Charlie was injured during the Crowell and Knox City football game here October 2.

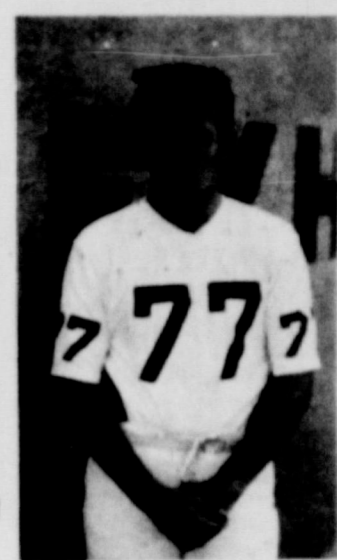

Seven KC Boys Place At Punt, Pass, And Kick Contest In Haskell Sat.

Knox City boys competing in the annual Nationwide Punt, Pass, and Kick contest held on the Indian football practice field at Haskell Saturday, October 3, again walked off with the top awards.

Awards were presented to each of the top three boys in each of the six age groups between eight and thirteen. Four Knox City first place winners, Danny Lewis, David Anderson, Rondall Sanders and Jimmy Ross, will be in Abilene Saturday, October 10, at Rose Park, to compete in the district contest.

Boys bringing trophies back to Knox City included Rondall Sanders, 1st in 9-yr. olds; Jimmy Rushing, 2nd in 9-yr. olds; David Anderson, 1st in 10-yr. olds; Tommy Mangis, 2nd in 10-yr. olds; Jimmy Ross, 1st in 12-yr. olds; Danny Lewis, 1st in 13-yr. olds; and Johnny Espinosa, 3rd in 13-yr. olds.

Danny, who has placed in the event with three firsts and three seconds for the past six years, entered the competition for the last time this year due to the 13-year-old age limit.

Two KC Men Named Outstanding Young Men

David Counts and Paul Clayton, Knox City businessmen, have been selected for inclusion in the 1970 edition of Outstanding Young Men of America. Nominated earlier this year, the two were chosen for the publication on the basis of their achievements.

Doug Blankenship, past U. S. Jaycee president (1962-63) who is serving as Chairman of the Board of Advisory Editors, said that the men selected "have distinguished themselves in one or more fields of endeavor to the point of being outstanding."

Over 5,000 young men between the ages of 21 and 35 are nominated for the awards publication now in its seventh year. The purpose of the publication is to recognize and honor the young men in our country who are working toward excellence in their careers and community service. Criteria for selection includes each man's service to others, professional excellence, business advancements, charitable activities, and civic and professional recognition.

Counts, a graduate of Rule High School, attended West Texas State University in Canyon and North Texas State University in Denton. He enlisted in the Texas National Guard in 1953, Company M 3rd Bn., 142nd Inf. in Stamford. He was

awarded a spot promotion in 1956, along with six other men, who passed a test given to 1008 guardsmen of like time in service.

Counts graduated eighth in a class of 314 from Advanced Non Commissioned Officers School at Fort Benning, Georgia, in 1957, and graduated from Infantry Officer Candidate School there in 1959. He was commissioned in 1959 as Infantry Platoon Leader of Co. A, 1st Bn., 142nd Inf. until the unit was reorganized.

For three years he served as aide-de-camp to Brig. Gen. R. M. Krieger and commanded Co. C., 1st Bn., 142nd Inf. until his promotion to captain two years later.

In 1965 Counts received the Major Gen. K. L. Berry Award for Heroism demonstrated during and following the crashing of a private plane. He has served on the staff of the 111th Engineer Bn., 342nd Engineers Light Equipment of Abilene and is now serving on the staff of Arrowhead Emergency Operations Headquarters there.

Counts is a successful businessman having opened a private insurance agency in 1960 and later purchasing the Roy Smith agency in August of 1967. He is married to the former Mary E. Mullins of Haskell and is the father of two children.

Knox City - Area farmers and ranchers and other interested individuals are encouraged to attend a gopher control demonstration scheduled for 10 a.m. Wednesday at the E. C. Claburn orchard located four miles northwest of Sunset School.

Buck Aday with the U. S. Department of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service, Fort Worth, will be on hand with three-point hitch Burrow-builder and treated grain to conduct the demonstration.

Gophers are destroying plas-

tic water lines and damaging the roots of apple trees in the orchard jointly owned by Claburn and Dr. Jimmy Harber of Odessa.

A considerable number of Knox County farmers and ranchers have noted damage on alfalfa, coastal bermuda, and stock pond dams for which the gopher is credited.

County agent Herman Collier said that treated grain will be available for purchase by interested parties at the demonstration.

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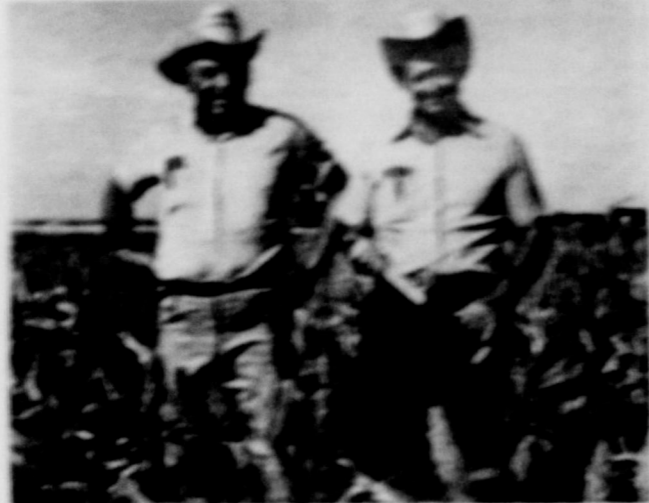
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Annual Session Of Haskell-Knox Baptists To Be Held In Haskell

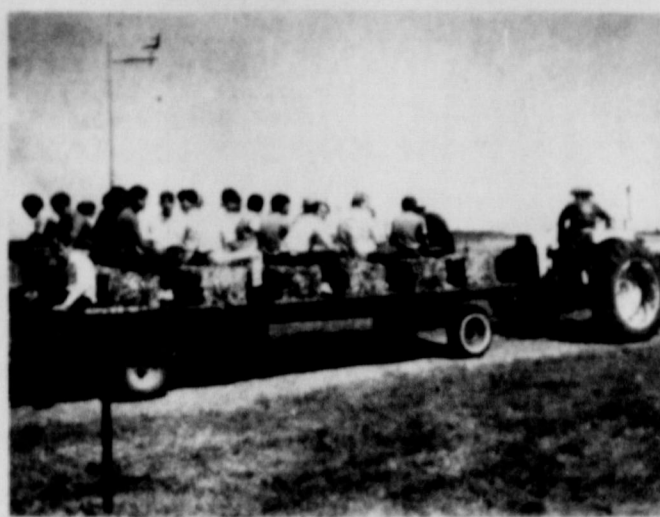

Coaches' Comments

The Greyhounds have had an unusual amount of "bad luck" this year as far as injuries are concerned. It also reminds me of what Dr. Pace of Wichita General Hospital told me last Monday after Charlie Lieb's surgery. He stated that in all the years that he had treated football injuries that he had never had a

boy that had received a leg injury that he couldn't fix, but he had had several hundred auto and motorcycle injuries that had crippled for life.

It is unfortunate to lose kids such as Charlie Lieb, Rogers Lankford, and Netro Gonzales, but this is very typical of life itself. Everything doesn't go according to your plans sometimes and you have to make adjustments. Those individuals who can adjust are the ones who make the best citizens and contribute more.

This is exactly like our football team. If our players are willing to make the adjustments and give the effort and keep their poise and pride, we will continue to do all right, and get a Mogul Friday night for the first time in eleven years.

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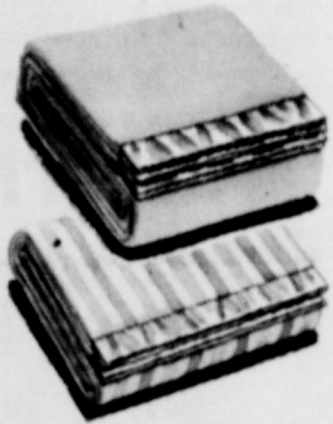
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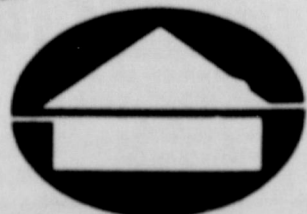

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

SHORT COURSES FOR BEEF PRODUCERS ANNOUNCED

College Station - Beef producers in Texas aren't passing up any opportunities to increase the efficiency of their operations, including the use of newer practices in breeding and handling of their cow herds.

Because of the increasing interest in and requests for training in the use of two practices, artificial insemination and pregnancy determination, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring along with American Breeders Service two short courses for those who will use the information in their own operations.

John R. Beverly, Extension animal reproduction specialist, said the short courses would be held October 26-30 at San Angelo and November 2-6 at Hockley, near Houston. Beverly added that this is the first time in Texas for this type of training which will be in depth. Aside from the actual field training in AI and pregnancy determination, participants will be given detailed information on breeding herd management, including nutrition, disease prevention, selection and records. They will receive a handbook covering the subjects taught.

Beverly said the four days would be equally divided between discussion of breeding herd management and actual field practice in the techniques of AI and pregnancy testing. A practical examination will conclude each short course and those demonstrating acceptable competency in either or both skills will be presented certificates of certification. Students may enroll for either phase of the short course or both, Beverly said. Enrollment will be limited to about 30 students in each short course and advanced registration is requested. Local county agricultural agents can supply details on costs and registration, Beverly said.

The specialist said that pilot programs and training sessions have shown sky-rocketing interest in these new beef management practices. This is the

kind of program progressive ranchers should be able to put into immediate use, Beverly said.

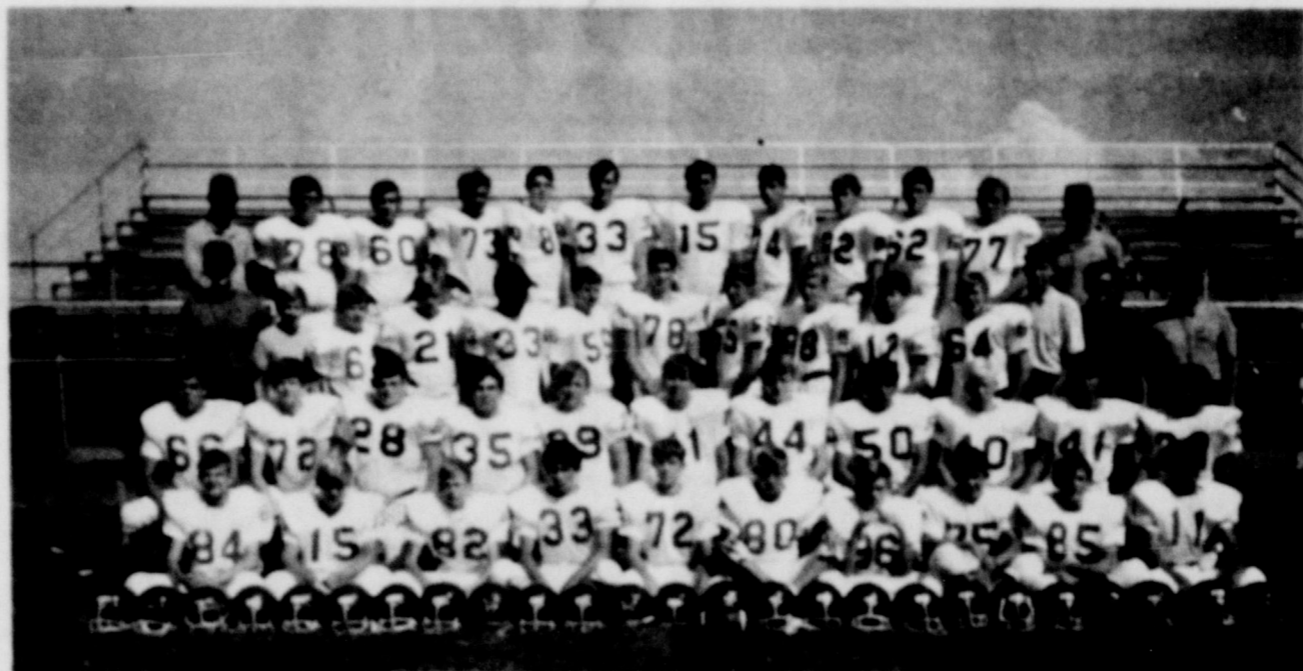

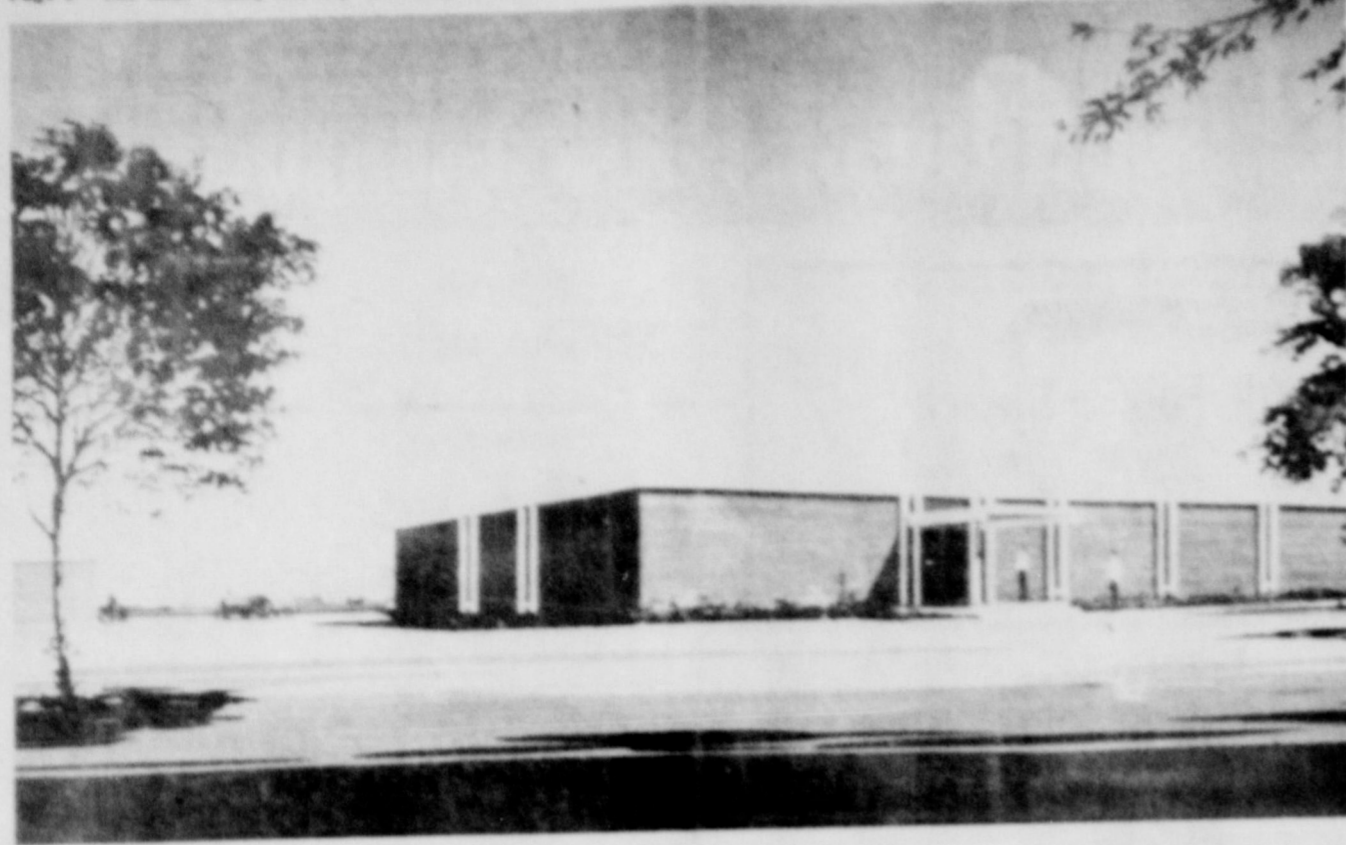

Munday - Ground-Breaking Ceremonies for the Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Center at Munday in cooperation with the Munday Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture will be held Monday, October 12, 1970 at 8:00 p.m. on the site lying north of the Western Motel on Highway 277 East.

VIP's attending the ceremony will be Rep. Graham Purcell, Rep. W. S. (Bill) Heatly, Dr. R. O. Kunkel, Dean of the School of Agriculture at Texas A&M University, acting director of the Texas A&M Experiment Station Dr. John E. Hutchinson, Director of Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University, and representing John C. White, Commissioner of Texas Department of Agriculture, Charlie Chapman.

Monday - Ground-Breaking Ceremonies for the Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Center at Munday in cooperation with the Munday Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture will be held Monday, October 12, 1970 at 8:00 p.m. on the site lying north of the Western Motel on Highway 277 East.

The professional and supporting staff will be increased as the research program is further developed.

The new facility will include laboratories, offices, classrooms, shops and storage area. Dr. Mack C. Fuqua will be in charge of the station.

The major objectives of the Vegetable Research Station are adaptive and basic research studies which are principally on vegetable crops in order to gain information that could increase income from such crops in the Rolling Plains area of Texas in excess of 10 million dollars annually. At the present time the immediate area of Munday is the leading commercial seedless watermelon production area of the United States. This was developed through cooperative research with local growers and station staff during the past three years. There is an additional 40 acres five miles east (near Goree) of the station's headquarters site that was also presented to the University by the Munday Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture for research purposes.

for many years. If the levels continue to increase they could become a health hazard and production. The water pollution research program is designed to determine if current irrigation and fertilizer practices are causing the nitrate nitrogen to increase and to study different irrigation systems, and different fertilizers including sub-irrigation to see if they can be used to decrease pollution. The area is ideal for the study which will have nationwide application.

A twenty-five acre test area has been leased for a three

Kunkel, dean of the A&M College of Agriculture, said additional expenses, such as equipment costs, will later bring the total construction expenditures to about \$150,000.

To Voters In Knox County: WTU

As members of the Democratic County Executive Committee we like to call attention of all our people, regardless of party affiliation, to certain conditions that make this year's general election much more important than usual.

1. All legislative districts will be reorganized and enlarged, due to shifts in population to the cities in the last ten years. Our present Representative, W. S. (Bill) Heatly, is in position, because of his seniority and membership on committees that deal with these important matters, to see that we are not hurt. Our only chance to have an effective voice in State affairs, which are very critical right now, is to keep experienced men like Bill Heatly in office.
