HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT The Texas Highway De partment offered an opportunity for a public hearing to be requested by publication on February 14th and February 21st, 1974, of a notice reporting the proposed improvement of F.M. Road 143, extending from the junction of State Highway 283 and State Highway 222. West and Northwest to F.M. Road 143. The proposed project will pass through a portion of the City of Knox City, in Knox

No requests for a public hearing were received; therefore, the District Office of the Texas Highway Department, at Childress, Texas, has submetted all of the engineering data and information received in connection with the development of this project for approval of the proposed route and design by the Administration of the Texas Highway Department.

The proposed construction consists of concrete curb and cutter, grading, structures, and base and surfacing of the route relocation which will provide a more direct route or the continuity of State Highway 222 and F.M. Road 143. A 64-foot curb and gutter municipal section is proposed in the City of Knox City, from Main Street to the Santa Fe Railroad crossing. where it will transition into a 20-foot paved surface rural

A minimum of 90 feet of right of way will be required for the three-block section from Main Street (S.H. 283) to the railroad, and a minimum of 100 feet will be required from the railroad west to the tie-in with the existing F.M. 143. New right of way will be required for the realignment; however, there will be no displaced persons or businesses, or relocations,

on the project Maps, drawings showing geometric design, environmental studies, and all other available data concerning the development of this project may be inspected and copied at the office of Alvin D. Alexander, Assoc. Resident Engineer, Munday, Texas.







# Plant Sales KC Colored Set Mar. 30 News-Events

According to their classified ad in this week's News the horticulture class of Knox City High School will be having a plant sale Saturday. March 30, at 9:00 a.m. and will run through the day. Everyone is invited to also tour the greenhouse, located between the high school and the agriculture building while attending the sale.

The class, with eleven students enrolled, is under the supervision of Jim Dillon, horticulture teacher. The students planted the seeds for their plants in January and later transplanted them into individual pots. The plants have been sprayed for insects and some are about to bloom, Dillon said.

The students will have about 10,000 plants of many varieties including about 100 geraniums.



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
