oters Face Nine Amendments Special Election Tuesday

Monday, August 5 voters of the state will decide to accept or reject the proposed Constitutional amendments. Readers were given information regarding the nature of each amendment in last week's edition of the Herald. In behalf of public information the Herald presents a descriptive analysis of each amendment as follows:

1. To set its own salary and the salaries of the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor within certain limits.
2. Exempting non-profit water supply corporations from taxation.
3. Increasing assistance to needy aged, disabled, blind, and children to \$80 million from state funds.
4. Removal of constitutional interest-rate limitations on certain bonds subject to limitations imposed by the legislature.
5. To provide financial support for surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties.
6. To authorize the Legislature to provide additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan.
7. To provide for annual sessions of the Legislature.
8. Attorney General Crawford Martin said that Amendment No. 1, proposing to remove obsolete provisions from the Texas Constitution, should not be adopted because of the affect it will have on land titles. He agreed that some of the Constitution's programs are obsolete, but said he believes that removal of one section would raise serious questions on the validity of some titles to land.
9. State Representative, Bill Blayton of Springlake said of Amendment No. 2, "Our cities and industries will continue to grow with ample water supplies and our agriculture land will be able to feed and clothe the increased population of the future provided Texans approve Amendment 2 on August 5."

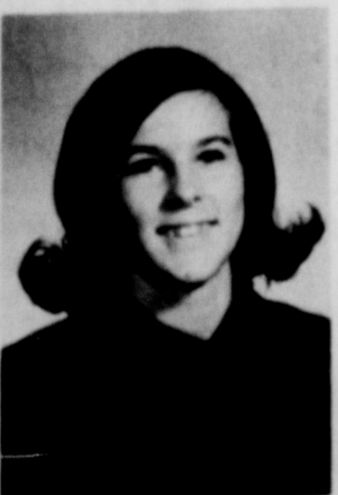

Patrolman Issues Law Statement

Joe Hataway, highway patrolman stationed in Knox City, asked the Herald this week to remind parents of the Texas motor vehicle law in regard to the operation of any motor vehicle including go carts, golf carts, motor scooters, and motorcycles.

In Texas laws relating to a driver's license, Article II, Sec. 4, we quote, "A special combination operator and commercial operator restricted license may be issued to any person between the ages fifteen (15) and eighteen (18) years to operate only a motorcycle, motor scooter, or motorized bicycle, the horsepower of any of which does not exceed five (5) brake horsepower." Article IV, Sec. 35 states, "No person shall cause or knowingly permit his child or ward under the age of eighteen (18) years to drive a motor vehicle upon any highway when such minor is not authorized here under or in violation of any of the provisions of this Act."

Mr. Hataway said that some parents possible are unaware of the age restriction and he felt that they should be advised of the probability of the parents' possible license suspension as well as no insurance coverage in the event of an unauthorized driver's involvement in an accident.

The highway patrolman also said that any person who might have a question in regard to the above matter should feel free to contact him or Patrolman Don Carmichael at the City Hall.

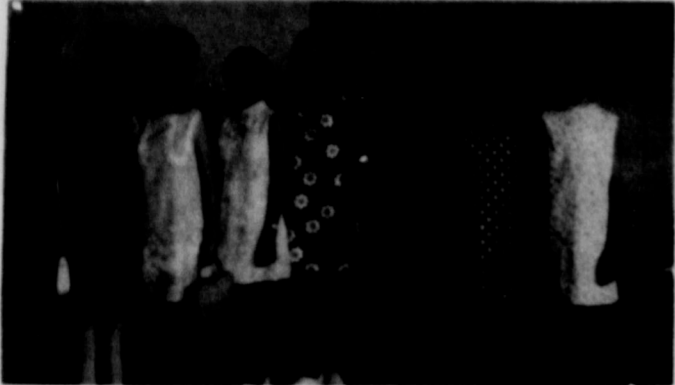
Revival Slated August 3-10

RANDOM RAMBLINGS (and a lot of hoomalimai)

Realizing that many of you may be confused when I refer to the various islands in the Hawaiian archipelago, I hereby take pen in hand to clarify one or two questions concerning same. First of all, every one of the tiny islands and islets extending for 1000 miles to the northwest of Oahu are part of the City and County of Honolulu, therefore making Honolulu 1800 miles long - the longest city in the world, Midway Island, where President Nixon and South Vietnam President Thieu had their recent meeting, is a part of the Hawaiian chain, though not the farthest island away and not considered to be an actual part of the state itself.

Statehood was granted to Hawaii in 1959, making it the 50th state of the Union. The state is

comprised of seven major islands - Oahu, Hawaii, Maui, Kauai, Molokai, Lanai, and Nihoa - plus many more tiny islands referred to above. Geologists say they rose from the sea thousands of years ago as a result of the violent eruptions of mighty volcanoes. The islands have been peopled for at least a thousand years by brave Polynesian voyagers who just happened to land here in search of a better life. Though the formal discovery of Hawaii is credited to Captain James Cook, British explorer and navigator, in 1778, it was already inhabited for hundreds of years.

Oahu, on which the capital city of Honolulu is located, has the largest population, although it is the third largest of the islands. At last count the state's

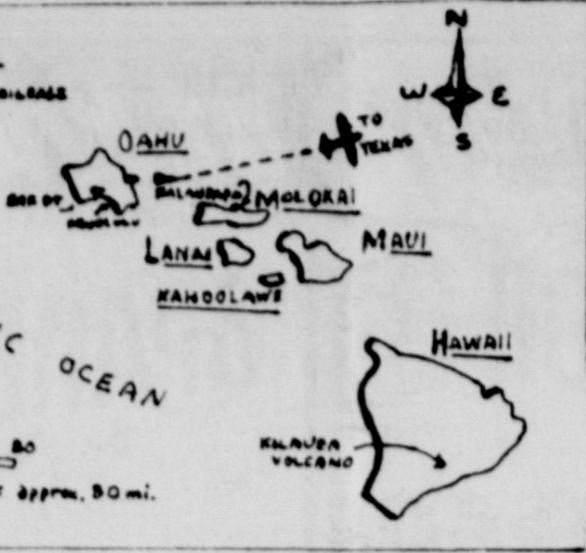
population was about 786,618, of which 654,403 live on Oahu, and 45% of that number live within the city of Honolulu.

The island of Hawaii is called "The Big Island" because it's the largest in the chain. It houses both active and dormant volcanoes and grows orchids in overwhelming abundance. It's a forty minute ride, by jet, from Honolulu.

The island of Maui is second largest, a 29-minute ride by jet from Honolulu, and a favorite with visitors for its hotels, beaches, valleys, and mountains.

Kauai, or "The Garden Isle", is also known as "Menehune Land" because ancient lore tells us that pixies and dwarfs made their home there many years ago. This island is noted for its rainfall (the "Wettest Spot in the World" is here) and its chief tourist attraction - Waimea Canyon, the "Grand Canyon of Hawaii". I've been there once, on a Navy flight, but didn't do any sightseeing, as I stayed only half an hour.

Molokai is fifth in size of the Hawaiian group. Called the "Friendly Isle" it is completely indifferent to anything resembling modernization. It is on Molokai that Kalaupapa peninsula houses the settlement for Hansen's disease (leprosy), and where the famous Catholic priest, Father Damien, devoted his life to the patients there un-

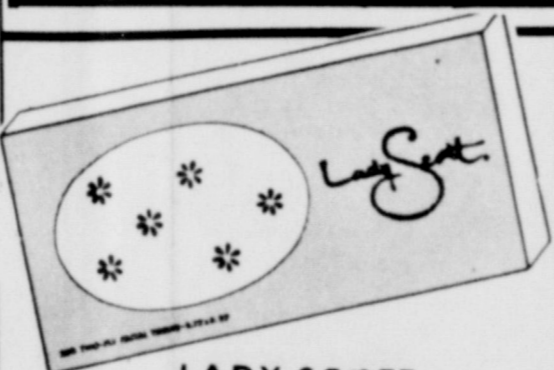

2. For the purpose of said election, North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority is divided into four election precincts. All of the territory of the Authority contained in the City of Goree shall be known as the "Goree Precinct"; all of the territory contained in the City of Knox City shall be known as the "Knox City Precinct"; all of the territory contained in the City of Munday shall be known as the "Munday Precinct"; and all of the territory contained in the City of Haskell shall be known as the "Haskell Precinct".

3. (a) The election in the Goree Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Goree, Texas, Mrs. G. W. Weber is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and she shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist her in holding said election.

(b) The election in the Knox

City Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Knox City, Texas. Mr. Otis Harbert is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(c) The election in the Munday Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Munday, Texas. Mr. E. H. Nelson is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(d) The election in Haskell Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Haskell, Texas. Mr. C. H. Herren is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and three clerks to assist him in holding said election.

4. That said election shall be held under the laws governing general elections, except as otherwise provided in the law creating said Authority. Two classes of voters shall vote in two separate ballot boxes at this bond election. The two classes of voters are as follows:

(a) legally qualified electors residing within said Authority who own taxable property in said Authority and who have duly rendered the same for taxation; and

(b) legally qualified electors residing within said Authority.

6. The Authority expects to receive a grant from the United States for part of the cost of constructing the water supply project. An Open Letter to the People of Texas...

The availability of an adequate supply of water has always made the difference between prosperity and want--between plenty and famine. For these reasons, water has played a major role in the Texas story--has been the essential element in placing a State known for wide open spaces in the position of sustaining--

- The Nation's third largest population by 1985;
- A high rate of growth in business, industry and finance;
- The Nation's third largest agricultural industry.

Our State's growth projections in these areas nearly defies imagination, and yet experts tell us that these projections and future prosperity cannot be realized unless giant steps are taken now to assure Texas' future water resources.

The Texas Water Plan was developed to make maximum use of the available water in our State and to provide for additional out-of-state water as needed. This work has taken place during all of our administrations as Governor of Texas. The Plan comes to its first real public test on August 5, 1969, when you, the voters of Texas, are being asked to approve Constitutional Amendment No. Two, which will authorize the Texas Water Development Board to sell up to \$3.5 billion in additional bonds over a 40-year period, in amounts as needed--money that will eventually be repaid by water users.

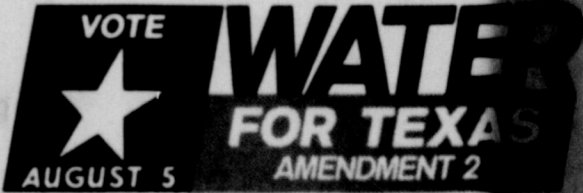
