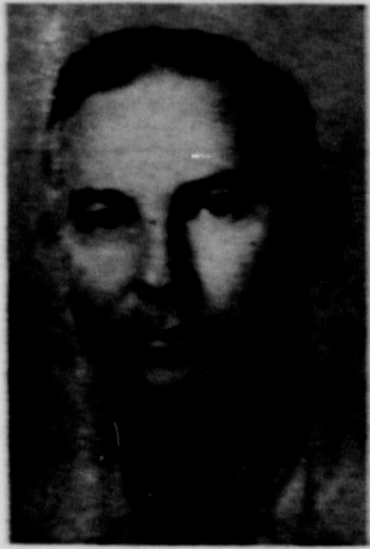

On his plane trip over, Vinita went direct from New York to Rome and then to Lagos, Africa.

### Over 92,000 Feet Parallel Terraces Completed In Knox Area During Year

Parallel terracing continues to be very popular in the Wichita-Brasas Soil Conservation District according to Archie Lieb, Work Unit Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Knox City.

Lieb reported that over 92,000 feet of parallel terraces were completed in the Knox City work area for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1966. Even more parallel terraces will be constructed this year. Lieb continues, with 150,000 feet scheduled in Great Plains Conservation Program contracts.

Some were recently completed on E. L. Berger, C. C. Hutchinson, and Paul Matus farms. Terraces are now under construction on the K. E. Baker and F. F. Jarvis and Homer Black farms. Lines are being run

on the Elton McSwain farm. Scheduled for construction this year are parallel systems for Elvis Blaise, J. W. Ziesse, Lee Smith, Joe Bailey King and Dwight C. Key.

There are many conventional terrace systems in the District which are inadequate. Many have been damaged by heavy rains. Why not replace your conventional system with a parallel system?

The advantages of a parallel system are many. Employees of the Soil Conservation Service will be glad to review these advantages with you and they encourage you to inspect a parallel system to see the difference.

Cost sharing assistance under provisions of A.C.P. and G.P.C.P. is available.

Mosquito spraying of Knox City was begun last week and will continue as long as it is needed in combating mosquitoes according to an announcement made by Jack Land, City Water Superintendent.

No emergency exists here and there have been no reports of encephalitis but city crews will be fogging and oiling as long as there is any chance of a mosquito threat.

Residents here are asked to cooperate in the fight against mosquitoes by eliminating breeding spots—by seeking out places around their homes and businesses with such measures as—

- Empty, remove, cover or turn upside down old bottles, tin cans, or any other receptacles that would hold water.
- Discard old tires, or store them inside.
- Clean clogged roof gutters and drain flat roofs.
- Repair leaky plumbing and outside faucets which may cause standing water.
- Connect open waste water drains.
- Fill holes in trees with sand or mortar or spray them.
- Change water and scrub vases holding flowers or cutting. Screen water barrels and openings in cisterns and seal cisterns not in actual use.
- Land called specific attention to evaporative water coolers—drain and clean them often.
- The water sup. also said that with the heavy rains this week there will be water standing in low places for a day or so—but these will be covered thoroughly with spraying equipment—the places to be watched by citizens are those mentioned above which can best be done by residents.

Malathion, an effective chemical will be used in the City fogging machine, according to Mayor Buddy Angle.

### And The Rains Came

During the past week, Knox City has had rain, plenty of rain, that is. The rains began last Wednesday but the rain on Tuesday of this week made the news. During the early morning hours of Tuesday and until noon, amounts varied from .65 ins to the southeast of Knox City to 1.2 inch south of the city. Only 2 inches were recorded on the Earl Watson farm about 3 miles due north of town, but the Plant Materials Center 6 miles north west of town recorded 4.88 for the day. Within the town, gauges recorded about 1.5 inches. Some farms west of O'Brien had approximately 4 inches, during the morning. Rochester to the south reported up to 10 inches Tuesday.

Waco Street, better-known as Canal Street, ran bank-to-bank from daylight until well after dark. Youngsters enjoyed the "free swimming" offered by the "river".

The highway from O'Brien to Knox City was under water, and the farm-to-market road to Kutz field southwest of town was closed. Low dips on the Blumley highway saw water up to car doors. Officials feared some dirt might be done Wednesday morning to a culvert on the new farm-to-market road north of town where it turns west to the Plant Materials Center as water continued to run.

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## Amendment Number 8 Will Decide If The Rancher Pays Taxes On Land Or The Productive Value Of The Land

Texas voters will decide how agricultural land of our state will be taxed by voting either for or against the first constitutional amendment in the November 8 general election, according to Oscar Spann, Knox County Farm Bureau president.

"For the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use

shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Should the amendment pass, owners of agricultural land will be taxed according to the productive value of the land.

"Passage of this amendment will save Texas farmers and ranchers 86 million dollars annually," said C. H. DeVaney, Texas Farm Bureau president.

## Machines Read Quarterly Social Security Reports

Equipment that can read and at the rate of over 650 lines a minute began operation at Social Security headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland, this month, Edwin Draughon, social security district manager said today.

Called the Optical Page Reader, the equipment is a sophisticated character recognition device capable of reading more than 200 different type faces and is the most advanced optical scanning system in operation in the world.

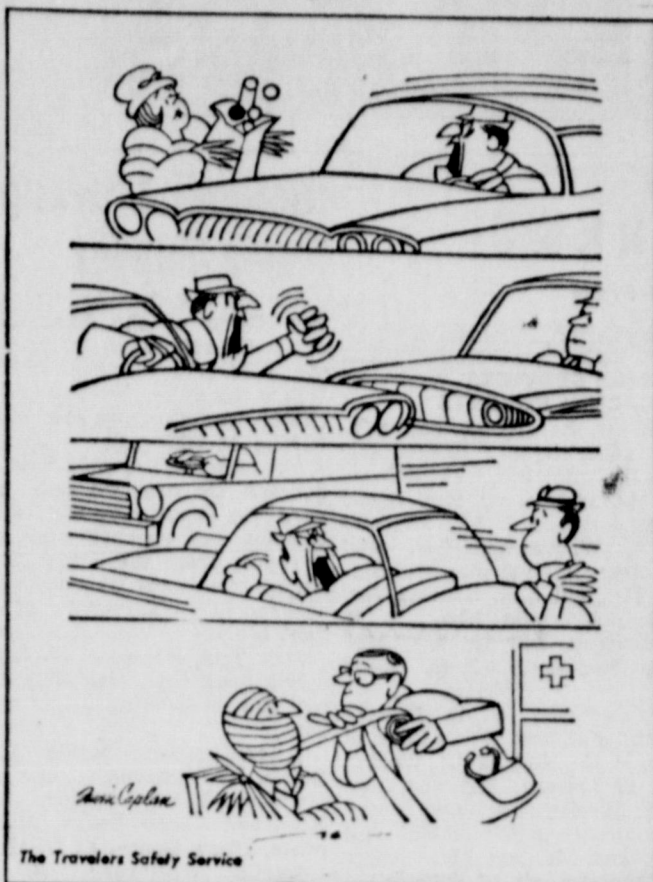
The new system, built by IBM to Social Security Administration specifications will be used to read the quarterly reports of employees' earnings made by the nation's 3 and one-half million industrial employers and to write the information directly on magnetic tape for processing by the Social Security Administration's computers. It is expected to result in annual cash savings of more than \$750,000 a year.

Until now information in employers' wage reports — the employee's name his social security account number, and the wages paid to him during a calendar quarter — has been punched out cards by key punch operators. The punched cards were then run through a "card-to-tape" machine which translated it electronically on to magnetic tape.

The Optical Page Reader eliminates the need for key punching information on those employer reports prepared by business machines, computer printers, or standard typewriters. Through a highly advanced character system, the scanner can read more than 200 typewriter or tabulator fonts, in upper and lower case format, including both alphabetical and numeric information.

about half of the 70 million entries on individual social security records made in the Social Security Administration each calendar quarter of the year.

The manual card punch system will continue to be used to transcribe handwritten reports, and sections of other reports that are set aside by the Optical Page Reader because of strikeovers or other flaws.

The installation of the new optical scanning equipment is another step in the application of electronics to social security record keeping, begun 15 years ago, Mr. Draughon said.

With the new medicare program in operation, the hospital insurance and voluntary medical insurance eligibility records of medicare beneficiaries are also being kept up to date by the Social Security Administration's data processing system.

The use of electronic data processing in the Social Security Administration's massive recording keeping task has insured accuracy and saved millions of dollars in social security tax contributions. "These savings," Mr. Draughon said, "have enabled the Social Security to continue to provide direct, personal service to the public at social security district offices around the country and to conserve social security and health insurance trust fund money for the payment of social benefits."

Lichtenstein stated that Scott's excellent scholastic record, high grades, outstanding ability and leadership as a student has won him a distinct honor. Mr. Scott is working on his master's in electronic engineering.

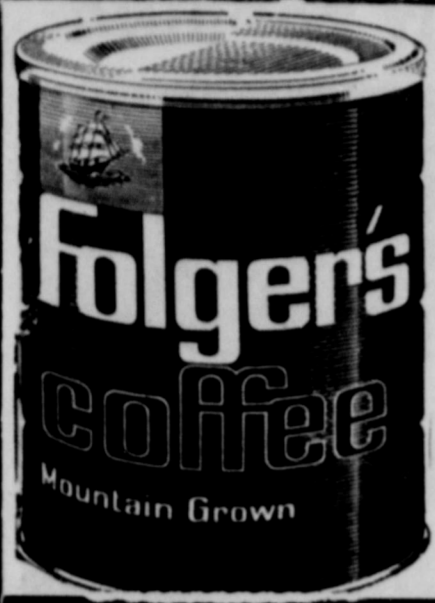

Add lukewarm milk mixture, beaten eggs, grated orange peel and half the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic, about 8-10 minutes. Place dough in greased bowl; turning once to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Meanwhile prepare topping. Melt 1 cup Fleischmann's Margarine. Stir in 1 1/2 cups light brown sugar and 1 cup chopped Planters Dry Roasted Peanuts. Spoon into greased muffin pans. Combine remaining 1 cup light brown sugar, remaining 1/2 cup chopped Planters Dry Roasted Peanuts and cinnamon.

Punch dough down. Divide dough in half. Roll out each half to a 12-inch square. Sprinkle each half with the brown sugar-peanut mixture. Roll up lengthwise as for a jelly roll. Cut into 1-inch slices and place in prepared pans. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) about 25 minutes or until done.

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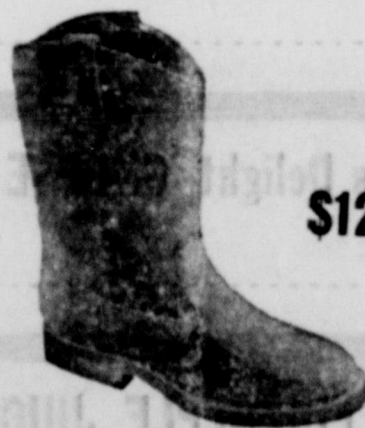
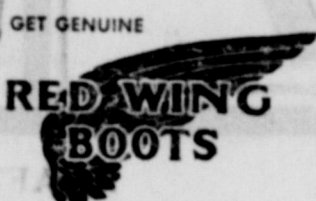
