## Ikard Here to Discuss Drouth Aid

Congressman Frank Ikard was in Knox City Tuesday to discuss the serious drouth conditions with local farmers, ranchers and business men.

Next week, when he is back in Washington, Mr. Ikard will join Congressman George Mahon of the adjoining district in discussing the situation with Federal officials.

Ikard said a number of local men are of the opinion that location of a Farmers Home Administration in Knox City or elsewhere in the county would be of some benefit, and he will take that matter up with FHA officials. The congressman believes the FHA disaster loans are the best aid available at the present time, for farmers in this section.

At present Knox County is served by the FHA office at Seymour.

Mr. Ikard plans to be back in the district in October, and will again visit constituents here.

## Fifteen Men to Be Inducted in October

Bill B. Pittman, 35 year old Haskell oil field worker and a brother of Dudley Pittman of Knox City, died at his home in Haskell about 4 a. m. Wednesday less than an hour after he awoke from sleep complaining of a headache.

A doctor summoned to the Pittman home said death was due to a cerebral hemorrhage. He died about 30 minutes after the doctor's arrival.

Funeral was to be held at 3 p. m. today at the Haskell Baptist Church.

Born Aug. 8 in Bell County, Pittman came to Haskell county with his parents 34 years ago. He was married to the former Gladys Campbell of Haskell in 1938.

Survivors are the wife; his father, D. D. Pittman; a daughter, Karen, all of Haskell; and four brothers, Dudley of Knox City, Archie of Farmington, N. M., Charlie of Haskell and A. J. of Memphis, Tex.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Truscott Friday, Aug. 22 at 5:00 p. m. for J. R. Spivey, prominent Knox County pioneer farmer, who died in the Knox County Hospital Wednesday night, Aug. 20.

Mr. Spivey was born Nov. 24, 1880, in Rockdale, Texas, and moved to Knox County in 1909. In 1908, he was married to Miss Clara Bates. He had been affiliated with the Baptist Church since he was a young man.

## Full Faculty Ready For School Opening

### Area Farm Bureau Leaders to Meet in Crowell September 6

County Farm Bureau leaders from this area will gather in Crowell Saturday, Sept. 6, for a sub-district meeting. This is one of 24 such sessions being conducted throughout the State by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, it has been announced by J. Walter Hammond of Tye, president of the organization.

In attendance will be Marvin Carter, Federation organization director, and O. R. Long, field representative, American Farm Bureau Federation.

Loys D. Barbour of Iowa Park, state director for this district, will preside at the all-day meeting, which will be held in the District Courtroom at Crowell beginning at 10 a. m.

In announcing the sub-district meetings President Hammond emphasized the importance of county leaders meeting with state officers and staff members to discuss current issues and policies vital to farm and ranch people.

Mr. Long will discuss the organization's program of work this year and the responsibilities of local leaders. Mr. Carter will present the enrollment plan which has been developed by the State organization for use by counties in their annual membership enrollment drive scheduled for the week of Oct. 10-17.

The sub-district meetings have been planned to discuss four major things, Hammond said. (1) State and National issues pertaining to agriculture; (2) to have expression from farm leaders; (3) how to raise money to finance state government; (4) plans for enrolling 75,000 members in 1952.

### Oil Notes—

Operators were drilling cement today in the Mid-Continent Petroleum Co. No. 1 Geo. Buchanan, and will perforate for completion. This test, an offset to the Deep Rock No. 1 J. G. Hawkins, a Conglomerate discovery, is four miles east of town.

The Conglomerate was topped at 5,783 feet and drilled to 5,808. A drillstem test last week recovered 1,120 feet of oil and 130 feet of oil cut mud, with bottom hole pressure of 2,070 pounds and flowing pressure of 330.

Pipe was set at 4,279 feet in the Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 2 C. A. Richardson, in the North Knox City Field, after the Palo Pinto Reef was topped at 4,168 feet. Swabbing is underway today.

Lewis Drilling Co. is drilling surface for the Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 3 S. D. Jones, in the same area.

The Geochemical Surveys, Inc., No. 1 S. N. Reed, a mile west of O'Brien, was being tested today below 4800 feet. A drillstem test was also made Wednesday, but no information about the result was available.

The Sheets and Walton No. 1 J. W. Michaels, in the McGregor Field west of O'Brien, has been plugged and abandoned after a drillstem test in the Conglomerate recovered 5,400 feet of salt water. An earlier drillstem test in the Strawn also recovered salt water.

The Frank Woods Associates rig will move from the No. 1 Michaels to location for the Texas Pacific No. 3 B. B. Campbell, in the same area. This location is northeast of the Campbell No. 1, a Strawn producer.

The T. P. No. 6 Juliana McGregor, six miles west of O'Brien, has been completed for a daily gauge of 196.65 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 16.8 per cent salt water. This well is a pump, producing from 18 perforations at 4,967-70 feet.

The Frank Woods Associates No. 1 Gillespie, King County wildcat 12 miles south of Guthrie, is drilling below 5,800 feet.

Jones, Anderson & Word No. 1 H. Kempner, six miles west of town, was plugged and abandoned after testing the Ellenberger. Rig from this failure is moving to location for the Southwest Natural Production Co. No. 1 Kempner Estate, a 6,000 foot venture on the McAuley farm west of town.

**COUNTY 4-H CLUBS TO REORGANIZE IN SEPTEMBER**

The 4-H Clubs of Knox County will reorganize in September, after the schools have re-opened, County Agent Bill Pallmeyer said this week.

The 4-H Club, a voluntary youth organization, is open to all boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 21, Pallmeyer said. There are no membership dues, and all one needs to do is meet the age requirement and select some demonstration related to agriculture.

These demonstrations include feeding and management of beef cattle, dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, horses, rabbits, ducks, turkeys and chickens. Other demonstrations are gardening, orchard work, farming, wildlife

conservation, soil conservation and farm safety.

The 4-H member may select any of the above for their demonstration, and carry on as many different demonstrations as they feel they may be able to properly care for. Members may secure demonstrations by purchasing, through gifts from friends, or winning prizes offered in 4-H contests. Members may join the organization at any time they desire, and may drop 4-H work at any time they wish.

The 4-H Club is the largest youth organization in the world, having members in all states and in several foreign countries.

Each year, thousands of dollars are earned by members, and by keeping records of their

demonstrations, they learn procedures of bookkeeping which are valuable in later years. They also receive the latest information in the field of agriculture, and use this information in carrying on demonstrations. Shows are held each year for the members to show results of the work they are doing, and awards are given for the best work.

There are perils for the empty heart. You know the story in Matt. 12:43-45. Read it. Truly there is grave danger in not being filled with God.

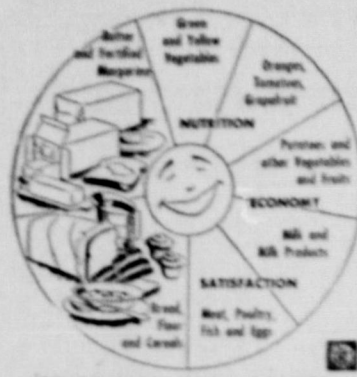
