It will be used for a six weeks' course, beginning February 25, in the detection and treatment of cardiac arrhythmias. Seventeen nurses have signed up to take this course.

The course is designed to teach nurses how to detect abnormalities in cardiac rate and rhythm that appear on the electrocardiographic monitor in the coronary care






SOME WHO BELIEVED ERROR







Heavy Load For Texas \$15.1 billion is the amou If you owned all 700 State chartered banks in Texas and of Federal taxes that Texans could sell them for the assets will be required to pay as their share of the cost of the value on the books at year-end of 1972, you would get only Federal spending budget d \$304.4 billion proposed by

about \$12.1 billion, nearly \$3 billion short to pay the Federal tax for one year. Even the deposits in the 700 banks total only \$10.8 billion approximately.

If you owned all the agriculture, crops, and livestock production, plus the government checks, it would take all the money you received in the last four and one-half years (1971 to 1968 and part of 1967) to pay the \$15.1 billion Federal tax bill for 1974.

The 1972 total assessed tax valuation for Texas' three biggest counties, Harris, Dallas, and Tarrant, comes to only \$8.8 billion, just 58% of the due amount.

What if you owned all the railroads in Texas? Well, it would take the total net income from all the railroads in Texas, based on 1971 income, for the next 250 years to pay the Federal tax bill for Texas of \$15.1 billion.

Total expenditures for all purposes by the State Highway Department for 55 years (since 1918) have been \$9.9 billion - only 65% of this proposed 1974 Texas Federal tax




