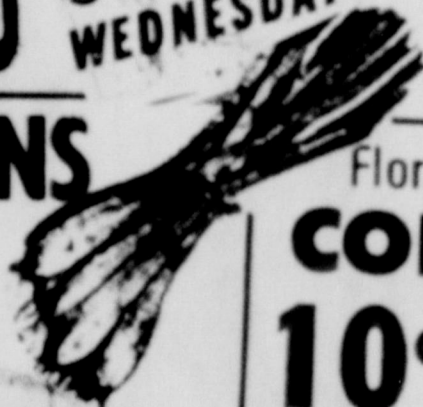

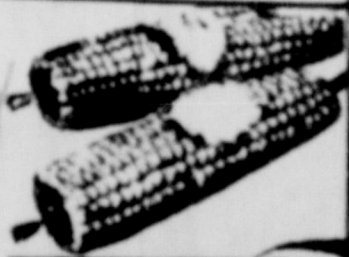

Congr. Bob Price Suggests Plan To Avert Fuel Crisis

Ever since first being elected to the Congress nearly eight years ago, I have warned of an impending energy crisis. In speeches delivered on the House of Representatives floor, in news releases, and in legislation which I have introduced and reintroduced, I have pointed to the need for new incentives and a comprehensive plan of action to avert the fuel shortage that is now upon us. Enactment of my bills would:

provide for tax credits and incentives for expenditures made in the exploration and development of new reserves of oil and gas,
derogate the price of natural gas at the well head currently controlled by the Federal Power Commission, and
establish a Council on Energy Policy to evaluate and adequately provide for the long-term energy needs for the Nation.

At the present time I am also giving serious consideration to co-sponsoring legislation to complete the construction of the trans-Alaskan pipeline, as I believe the development of this fuel reserve is of vital importance to the Nation.

Very recently, my office has begun to receive numerous inquiries from farmers, businessmen, and independent petroleum suppliers in rural areas about the lack of fuel supplies. Of course I can again emphasize my efforts of the past several years to avert such an unfortunate dilemma, but that is small comfort to the farmer who cannot plow his fields because of the lack of gasoline to run his tractor.

For this reason, I have personally contacted the Office of Oil and Gas in the Department of Interior to ask that immediate action be taken to give a top priority in the distribution of available fuel resources to those who produce our Nation's supplies of basic foods and fiber. A shortage of fuel products is extremely serious, but a shortage of food would be disastrous.

I can only hope that after all these years the Congress will face up to the issue of an energy crisis and take action on the legislation I have sponsored. This week as a sign of things to come gasoline companies are warning motorists that supplies may not be adequate to cover the demands of the approaching Memorial Day holiday. I am encouraged that President Nixon has recently proposed actions similar to the legislation I have introduced to deal with the Nation's energy needs. Failure to act by the Congress can only have the most serious consequences for us all.
