cotton on Wednesday, October 9. Grades for the week were 75 percent white and 25 percent light spotted. A finer breakdown showed 36 percent Middling, 29 percent Strict Low Middling, 10 percent Low Middling, 21 percent Middling Light potted, and 4 percent Strict ow Middling Light Spotted.

Staple Lengths for the week ran 5 percent 29/32, 24 percent 15/16, 13 percent 31/32, and 58 percent one inch and longer.

Micronaire readings are high with 63 percent in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 33 percent 5.0-5.2 and 4 percent 5.3 and higher.

Pressley reports indicate a good pressley crop with only 24 percent below 85,000 P.S.I. (Pounds per square inch), 35 percent 85,000-89,000: 27 percent 90,000-94,000, and 13 percent 95,000-99,000

CROP QUESTIONNAIRES TO BE SENT OUT

Information supplied by some 35,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will become the basis for the official crop production estimates for each county and the state.

A representative number of farmers and ranchers in Knox County will be among the 35,000 in Texas receiving the questionnaire from State Statistician Cary Palmer of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. The questionnaires will be mailed during the last half of October.

Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers in planning their production and marketing, farm program participation and also for providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The program of estimates for each county is provided by the Texas Legislature, Since Texas covers such a wide area and with great diversification of production, state totals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry. Agriculture, the county agent explained. This is a joint project, between the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Because of the importance of the program, the county agent urges every producer in the county who receives a questionnaire from the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service to fill it out completely for his farm or ranch and return it to the Austin office of the Report-
