The Downings, along with their four children, Sheri, Teresa, and Carla Downing and Connie Gilbert will spend a two week's vacation in Washington and Oregon from June 4-17, before returning to Knox City and the close of their ministry here.

Members were reminded of the District Convention in Vernon on May 12-13 and called for volunteers to attend as delegates.

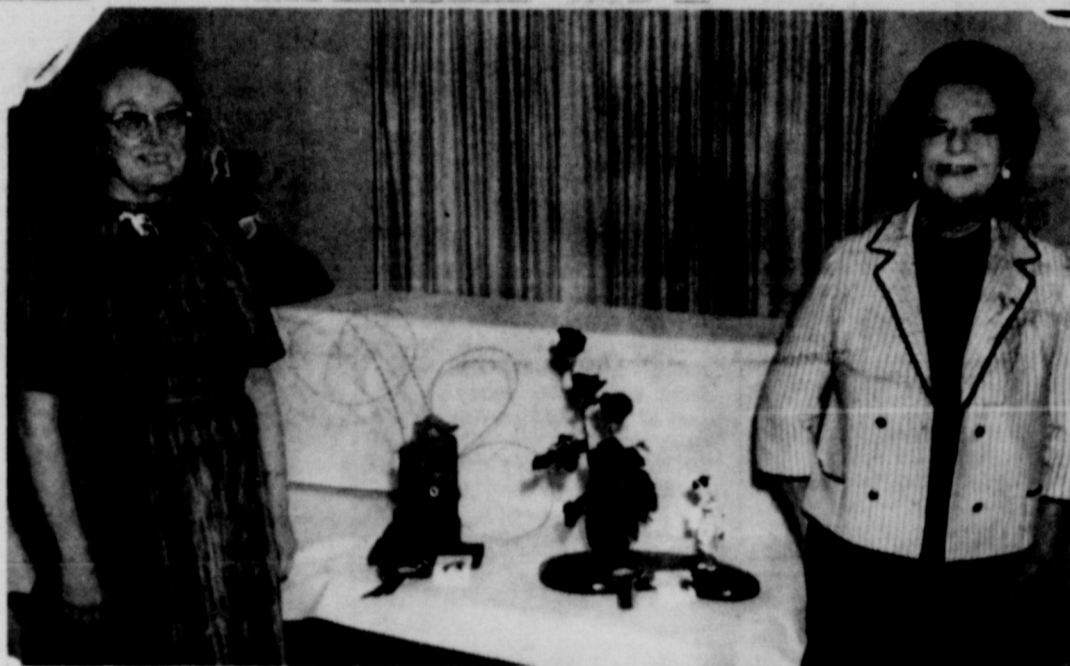
PRESIDENT TO NATIONAL

E. Hob Smith was named chairman of the association and Mrs. C. C. Hoge was unanimously elected secretary-treasurer.

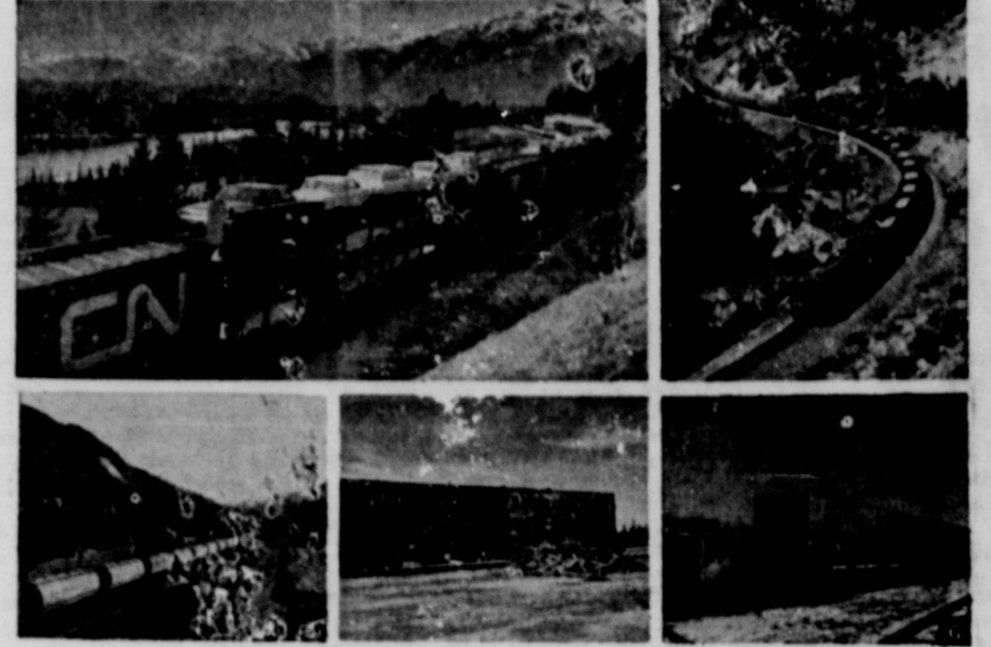
Mr. Smith explained to the group the necessity of keeping the Cemetery Association active in assisting the City of Knox City with the needs of the cemetery.

Bond Quota For Knox City Is 40% Completed

During the first quarter of 1967 the citizens of Knox County purchased \$63,789 in Series E and H United Savings Bonds, according to a report received from W. E. Braly, Chairman of the Knox Co. Savings Bond Committee. 50 per cent of the 1967 goal of \$160,000 has been achieved.

During the first three months of 1967 the sale of U. S. Savings Bonds in Texas totaled \$42,572,284. This is an increase of 10 per cent over the same period of 1966 and 23 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.3 million.

"The new Freedom Shares which go on sale May 1, '67, will be issued to individuals only, with the simultaneous purchase of Series E Bonds on the Payroll Savings plan or Bond-A-Month plan at your bank. These new notes will have the same tax deferral privilege as the E Bond. Payment of income tax on interest may be deferred to redemption or maturity, and the interest is not subject to state or local income taxes," Chairman Braly pointed out.
