Below is some news that was edited by the New Mexico Leader—and we think it's worth passing on to you. What with talk of new taxes it isn't very funny—but interesting:

Hey, Uncle, how much does it cost to rear a child? You allow us taxpaying parents only \$300 yearly to feed, clothe, house and train a youngster. In your Federal Job Corps you spend \$7,000 a year per head.

Now which is the correct figure? Either we are allowing you too much or you're not allowing us enough.

You allow a \$600 deduction for care and feeding of a child—under the Cuban refugee program you assume minimal upkeep requires \$1,200 a year, with an extra \$1,000 if the Cuban boy or girl is attending school.

How come you shortchange the homefolks?

In austere environs of a federal prison you have discovered that it costs to maintain one person, with no frills, no luxuries or borrowing Dad's car, \$2,300 per person per year.

By what rule of thumb do you estimate Mom and Dad can do for one-fourth of that amount?

Under social security you will pay \$18 a month to maintain an elderly person. What makes you think we can maintain a young one for \$50 a month?

And, Uncle, your VISTA program (Volunteers in Service for America) spent \$3.1 million last fiscal year to turn our 202 trainees. That indicates that cost of maintaining and training one youth for one year costs more than \$15,000!

Or, let's see how much you spend upkeeping one youngster in military uniform. House \$35.20 per month, food \$30.27 a month, clothing upkeep \$4.20 a month. That comes to \$1,076.04 yearly.

How in the world do you expect parents to provide all those things, plus clothes, recreation, books, medicine and so on, for \$600 a year? By your own figures you admit it can't be done.

Is it possible, Uncle, that you expect us parents to manage more efficiently than you do?

With all our expenses, in total we Americans as individuals have more than enough savings to meet our debts. You don't.

With all our prosperity you, Uncle, are still spending per year \$2.9 billion more for relief than during the depression's death. So it may be that you are uncommonly extravagant.

But however we try to rationalize and exclaim you, and excuse you, it is still a hurtful affront when you allow us hard working dues paying homefolks only \$600 a year to rear a legitimate child, while, under ADC, you will pay more than \$800 a year for the upkeep of an illegitimate one!

The effort has been labeled "Operation Doorbell." Similar projects have been received enthusiastically in other communities.

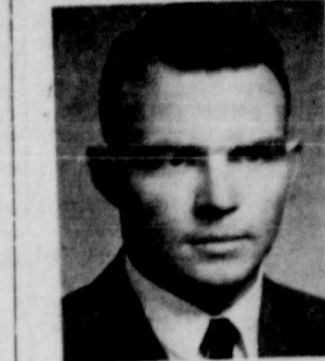

## David Counts To Be Cited For Heroism In Lowake Plane Crash, Saturday



David Counts, a National Guard captain, will be cited for heroism Saturday by the National Guard Assn. of Texas during the 7th annual meeting of the Guard group in San Antonio and will receive the K. L. Berry award during the group's awards dinner and military ball Saturday night. David was aboard a Piper

Apache plane which crashed at mid-afternoon on the Andrew Schwertner farm near Lowake in Concho County, August 27, 1965. The crash killed the pilot, Aubrey Graham of Amarillo and a second man, Knox City Attorney Bill Sams, who died a short while later, despite Counts' efforts to save him. Counts and the other passenger, James E. Hill, editor of the Knox County Herald, survived.

The citation recommending the award said Counts' "alertness and quick action probably saved the life" of one passenger and "prolonged life of another in a vain attempt to free him from the wreckage."

The Citation said Counts received head, hip, arm, wrist and leg injuries, yet "worked constantly, without concern for his own safety and well being, in order to save or attempt to save the lives of his friends."

## Gilliland Student, Philip Cook, Writes Winning Essay For Knox Co. Progress

This is the second in a series of winning essays from schools in Knox County entitled "Knox County's 80 Years of Progress." This week's essay by Philip Cook of Gilliland, was as follows:

The progress of Knox County since 1886 has been slow but steady. By 1890 the population of the county was 1,134 due to the efforts of Captain Robert G. Goree who came as a cattleman to Northwest Texas in 1882. He opened up the land to agriculture by securing migrations from other places. By 1910 it was 9,265. The population in 1950 was 10,048. It has been going down since 1940. The farms now are fewer, larger, and number 663. The big machinery we have now can farm much more land. There are 4,000 acres of Coastal Bermuda grass

for permanent pasture. Twenty-six thousand acres are irrigated for cotton, grains, potatoes, and truck crops. Much of the county's area is in beef cattle ranches. Three fourths of farm income comes from crops. The total farm income is \$8,484,065.

The annual rainfall is 23.91. But this is supplemented by irrigation wells.

The county's mineral value is worth \$7,146,434. The oil barrels total 2,185,000. Lands to the North have been leased to one major oil company recently.

Education plays an important part in the progress of Knox County. A new high school is going up at Munday and new funds for remedial work has set the road for progress.



# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN—Texas has some 615,000 new voters as a result of the March 3-17 free registration period.

Turnout was six times larger than state officials had predicted and could be an indicator of a

drawing new era in Texas politics.

More than half the total came from four big counties — Harris with an estimated 100,000; Dallas with 96,017; Bexar with 88,100 and Tarrant with 50,662.

Gubernatorial candidate Stanley C. Woods and two members of the State Democratic Executive Committee are attempting to intervene in the federal court action resulting from the poll tax suit and force reopening of the registration period. They are urging the court to allow registration up until 30 days before each election.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr is strongly opposing the motion — arguing that all Texans interested in voting this year had ample opportunity to sign up during the 15-day period provided by the Legislature.

Federal judges have promised a decision — after they review evidence — on whether the period should be lengthened.

Carr has submitted a 7,500-page report (including 3,500 newspaper articles from 500 Texas newspapers) to support his claim that everybody who wants to vote got a chance to qualify.

**APRIL ALLOWABLE RAISED** — Texas Railroad Commission, at a time when oil demand usually lightens, has raised statewide oil allowable for April to 33.7 per cent of potential.

Increase was the seventh straight monthly boost. Only once before in the last 20 years has April allowable been higher than March.

New allowable permits maximum production of 3,199,550 barrels a day. March operation is under 33.2 per cent of potential factor, permitting production of 3,170,316 barrels daily.

**FEDERAL FUNDS** — Texans hope to have eight new programs approved by the federal government by April 1 to launch a venture to promote technical services for business and industry.

Under the State Technical Services Act of 1965, programs approved by the U. S. Department of Commerce would make available new scientific and technological discoveries to inquiring businesses, industries and commercial enterprises.

Texas now is seeking \$144,000 for the last quarter of this year to get the requested programs started at Texas Woman's University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Southern Methodist University.

Federal funds fully support these planning programs. These eight fields have been suggested in proposals submitted to the Commerce Department:

**DRAFT QUOTA DOWN** — Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service director, says 979 men will be called to fill the April draft quota. This is the lowest call since August, 1965.

Monthly calls in the period from September through March ranged from a low of 1,068 to a high of 1,523.

Pre-induction physical and mental examinations will be given to 3,005 men during April. This also is a reduction from March, when 5,515 were tested.

During the same period, he said, men classified as students rose from 85,000 to 104,000. At the end of January, there were 106,000 men classified in 2-S as students.

**EDUCATION COMMISSIONER NAMED** — Dr. Jack Kenny Williams, Clemson University dean and academic vice president, is Texas' new Commissioner of Higher Education, at a \$40,000-a-year salary.

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System unanimously selected Dr. Williams, offering him \$15,000 more than the governor makes. Some \$17,500 of the total salary will come from private foundations or from members of the coordinating board itself. On August 1, Dr. Williams will assume his far-ranging duties — coordinating activities and planning of 22 state-supported senior colleges and universities and 32 public junior colleges.

Board set hearing for April 4 on staff recommendations for new role and scope of state educational institutions to overhaul and to strengthen the system. Final decision is due April 18. East Texas State University is protesting proposed loss of its doctoral programs and reduction to college classification. Texas Southern University wants to hang onto its law school, which the Board feels should be eliminated.

After requesting an attorney general's opinion on its responsibilities to pass on college buildings financed by general revenue, Board approved \$1,800,000 library addition for Texas College of Arts and Industries, Kingsville, and endorsed purchase of Rosemont Apartments and land by Angelo State College, San Angelo, for \$350,000. Apartments are being used for student housing.

**IMPORTANT ADDITION** — Securities Commissioner William M. King believes a recent decision by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals is an important addition to the legal protection afforded Texas investors against fraudulent practices in the sale of securities.

**Rev. Floyd Bailey Attends Nursing Home Convention**

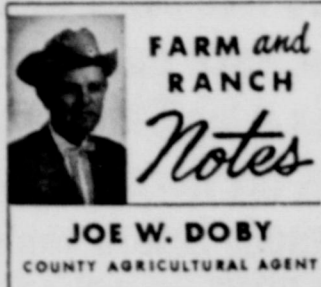

A meeting of all Knox County 4-H Leaders and interested parents will be held in the Courthouse at Benjamin, Thursday, March 31, at 3 p.m. Three adult leaders from the county attended a district meeting in Vernon a few weeks ago. The impression they received from leaders in other counties in the district and from one speaker led them to decide Knox County needed to improve its 4-H program. All interested persons are urged to attend and lend support to the local program.

The 15th annual Swine Short Course will be held at College Station on April 4 and 5. Two of the nation's top authorities on swine research and production will be on the program. They are Dr. A. H. Jensen, University of Illinois and Roy Keppy, national, known commercial swine producer from Davenport, Iowa.

This report course is sponsored annually by the Texas Swine Breeders Association and the Animal Science Department of Texas A&M University. Anyone in the hog business should take time to attend this shortcourse. There are more details on down to earth hog farming given than anywhere we know.

Purebred bulls are worth more in a crossbreeding program according to research at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Center near McGregor.

Walter Kruse, animal husbandryman at the Center, says crossbreeding offers for the first time a truly sophisticated method to prove the value of a purebred bull.

In one test at McGregor, crossbred cows, half Hereford and half Brahman, were mated with a purebred Hereford bull. At the same time, Hereford cows were mated to a crossbred, half Hereford and half Brahman, bull. The calves from both had the same genetic makeup — three-fourths Hereford and one-fourth Brahman.

What happened? Calves from the purebred bull and crossbred cows weighed a good 40 pounds more at 180-day weaning time.

Kruse says this illustrates a vital point to cattlemen — how the cross is made is the key to higher weaning weights. He says A&M research at McGregor has shown time and time again that purebred bulls and crossbred cows are the money makingest combination.

A good set of peaches and plums from the trees which are beginning to bloom isn't assured.

Insect control on fruit trees is largely a preventive program. Once the insects begin to cause damage, little can be done to rid the fruit of the pests and prevent more fruit damaging insects begin their activity and reproduction during the first 30-45 days after the trees begin to bloom. Therefore, insecticides applied during this early period will control the insects which damage fruit later in the season.

Home owners with a few trees are advised to follow a preventive spray program. Malathion or methoxychlor, either in the wettable powder or emulsifiable concentrate forms, are effective for controlling insects.

We recommend four spray applications, timed to coincide with bloom and fruit formation. The first or petal fall spray should be applied when about three-fourths of the bloom petals have shed. The second or shuck split spray should be made about 10 days after most of the petals have shed. The third or first cover spray should follow the second spray in 10 to 14 days and fourth or second cover spray should follow the third application in 14

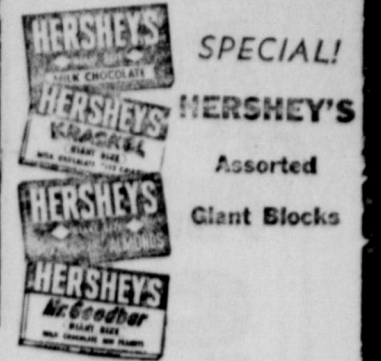

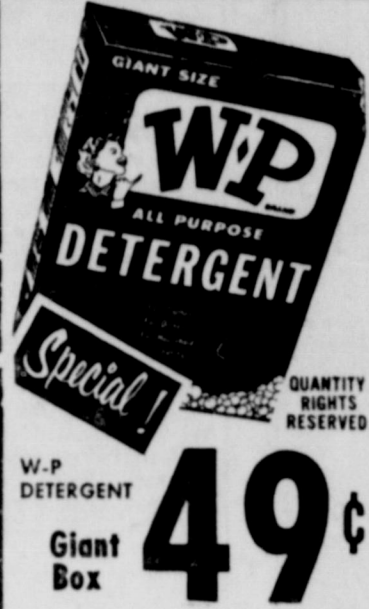

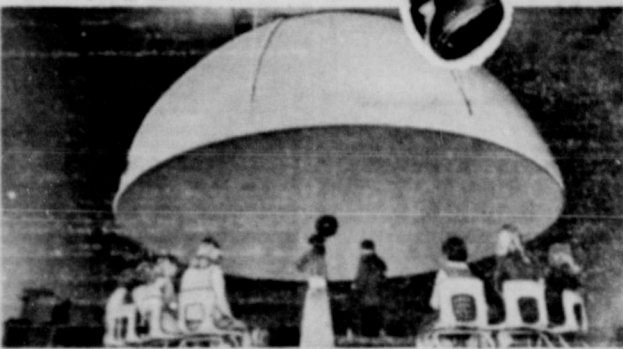

## March 31 Deadline For Crop Insurance

March 31 is the final date for Knox County farmers to take advantage of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation's program of investment protection for cotton and grain sorghum, according to Ben A. Jordan, Jr., State Director for FCIC.

Features of the Federal Crop program when combined with the new ASCS cropland programs make an attractive package that not only insure production costs but provide a minimum income protection — cost plus profit — in the event of crop loss, Jordan says.

Using cotton for example, he says, a farmer with a projected ASCS farm yield of say 334 pounds will receive a price support payment of \$31.46 an acre at the 942 cents a pound level. Coupled with Federal Crop's guarantee of about 140 pounds of quality cotton an acre and a settlement price of 30 cents a pound, the farmer would receive an additional \$21.00 an acre if a loss occurs before first blooms are shed or \$33.60 an acre if the loss is after the first blooms and before harvest.

Deducting the low FCIC premium, a farmer is guaranteed a minimum under the two programs of about \$48.76 an acre or \$61.36 an acre depending upon when the loss occurs.

Federal Crop Insurance has provided almost \$1,500,000 in guaranteed income protection for Knox County farmers against loss of crops from unavoidable natural hazards since its inception in the county. During this same period Knox County farmers have received direct payments in excess of \$175,000 for damage to cotton and grain sorghum crops.

As a non-profit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation has been a leader in providing an economic boost to agriculture in the county at the time it is sorely needed — when farmers lose their crops, Jordan says.
