One of the direct results of the annual heart campaign locally is the receipt of a Rocom Arrhythmia Trainer, which was presented to the Knox County Hospital by the American Heart Association. It will be used for a six weeks' course, beginning February 25, in the detection and treatment of cardiac arrhythmias. Seventeen nurses have signed up to take this course.

The course is designed to teach nurses how to detect abnormalities in cardiac rate and rhythm that appear on the electrocardiographic monitor in the coronary care unit.

This is just one of the many programs for continuing education for physicians and nurses, which the heart fund helps to provide.

Films, exhibits, and literature are available for civic, church, and school programs through the American Heart Association.

## KC Girls Beat Wylie To Win Bi-District

In what Coach Sam Nichols described as "Knox City's biggest win" as far as his girls are concerned, the Houndettes defeated 8-A champs Wylie in bi-district play at Hawley Tuesday night, 49-41. Nichols said that this was the first time in at least six years that Wylie's girls have been beaten in bi-district competition. Wylie's record for the past three years is 84-8.

Guards Tamie Grindstaff and Mandy Lankford, both sick according to the coach, played an outstanding game. He said that Jane Arledge held Wylie's leading scorer to eleven points and that she had been averaging as many as 25 per game.

The first period of play ended 15-8, Houndettes' favor. However, in the second quarter, Wylie put 19 points on the board to Knox City's 11 and the halftime score showed a one-point deficit for the

Houndettes.

Knox City sank the first basket in the second half and never looked back, according to Coach Nichols.

Third quarter score was 37-34 and with approximately one minute left, KC led 49-40, Nichols said. Wylie made one more free throw, and the final tally was 49-41.

The exceptional defense kept the score lower than usual, but even so, Denise Grindstaff sank 32 for high point honors.

## Finnell Honored at KC Coffee Sat.

Several Knox Citizens were on hand Saturday morning at 9:00 o'clock for a coffee at Roddy's City Cafe honoring State Representative Charles Finnell of Holliday, who is a Democratic candidate for the 30th District state senate seat being vacated by Sen. Jack Hightower.

Rep. Finnell was accompanied by his older brother, Leslie, also of Holliday. The state representative explained that his wife and Leslie's wife were campaigning on the opposite end of the district Saturday due to its size. The 30th District is geographically larger than the state of West

Virginia and bounded by Henrietta to the northeast, Cross Plains to the southeast, Big Spring to the southwest, and Hale Center to the northwest. Knox County is about the center of the senatorial district.

Finnell told guests that he would be extremely proud to represent this district, one whose economy is a credit to the state, with irrigated farm land, ranches, and minerals.

He explained that he comes from a political family of which he is quite proud. His father has served as County Democratic chairman and his grandfather was a county commissioner at one time.

He said that he felt that more men and women need to offer themselves as candidates and get involved in the business of politics.

Finnell said that he would be in Austin for 30 to 60 more days at the Constitutional Convention and that he would appreciate his constituents "keeping tuned in" on what is taking place there. He urged guests to take advantage of a toll-free long distance telephone service provided by the Convention.

"Simply dial 800-292-9600 and ask any questions you wish. It won't cost you a cent from anywhere in Texas," Finnell said. "These telephones are staffed by Convention personnel who will give you facts instead of opinions and rumors."

The toll-free phone is staffed Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and at night, requests are recorded and answered the next day.

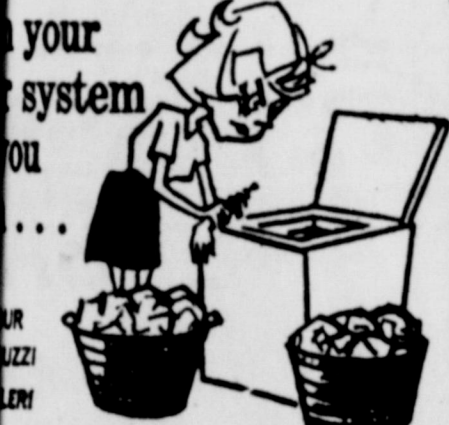

## Applications For State Trooper Being Taken

Major C.W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today the DPS is accepting applications for the post of State Trooper.

Applicants selected as cadets will enter 18 weeks of training at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin in a class tentatively scheduled to begin June 11, 1974.

Bell said general qualifications for DPS Troopers are: Applicants must be 20 through 35 years of age (inclusive); good moral character; excellent physical condition; height not less than 68 inches nor more than 76 inches; weight not less than two pounds nor more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height; visual acuity no worse than 20/40 correctable to 20/20; and a citizen of the United States.

Educational qualifications, which are now a minimum of 45 semester hours of college, will increase to 60 semester hours on September 1, 1974.

He pointed out that qualified female applicants are now being accepted for the uniformed services of the DPS, and that the Department has been increasingly successful in recruiting persons from minority groups.

During the training period, cadets participate in some 850 hours of law enforcement classes on a wide variety of subjects such as criminal and traffic law, human and community relations, and investigative techniques. The schooling includes rigorous physical training, marksmanship, and skills related to pursuit driving.

Some of the classes are taught under an agreement between DPS and St. Edward's University, and Academy graduates receive credit for six semester hours of college work.

After graduation, cadets will be commissioned as Probationary Trooper I at a salary of \$743 monthly and assigned to the Highway Patrol, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service or Driver License Service according to the needs of DPS and consideration of personal preference.

The salary automatically increases to \$768 per month after six months. Upon completion of 12 months commissioned service, Probationary Troopers are promoted to Trooper I at a salary of \$820 monthly. Officers electing to remain in a non-supervisory uniformed position are eligible to compete for promotion to Trooper II after 60 months commissioned service.

All DPS officers receive fringe benefits including hospitalization and life insurance, paid vacations and sick leave, and holidays as for all State employees. Uniforms, vehicles, and equipment are furnished and Troopers receive a uniform cleaning allowance. Expenses are paid when away from home station.

In addition, personnel are members of both the State Employees Retirement System and social security.

Bell said prospective applicants should contact any DPS office or Trooper for application forms. The completed material should then be taken to the nearest Regional, District or Sub-District Department of Public Safety office where the competitive examination is given each Tuesday and Wednesday of the week.

Arrangements will be made for a physical examination. A character investigation will also be conducted and applicants who are selected for the Academy will be notified prior to the start of the recruit school.

### Knox County Is High In Barley Production

AUSTIN—Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced that Knox County ranked in the top ten barley producing counties in the state in 1973.

Barley production increased from 27,000 bushels in 1972 to 73,100 bushels in 1973. This represents an increase of 46,100 bushels.

Farmers in Knox County averaged 34.8 bushels per acre. In 1972 the total yield per acre was 27.0 bushels.

Parmer County led the state in barley production with a total yield of 478,500 bushels.

Commissioner White said that the 1973 barley crop established a record yield of 39.0 per acre.

"Barley is a significant crop, and we are proud that Texas ranks in the top twenty barley producing states," White said.

In 1973 Texas produced 3,510,000 bushels of barley compared with a total production of 1,980,000 bushels in 1972.

## WCTCOG Receives State Planning Grant

Governor Dolph Briscoe announced today the approval of a State of Texas Planning Assistance Grant in the amount of \$38,082 to the West Central Texas Council of Governments (WCTCOG).

The grant program is administered by the Governor's Division of Planning Coordination, James M. Rose, Director. The Governor stated that the funds are provided to WCTCOG to assist in meeting their regional planning and service responsibilities.

The Division of Planning Coordination is that section of the Governor's Office charged with assisting the Governor in carrying out his responsibilities as the State's Chief Planning Officer. In addition to administering the State planning grant program, the Division is actively engaged in coordinating State planning activities and in developing assistance programs for local governments and regional councils of governments.

Funding for the WCTCOG planning grant comes from a

\$1.7 million appropriation of the 63rd Legislature.

WCTCOG is headquartered in Abilene. It is an association of local governments, with membership including 58 cities, 19 special purpose governments, and the counties of Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor, and Throckmorton.

The State grant funds will be used to support such council activities as administration of regional manpower

programs, communities services studies, developmental disabilities planning and a feasibility study of joint services projects. In addition, WCTCOG is actively engaged in providing technical assistance to member governments.

Chairman of the organization for 1974 is B.O. Roberson, County Judge of Haskell County. The executive director is Bobbie T. Gallagher.

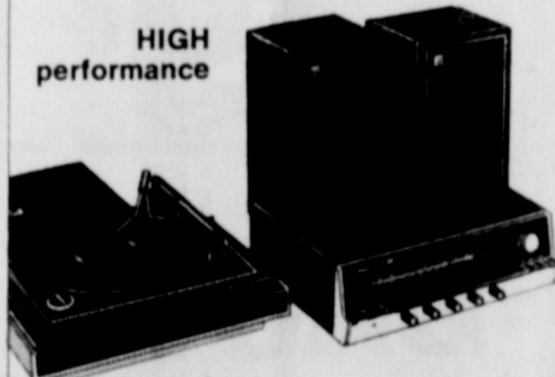

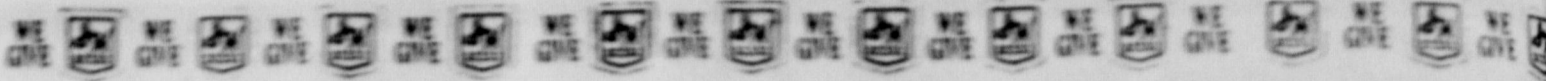

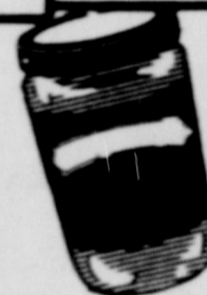
