The Cattleman's Round-Up in the fall comes at a time when the Center is usually in one of its toughest financial periods. The annual Rehab Telethon, along with cash donations, helps ride the cost of therapy and operations of the physical facility each year. But this generally cannot be stretched out completely until the fall Round-Up. The Center historically faces a large debt by each September as it serves more and more handicapped individuals and expands its range of services.

The goal of this year's Round-Up was set at \$150,000 to keep the Center in operation for another quarter. There are three phases of the Round-Up left to go, beginning with the Horse Sale at Abilene Livestock Auction, Saturday at 1:00 p.m. The Special Sale in Coleman will be on October 6 and the Farm Equipment Sale will be on November 6 at Lawn. The first phase, however, usually must come up with two-thirds of the total goal--the reason why the Monday cattle sale was so crucial.


Carnival **Postponed**







Mrs. Logan's winning recipe, in the bread category, Oatmeal Molasses Loaf, was given to the News office for publication on request and the recipe is as follows:

OATMEAL MOLASSES LOAF

2 pkgs. dry yeast 1/2 C. warm water 1/2 C. heated milk

1 C. hot water 1/4 C. shortening 4 teaspoons salt

1/3 C. molasses

71/4 to 71/4 C. sifted All-Purpose Flour 21/2 C. Quick or Old-Fashioned Oats (uncooked)

Soften yeast in the 1/2 cup of warm water. Pour hot milk and hot water over shortening, salt and molasses in a large bowl. Cook until lukewarm. Stir in 2 C. of flour and add softened yeast and oats. Then stir in enough flour to make a stiff

Turn dough out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth or elastic (8 to 10 minutes). Shape into ball and place in large greased bowl. Cover and let rise in warm place until it doubles in size (1 hour).

Punch dough down, cover and let rest ten minutes, then grease two loaf pans (9 x 5 x 3) and sprinkle the bottom and sides of pan with two tablespoons of oats. Divide dough in half and shape in two loaves. Place in prepared loaf pans and brush lightly with milk. If desired, sprinkle two tablespoons of crushed oats on the top and then let rise until it has nearly doubled in size.

Bake in preheated moderate oven at 350 degrees F for 40 to 45 minutes. Remove from pans and cool on a rack.

Davis says that even if the cattle supply is cut back by 1977 there will still be beef price fluctuations caused by fluctuating feedgrain prices.

"If feedgrain prices go up, there will probably be more non-fed cattle slaughtered and lower beef prices this fall. On the other hand, if feedgrain prices fall, there should be more movement of cattle to feedlots, delaying marketing and resulting in higher prices during the fall."
