This complies with Vernon's Civil Statutes 4590b and meets the training requirement for cert-Mrs. Clara Smithare co-hostes - ification of ambulance personnel.

> The advanced level of training of this Emergency Care School and the fact that it is tailored to meet the needs of emergency professionals, completely distinguished it from first aid training sessions.

In addition to ambulance persomel, the class was made up by firemen, policemen, and other interested persons from Stamford, Amon, Hamlin, Hashell, Gorman Munday, and Knox

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

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
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
