Heart Fund Drive Ends

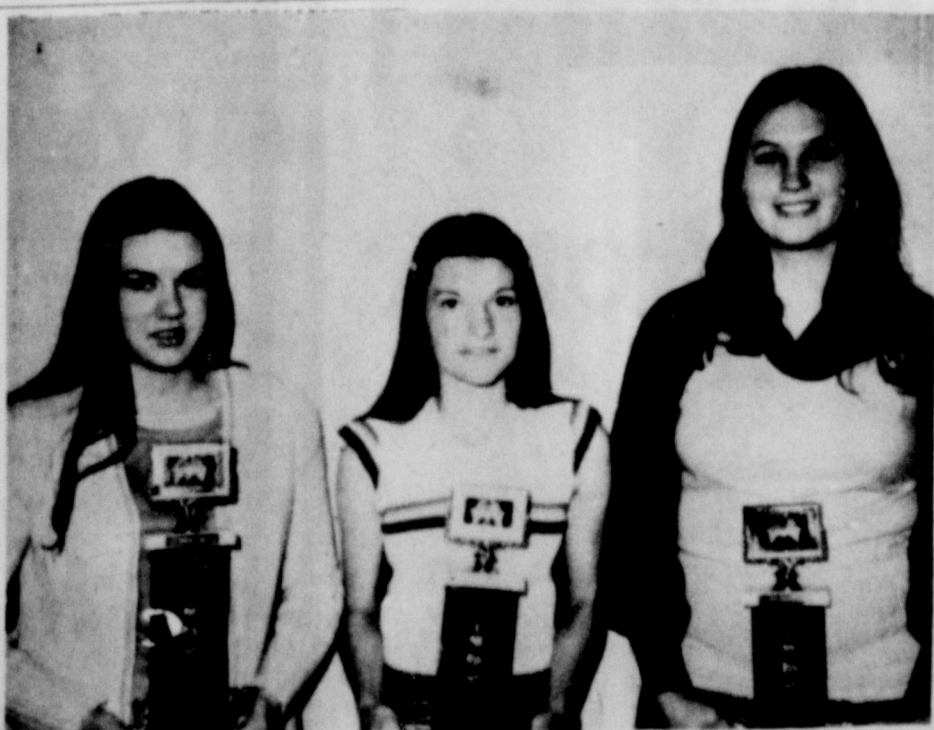
During the month of February, which is American Heart Month, many Knox City residents were generous as they dug into their pockets and contributed to this year's annual drive.

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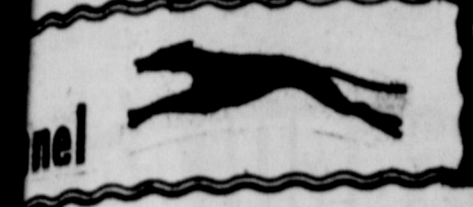

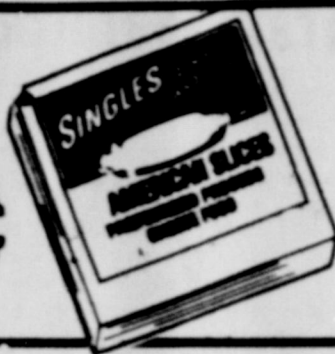
