vail, a major industry closed or a military base is deactivated or crops fail, etc., and a school district suffers a large drop in A.D.A. They could in fact find themselves passed tax collection period, nearing the end of a current budget year and find that the minimum foundation program would not now include certain teachers, principals, special service units, supervisor and/or counselor units, or the planned superintendent's salary schedule based on "x" number of A.D.A. as anticipated, resulting in under budgeting local revenue and putting the school district in an adverse-deficit situation.

2. (a) Between the close of school in May and June first of 1970, a group of students transfer to another district. Senate Bill 435 provides for the transfer of the A.D.A. to the receiving district from the home district. The receiving district could be affected by receiving enough additional A.D.A. to earn an additional teacher's salary for the year past even though they did not educate the students that year. The home district would lose the salary aid.

(b) Between the close of school in May and June first of 1970, a student could transfer to a receiving district. The transferred A.D.A. would go to the receiving district who would not gain enough A.D.A. to gain an additional teacher and the home district by the loss of the student's A.D.A. would lose a teacher's salary under the

minimum foundation program. (c) The effect of current A.D.A., or membership and free transfer on special education students is not clear, but if it applies it could damage efforts in this direction because of the small membership needed to obtain teacher units.

In summary the transfer law and current A.D.A. provision makes sensible school budget planning impossible.

Other Items. It is clear that in the 1970-71 school year when the new provisions for determining C.T.U. allocations is in effect, many small districts will lose C.T.U.s, because of the elimination of the provision that provides for a minimum program in districts which have maintained an accredited high school for the past three years.

It is not clear if Sparse Area Districts will be affected. The net effect of this is to force some districts to revert back to pre-1949 Foundation School Program Acts conditions. The purpose of this act is to provide every boy and girl in Texas a minimum educational opportunity is thus lost.

2. Senate Bill 199 to provide teacher with forty-five minutes planning time was passed but was not included in the minimum foundation program. Local districts must finance this alone and at about one extra teacher for each seven to ten in the program, a huge burden to every district in the state.

I beg Representative W. S. Heatly, Governor Smith, Lt. Governor Barnes and Members of the Texas House and Senate to please reconsider these provisions at the coming special session of the Texas Legislature on July 28, 1969.

He has earned FFA honors in Public Speaking with the farming program, and has served in several offices on the local, area and state level. Miss Wilborn is 17 years old, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Wilborn and plans to enter Baylor University this fall.

Gary Bishop of Hearn will serve as First Vice President of Texas FFA, and Rebecca Sue Weatherby of Fort Stockton was runner-up in the Sweetheart Contest.

In other convention activities, Pat Jarrett of Mission was named winner in Public Speaking. The Talent Contest was won by western singer James Hand of West, Texas.

Dennis Pharris of Hillsboro, out-going Vice President, was elected by the delegates as the National Officer Nominee, and he will compete in Kansas City this fall.

State Stars were selected in the four degree categories. They are Taylor Strawn of Howe, American Farmer; Jimmy Christie of Hereford, Lone Star Farmer; Barry Caswell of Meadow, Chapter Farmer; and Gary Speck of Eden is the Star Green Hand.

## Proposed Amendments To Be Voted On In Special Election

Proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution will go to the polls August 5, 1969 to cast their ballots on nine proposed Constitutional Amendments that will be on the ballot at the special election.

The Texas Constitution of 1876 has been amended a total of 18 times, most recently in 1967. Seven of fourteen amendments submitted to the voters were adopted. Changes in the constitution are the most important form of legislation that constitute the one area in which Texas voters may participate directly or by exercising their power.

Therefore, in the public interest that voters have access to information regarding proposed constitutional amendments, the legislature is making an informed judgment of the changes proposed.

The nine proposed constitutional amendments to be considered on August 5, 1969 have been analyzed by the Texas Legislative Council to assist the voter on the merits of the changes proposed.

to be voted on AUGUST 5, 1969

Amendment No. 1, Making no substantive change but cleaning up obsolete, superfluous, or unnecessary sections of the Constitution by repealing Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3, 4, and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5 and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of

Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI.

Amendment No. 2, Granting the powers of flexibility of operation to the Texas Water Development Board necessary to develop sufficient water resources for present and future economic development of the state.

Amendment No. 3, Authorizing the legislature to set the salary of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house of representatives at not more than the salary of a district judge.

Amendment No. 4, Exempting nonprofit water supply corporations from ad valorem taxation.

Amendment No. 5, Increasing the maximum amount which may be expended in one year from state funds for public assistance payments to needy aged, needy disabled, needy blind, and needy children to \$80 million, in order to comply with federal requirements for obtaining matching funds.

Amendment No. 6, Authorizing removal of constitutional interest-rate limitations on certain bonds subject to limitations imposed by the legislature.

Amendment No. 7, Adding certain governmental employees, officers, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units, and others, to the list of persons whose surviving spouses and children are eligible for assistance as provided by law.

Amendment No. 8, Authorizing the legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan.

Amendment No. 9, Providing for annual sessions of the Texas Legislature.

The Texas Legislative Council takes no position for or against but merely presents the analyzed reports.

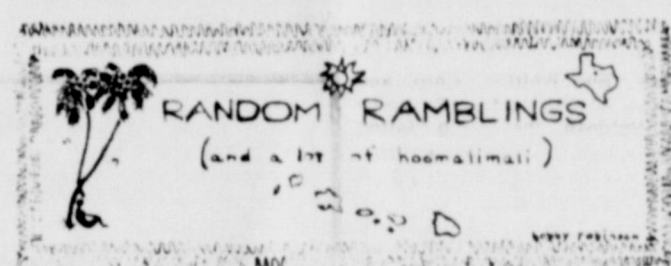

You would probably never guess it, and I was as surprised as any other West Texan would be to discover it, but one of the largest ranches in the United States is located right here in the Aloha State. The Parker Ranch, founded by a sailor, is located on the Big Island (Hawaii), and is second only in size to the enormous King Ranch in our own Lone Star State. This sprawling ranch here has maintained a bit of the "old West" atmosphere despite some outside attempts at making it another tourist attraction for Hawaii.

John Palmer Parker, a sailor from Massachusetts, left his ship in 1815 to seek his fortune on the island of Hawaii. Being very adept as a big game hunter he was soon employed by the reigning Hawaiian monarch, Kamehameha the Great, to hunt and shoot the wild cattle which roamed freely over the Waimea Plateau area in the north of the island. These wild cattle were descendants of ones that had been given to Kamehameha in 1792.

Parker acquired the title to this land which encompassed over 300,000 acres at first, and is located almost completely around the base of 13,784-foot Mauna Kea. He married a Hawaiian woman, and founded a family which, generation after generation, built up great herds of beef cattle from wild stock. Parker tamed and bred the wild animals and thus founded the ranch.

This lovely region of bright green grass and dark green trees standing in the shadow of the towering Kohala Mountains is surrounded by lush pastures full of whiteface cattle and handsome horses of many breeds. Here is an atmosphere of stimulating cool air and fine mist which the Hawaiians call "kipupupu". Horseback riding is popular, and tourists rent horses from the ranch stables at Kamuela, Hawaii, for trips through the mountains and pastures.

The headquarters of the present 285,000-acre ranch are also located at Kamuela. Horses belonging to the authentic native Hawaiian cowboys are hitched to the rail of the post office, and the clink of spurs can be heard

on the veranda of the Parker Ranch Store, similar in effect to the 6666 Ranch store at Guthrie. Three roads lead out of Kamuela, one of which travels down the plateau to the seashore at Kawaihae Landing, where the cattle once upon a time had to swim out to the freighters waiting to take them to market. Now, of course, the cattle are simply herded aboard the ships via long ramps.

The Parker Ranch's herd of Herefords is said to be the largest in the world, though some reports call it the second largest. About 35,000 head of whitefaces roam over the picturesque pastures and verdant hillsides, keeping company to 4,000 horses and 10,000 sheep. For the sportsman, there is quite a bit of wildlife, including an occasional pheasant, fluttering quail, and grunting wildpig.

There are 188 ranches on the island of Hawaii that market an average of 25,000 head of cattle a year. It is a big business for the state of Hawaii. That's why beef is less expensive here in the Islands than fish... I GUESS.

In closing, allow me to repeat a paragraph from Mr. Lou Boyd's column in the Honolulu Advertiser. It stays within the realm of our subject:

"A cow that snores when asleep is a rarity. In the first place, cows don't sleep much. So little, in fact, it has often been called by ranchers that they don't sleep at all. This contention finally was disproved, however, by a California cow expert named Kenneth A. Wagoner. He watched numerous cows on numerous nights, but never was quite sure if they really slept, or just lolled around with their eyes closed, faking it. Then, fortunately, out of the entire herd, he found one cow that snored. That cinched it. Cows do sleep. Only from one to five minutes at a time, true. But they do sleep. Mr. Wagoner may be the only man in the United States who ever heard a cow snore."

How about that, Alfred Hendrix, Fred Carver, and all the rest of you fellas out there in Marlboro country? ... That's pau for now... Aloha,

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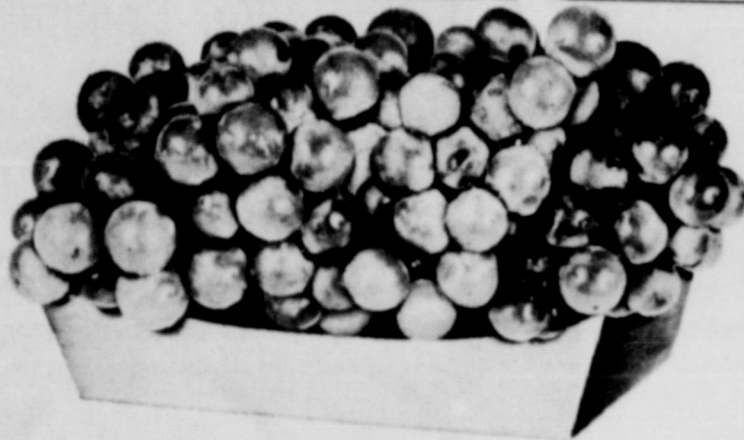

#### Earth's First Defense Against Moon Germs

A commonly used antiseptic will be mankind's first line of defense against any organisms that Apollo 11 astronauts might bring back from the moon.

The decontaminant is Betadine antiseptic, prepared from a chemical complex of polyvinylpyrrolidone-iodine made by GAF Corporation for The Purdue Frederick Company and affiliates. Betadine, one of the most potent antiseptic microbicides known to science and medicine and widely used as a surgical antiseptic, was selected by NASA for the initial decontamination of the capsule and its astronauts. It provides rapid, broad-spectrum germicidal action against micro organisms causing infections in man, lower animals and plants.

Frogmen will leap into the Pacific to secure the return capsule. When the spacecraft hatch is opened, the frogmen will give the astronauts biological isolation garments, which they will don, and the Betadine antiseptic. The same antiseptic that has been used as a spray for skin irritations and wounds and in skin diseases and mouthwash gargles will be used by the astronauts on their entire bodies and over their special garments.

As the astronauts then enter a life raft, the frogmen will spray Betadine over the raft, the spacecraft hatch, the astronauts and themselves in the hope of eliminating any germs that may have returned with the first men on the moon.

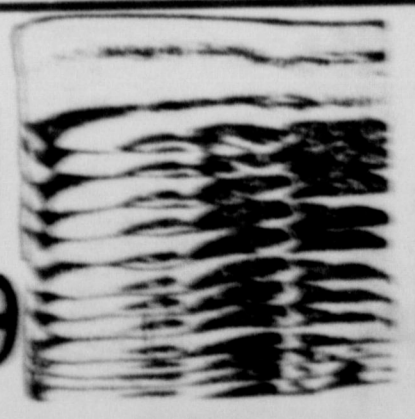

All of the territory of the Authority contained in the City of Goree shall be known as the "Goree Precinct"; all of the territory contained in the City of Knox City shall be known as the "Knox City Precinct"; all of the territory contained in the City of Munday shall be known as the "Munday Precinct"; and all of the territory contained in the City of Haskell shall be known as the "Haskell Precinct".

3. (a) The election in the Goree Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Goree, Texas. Mrs. G. W. Weber is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and she shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist her in holding said election.

(b) The election in the Knox City Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Knox City, Texas. Mr. Otis Harbert is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(c) The election in the Munday Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Munday, Texas. Mr. E. H. Nelson is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(d) The election in Haskell Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Haskell, Texas. Mr. C. H. Herren is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and three clerks to assist him in holding said election.

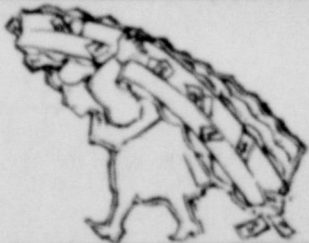
