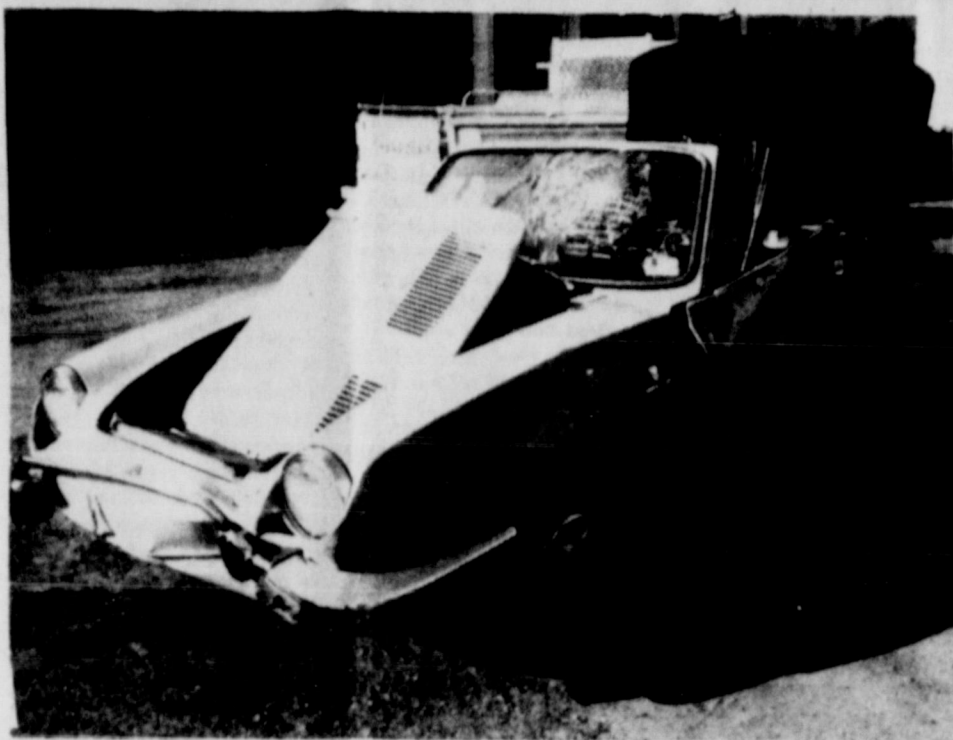
Carnival Postponed

Knox City Lions Club president John McGaughey advised the News office Monday of this week that the eighteenth annual club carnival is being postponed because carnival rides could not be secured for this year's event which had been scheduled September 27-28.

Every effort had been made to contact J.B. Steinbeck's Central State Shows who had provided the rides for many years. No word had been received until Friday, Mr. McGaughey said, when officials learned that W. W. Moser who owned the rides, died about two weeks ago. Mr. Moser's sister and her husband, the J.B. Steinbecks of Electra, had always made schedule arrangements for the show, but after his death, no plans have been made to continue. However, Mr. McGaughey said they did tell him that possible next year some sort of schedule might be resumed.

Mr. McGaughey went on to explain that other companies had been contacted in regard to the rides, but none of these would agree to let the Lions Club maintain the booths from which most of the club's profits come during the annual fund-raising carnival.

As for now, Lions Club members feel that it would be wise to postpone the carnival until other arrangements can be made for the rides.

Gary Carver Killed In Car Crash

A Knox City youth, Gary Dean Carver, 19, was dead on arrival at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene following an accident Wednesday night of last week. The tragedy occurred about 7:15 o'clock when the car he was driving was "struck broadside" as he was leaving the parking lot of the KC Drive In grocery store

near the south city limits on State Highway 6.

Carver's small foreign car was in collision with a north-bound vehicle driven by Albino Garcia, 16, of Rule. Carver was thrown from the car, according to Department of Public Safety highway patrolman Brian Williams, investigating officer.

Funeral services were held Friday morning at 10:30 in the First Baptist Church with a former pastor, the Rev. Roger Butler of Cleburne, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. Hardy Cole, Methodist minister of Munday. Burial was in the Johnson Memorial Cemetery at Munday under the direction of Smith Funeral Home.

Gary was born November 11, 1956, in Knox City. His parents, James Carl Carver and Vera Louise Robinson Carver, both died in 1958, and he was reared by an aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Smith. He had lived in Knox City all his life and attended the Knox City Schools, where he was a popular student and

active in athletics, band, and choir. He was a member of the Baptist church.

Survivors include his foster parents, Bill and Johnnie Pearl Smith of the home; two foster brothers, Freddie Strickland of Brownwood and Glenn Smith of Stamford; and grandparents, Mrs. Vera Mae Carver of Munday, W.H. Robinson of Fort Worth, Glenn Smith of Munday, and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Harper of Plainview.

O'Brien Gins First Cotton

The season's first bale of cotton was ginned last Friday, September 24, by the O'Brien Coop Gin, according to gin manager Samuel Tankersley. In fact, Tankersley reported that 20 more bales were ginned that same day and since then, an additional 26 bales, making a total of 46, all from the E.H. Tankersley Jr. place two miles southeast of Knox City.

The dryland cotton was off a 100-acre plot and turnout was close to 25 per cent. Tankersley said that the grade on the first 20 bales was 42.15 and was strict low midling, light spot 15-16.

Last year's first bale also from one of E.H. Tankersley's farms, was ginned the latter part of October, so this year's is running about a month ahead, a gin manager noted.

Mrs. Neal Logan of Knox City has been chosen as one of the \$10 prize winners in the National Oats Company, Inc. third annual "Big-Little" recipe contest.

Mrs. Logan's winning recipe, in the bread category, Oatmeal Molasses Loaf, was given to the News office for publication on request and the recipe is as follows:

OATMEAL MOLASSES LOAF

- 2 pkgs. dry yeast
- 1 C. hot water
- 1/2 C. warm water
- 1/4 C. shortening
- 1/2 C. heated milk
- 4 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 C. molasses
- 7/4 to 7/4 C. sifted All-Purpose Flour
- 2 1/2 C. Quick or Old-Fashioned Oats (uncooked)

Soften yeast in the 1/2 cup of warm water. Pour hot milk and hot water over shortening, salt and molasses in a large bowl. Cook until lukewarm. Stir in 2 C. of flour and add softened yeast and oats. Then stir in enough flour to make a stiff dough.

Turn dough out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth or elastic (8 to 10 minutes). Shape into ball and place in large greased bowl. Cover and let rise in warm place until it doubles in size (1 hour).

Punch dough down, cover and let rest ten minutes, then grease two loaf pans (9 x 5 x 3) and sprinkle the bottom and sides of pan with two tablespoons of oats. Divide dough in half and shape in two loaves. Place in prepared loaf pans and brush lightly with milk. If desired, sprinkle two tablespoons of crushed oats on the top and then let rise until it has nearly doubled in size.

Bake in preheated moderate oven at 350 degrees F for 40 to 45 minutes. Remove from pans and cool on a rack.

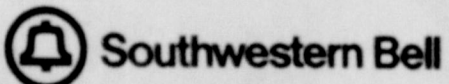

It is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish an 18 percent increase in the company's intra-state gross revenues.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas.

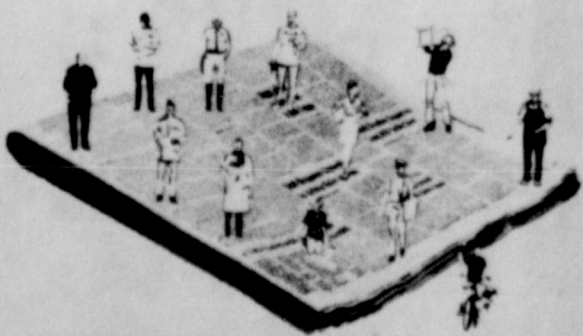

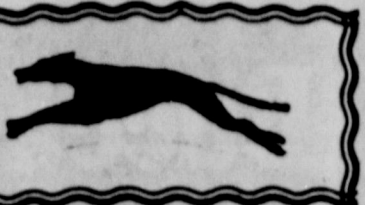

The executive committee functions in a decision making capacity for the district. One of the responsibilities of the committeepersons is to evaluate the president's program.

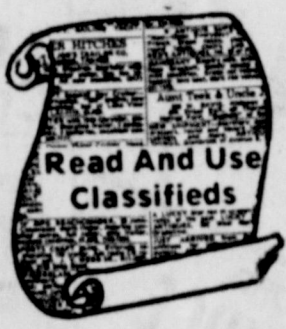


