

Area Receives Rain

After record-breaking heat on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of last week, the weather did an about face this week and we had one of the coolest July fourths in many years, approximately 23 years, unofficially.

Temperatures reached highs of 104, 104, and 106 at the Plant Materials Center northwest of town and some readings in town reached highs of 111, unofficially.

Intermittent showers and some good rains broke the heat wave and gave relief to feed and cotton crops. Some areas west of Knox City and O'Brien recorded as much as four inches of rain in the past week, while areas to the east and north received amounts from one to three inches. Nevertheless, the moisture has been very beneficial to crops and yards and has caused many "wide grins".

With the rain Tuesday morning, the high only reached 67 and Wednesday morning's low was 63.

MR. AND MRS. W. J. SELLERS

Retired Farmer Enjoys Unusual Hobby

"A person has to have something to do with his spare time and this is how I like to spend mine," explained W.J. Sellers as he proudly displayed his accumulation of old farm implements.

Mr. Sellers, who lives with his wife on their 141-acre farm just west of O'Brien, said he started collecting old plows and tools about five years ago and at the time, no one was especially interested in preserving any of the old implements. However, Mr. Sellers remarked that lately he could have sold his collection any number of times.

His father, who was a good blacksmith made a shovel and a poker and gave it to the Sellers when they married. He still has these tools along with neck yokes, single trees, double trees, and a corn grinder.

When asked for a history on the old equipment, Mr. Sellers said there was only one implement that he knew anything definite about and that was a turning plow sold in 1884 or 1885 in Scurry County.

Mr. Sellers was working on a 1926 Oliver one-cow go devil, painting it in bright implement colors andreassembling it.

When we suggested that we get a picture of him beside his implements, he called his wife to come out and stand beside him.

Mrs. Sellers then helped him explain how and where he obtained the various plows. For instance, a one-row planter brightly painted was bought from Fitter Baker for \$5.00 in 1926 and Mr. Sellers made the crop with it. Then there

was the McCormick-Dearing single row cultivator the Sellers found and bought in Throckmorton.

Mrs. Sellers pointed out "her pet", a walking planter which she quickly explained "will still plant corn and beans". The plates are still intact.

Another plow was put together with beams for a double shovel from A.A. Cox and the handles from his brother Ellis Sellers.

Down the line of plows was a Georgia stock found at Rising Star and a one-row harrow, also found crushed in a junk yard at Rising Star. Mr. Sellers said he had to take it apart piece at a time to get it loose and then straighten it before he could put it together again.

Mr. Sellers said he was the "most proud" of a heel sweep that he got from a cousin, Fred Huling, in Fulton, Miss.

The Sellers, who will both be 80-years-old in December, have three children, Jenny, Mrs. Charles Smith who lives with her husband in the Thorp community), Jean (Mrs. Claudie Barnard who lives with her family east of O'Brien), and Mac, who lives at Lamesa with his wife, the former Ernestine Tonoff.

Brazos West Continues In Community Interest

The newly-formed Brazos West Economic Development Corporation met Tuesday night of last week in Sagerton with 35 persons representing 14 towns in the four county-18 community area.

Counties included are Haskell, Jones, Stonewall, and Knox.

Purpose of the general meeting was to approve action formerly taken by the Board of Directors. Approved as officers were Bill Koon, chairman of the board; Joe Aalbue, president; Troy Culpepper, executive vice president; E.H. Diers, vice president; and Noris Ousley, secretary-treasurer. Directors-at-large elected were Charles Stenholm, Morris Neal and Oscar Dickerson. By-laws will be subject to approval at the August meeting.

Finances, publicity, and future meetings were discussed. It was recommended that each large town in the area give \$60 and each small town and community give \$25 for postage, printing, and telephone.

Persons responsible for getting news of the corporation into newspapers in the area towns were named as follows: Larry Tarell, Stamford American; Troy Culpepper, Haskell Free Press; J.B. Tabor, Knox County News, Knox City; Dolris Dean, Anson Western Observer; and Jim Reeves, Munday Courier.

After the general meeting, the groups divided up into special interest groups to identify problems and recommend action. Reports were heard from Char-

les Stenholm on agriculture; Mrs. Bill Koon on education; and H. Wayne Smith on industry.

The corporation was formed for the purpose of working together to foster industry, promote the area, both rural and urban in wholesale, retail, and agriculture.

The annual meeting will be held at the Hamlin School cafeteria on August 15 at 7:30 p.m.

City's First Quarter Sales Tax Up From '71

This is an increase of \$201,63 above the first quarter of 1971.

Statewide, city sales tax payments for the first quarter were down considerably from the fourth quarter of 1971, according to State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert. However, Mrs. Railback reported Knox City's first quarter amount was only \$25.77 below the fourth quarter, which includes the Christmas buying.

A total of \$16,447.81 was received in the city sales taxes last year and the revenue was used primarily for street improvements.
