## Knox City Has USO Quota of \$215.00

Knox County will soon open its 1952 campaign for the USO. County Chairman J. M. Averitt announced that within the next few days the county will seek to raise its proportionate share of \$845 of the Texas goal of \$740,856.

"We can no longer think of our own boys and girls serving in the uniform of their country without thinking of the wonderful job which USO is doing in their behalf," Averitt said. "The USO, in effect, has become an unofficial branch of our armed forces."

"We must strengthen all of our defense efforts, and USO is no exception, for the draft calls will continue to drain off our young people and to place them on duty on cold war fronts around the globe."

USO has established 104 new units during the past twelve months in the areas of greatest need at home and overseas, bringing the total number of clubs and lounges to 271. Seventeen of these are located in Texas.

Knox City's share of the \$845 quota will be \$215. This is a very small amount, Averitt said, for Knox City to spend for the comfort of the 122 boys from Knox County that are now serving their country.

## FARM BUREAU PLANS MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

The officers and directors of the Knox County Farm Bureau met at a supper in the Munday school lunchroom Tuesday evening, Nov. 18.

Otis Simpson of Munday, Omar Cure of Gilliland and Richard Winstead of Gilliland gave reports on their trip to the Texas Farm Bureau Convention held in San Antonio last week. Winstead reported that one of the county resolutions, which was passed on to the state level, received the wholehearted support of all Farm Bureau delegates, but was recognized as having much opposition in the legislature. That was the resolution in tractor fuel tax refund to farmers.

The main business of the meeting was to make plans for a membership drive in Knox County. Simpson reported that much emphasis was placed on membership at the convention. "Resolutions are drawn up in the county and passed on to the state convention, and become policies of the Texas Farm Bureau," officials of the organization said. "In this way the farmer is represented at Austin and Washington. But in order to have power behind this representation there must be a larger membership. The bigger the Farm Bureau the more attention is paid the farmer by members of our own state and national legislature."

In planning the membership drive it was decided to have a chairman in each community, and a group of workers to solicit members in the community. Herbert Partridge, president of the county organization, expressed hopes that each farmer in the county would be contacted and asked to join the Farm Bureau.

Anyone who is not contacted is asked to send the \$10.00 annual dues to the treasurer, George Wall, at Knox City.

## COTTON GINNING REPORT

A census report from Hoyle Sullins of Vera shows that 6,545 bales of cotton were ginned in Knox County from the crop of 1952 prior to Nov. 1.

## SANTA CLAUS AND REINDEER TO VISIT KNOX CITY DECEMBER 10TH

A Christmas parade is always a thrill for the youngest generation, because they get to see Santa Claus in all his benevolent glory.

But kids in the Knox City area will get an extra special treat this year when they see not only Santa, but his reindeer—real ones.

This was revealed Tuesday by W. L. Collins, secretary of the local Board of Commerce, in announcing that Knox City will have its first Christmas parade in many years.

The parade will be Wednesday, December 10, at 7:30 p. m. Collins said the Christmas lights will be up and turned on the night of the parade. The Board asked retail merchants to decorate their display windows and stores, and to remain open until at least 8:30 p. m.

Taking part in the parade will be the Knox City school bands under the direction of Supt. Harold Barnett.

The reindeer will be furnished by Grady Carothers, Goldthwaite ranchman, who has spent

five years building up an 18-head herd of reindeer and showing them off to kids at Christmas time.

Carothers' deer live in an air conditioned barn on his ranch and are treated like the aristocrats they are. Because of Alaska's recent shortage of female reindeer, he couldn't bring down any females until last year, but the herd is on the natural increase already.

The real-life reindeer are a little different from the mythical variety, but not less amazing. Their thick hair is hollow to provide insulation against the normal 5 to 50 degree below zero weather of their native plains. When a reindeer walks his ankles pop and his tongue hangs out like a dog's.

Every child—and grown-up, too—in the area is invited to be on hand for the parade. To the best of Collins' knowledge, only other town in the area to have the reindeer this year will be Seymour.

More details will be arranged and announced later, Collins said.

A fire Wednesday morning damaged the warehouse at the rear of the J. M. Edwards M-System Grocery, and destroyed some stock and office equipment.

According to O. W. Caussey, manager, the damages amounted to about \$15,000, but was covered by insurance.

The blaze was discovered shortly after it started, but gained headway fast. Besides office equipment and a great deal of stock, two large walk-in cold storage boxes were damaged.

A firewall kept the fire from the main building, and smoke did not appreciably damage the merchandise in the store. As soon as the smoke was cleared the store was reopened for business.

Temporary storage space has been rented while the warehouse is being repaired, Mr. Caussey said.

This was Knox City's third fire in the business district since October 8, when City Grocery and Bateman Food Lockers were destroyed and Hoge Pharmacy and City Hardware damaged. Loss from that blaze was more than \$200,000.

On October 24, Durham's Cafe and the postoffice were damaged by fire, with the loss estimated at \$6,500. Extensive repairs were necessary, and the cafe has just reopened for business. Mr. Caussey is owner of the buildings housing the cafe and postoffice.

## Oil Notes—

Noble Drilling Co. is rigging up on location for the Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-B L. W. Graham, about a mile north of town. Location is 1,220 feet south of Stanolind's Jeff Graham well, a Palo Pinto reef producer.

The company has completed the No. 3 Travis, also in the North Knox City field, but no potential figures have been released.

The Katz & Venable No. 1 Wilbanks & Keny, wildcat location about three miles west of town, was drilling at 4,505 feet this morning with no shows reported so far.

The A. R. Dillard No. 1 R. V. Burton, conglomerate try about six miles east of town, was reported drilling below 4,300 feet Wednesday.

T. P. Coal & Oil Co. No. 5 B. Campbell, in the McGregor field west of O'Brien, is drilling below 4,616 feet.

Texas Pacific has spotted the No. 1 Maggie Hammonds, a wildcat six miles west of O'Brien. Site of the 5,500 foot test is 1,500 feet from the north and 2,260 feet from the west lines of HE&WT Survey 4.

In the Katz field about 13 miles west of O'Brien, the Katz No. 9 Ed Lewis is drilling below 2,290 feet.

Also in the Katz field, the No. 13 Lorentzen was recently completed with a daily gauge of 109.8 barrels of 36.6 gravity oil flowing through a 20-64 choke. Production is from 96 perforations at 5,078-90 feet.

On the King County side of the Katz field, the Continental Oil Co. No. 7 Alma Orsborn was completed as a pumper, with a daily gauge of 90.31 barrels of 38.4 gravity oil, plus 240 barrels of water.

Among recent failures in the area were the S. C. Herring No. 1 C. R. Jones, two miles northwest of Truscott, abandoned at 6,365 feet; Continental Oil Co. No. 2 Alexander Estate, 14 mi. southeast of Guthrie, abandoned at 6,212 feet; and Humble Oil Co. No. 1 McFadden Estate, 10 miles northwest of Benjamin, abandoned at 6,217 feet.
