Honor graduates of the Senior Class of 1974 have been named by school officials.

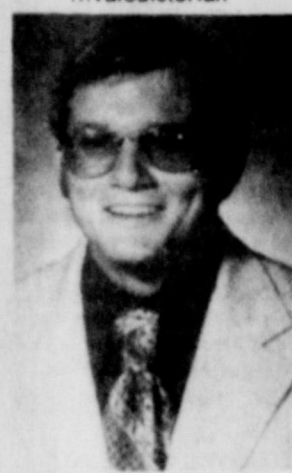
Diane Clonts, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Clonts, is valedictorian with an average of 94.39.

Large Voter Turnout Is Expected Saturday

A good turnout of voters is expected here Saturday, May 4, for the Democratic Primary.

John A. Smith, Knox County tax assessor-collector, reported that 3003 voters had registered to vote.

In a check with County Clerk Zena Waldron Tuesday afternoon an incomplete total of 48 persons had cast absentee votes, and the mail-in was incomplete.

With several contested races this year, there is expected to be a record number of voters turn out.

Of special interest to Knox County voters is the race for county judge. Incumbent Sam E. Clonts of Knox City is opposed by Clyde Boose of Munday. In Precinct 2, incumbent Bobby Roberson is opposed by P.H. Pierce of Knox County Commissioner.

County Democratic Chairman Collins Moorhouse is not running for re-election this year, and M.L. Wiggins of Munday and Sam Leaverton of Benjamin are seeking that post.

Two incumbents are having to run against each other as a

result of a new realignment of Justice of the Peace Precincts. Mrs. Billie J. Suttle of Munday and Jackie Beaty of Goree have both been justices of the peace, but Precinct 3 and 4 were combined and the two have to run against each other for the new Precinct 4.

Another race of interest is the office of State Senator for the 30th District, vacated by Jack Hightower. Charles Finnell of Holliday and Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls are both running for the office.

Incumbent W. S. (Bill) Healy of Paducah is opposed by L. Max Courtney of Southland for State Representative in the 101st District.

Also appearing on the ballot will be the referendum concerning pari-mutuel wagering on horse races.

Abie Watson, Precinct 75 Chairman, asked the News to remind voters to bring their voter registration slips when they come to vote.

Voters in Knox City will vote in two boxes. The residents of Precinct 1, 75 will vote at the Community Center, while the residents in Precinct 2, 7N will cast their votes at the City Hall. All rural voters residing in Precinct 1 will vote in Knox City 75 at the Community Center.

A sample ballot is printed elsewhere in this week's News.

Please remember to vote Saturday. It is not only our privilege, but it is our responsibility to vote for the candidate of our choice.

The polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Highway Patrol Report Accidents
The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of March, 1974, according to Sergeant J.W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor for this area.
These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.
The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1974 shows a total of 12 accidents resulting in no persons killed and four persons injured.
The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1974, shows a total of 395 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 172 persons injured as compared to March, 1973, with 468 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 263 persons injured. This was 73 less accidents, four more killed, and 91 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.



AGRICULTURE IS IMPORTANT PART OF TEXAS ECONOMY

AUSTIN -- "Texas agriculture is on the threshold of a technological and production explosion, brought on by pressures of a world-wide demand for food and fiber," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said last week.

"We completed a record-smashing year in Texas agriculture in 1973, with cash receipts totaling near \$5 billion. For the first time in a generation, our farm and ranch families began to make a decent wage while serving as the main contributors to the highest standard of living in the world," said White.

"These successes have brought with them some problems," the 49-year-old commissioner noted. "The big demand for our products abroad has caused domestic price increases for our own consumers."

"Our big challenge ahead is to increase our production to meet these needs and relieve some of the pressure on our own food prices."

White said a guaranteed supply of fuel and fertilizers for our farmers and ranchers is the key to increased production. "We must take all necessary steps to assure these supplies for our agricultural operations if our state economy is to remain strong," he added.

Commissioner White is seeking re-election to the farm post he first attained at the age of 25. "Despite our industrial advances, Texas is still, first and foremost, an agricultural state, dependent upon a healthy and vital farm economy. My goal is to see Texas become not only first in farm sales, but also seek fair profits for the producers at reasonable prices for consumers."

YOUR LAWN

DAWN OF A NEW LAWN

You needn't be put out about putting in a new lawn, no matter how green you are at it. As long as you follow these suggestions, you can have an exquisite carpet of gorgeous grass comparatively quickly!

First, the groundwork. Loosen the soil, level it and break up the clods. Lime and fertilize with a balanced, slow



release fertilizer. Some lots don't require lime, so have your soil analyzed. Work in the fertilizer.

Next, you need good seed. For best results, select an improved variety of permanent grass. If you're buying a mixture of seed, among the best are those that contain at least 40 percent Merion Bluegrass. Its long roots and broad, dark leaves are growing in popularity all over the country. Be sure you get premium quality seed—bargain priced seed can prove to be no bargain at all!

Use a spreader to sow the seed so the seed drops evenly at the rate you require. Top dress with a light application of mulching material and roll with a light roller for a firmer seedbed, better moisture control, faster germination and an earlier lawn. Water immediately, and, to stay on top of the situation, keep the topsoil moist until the seeds germinate.

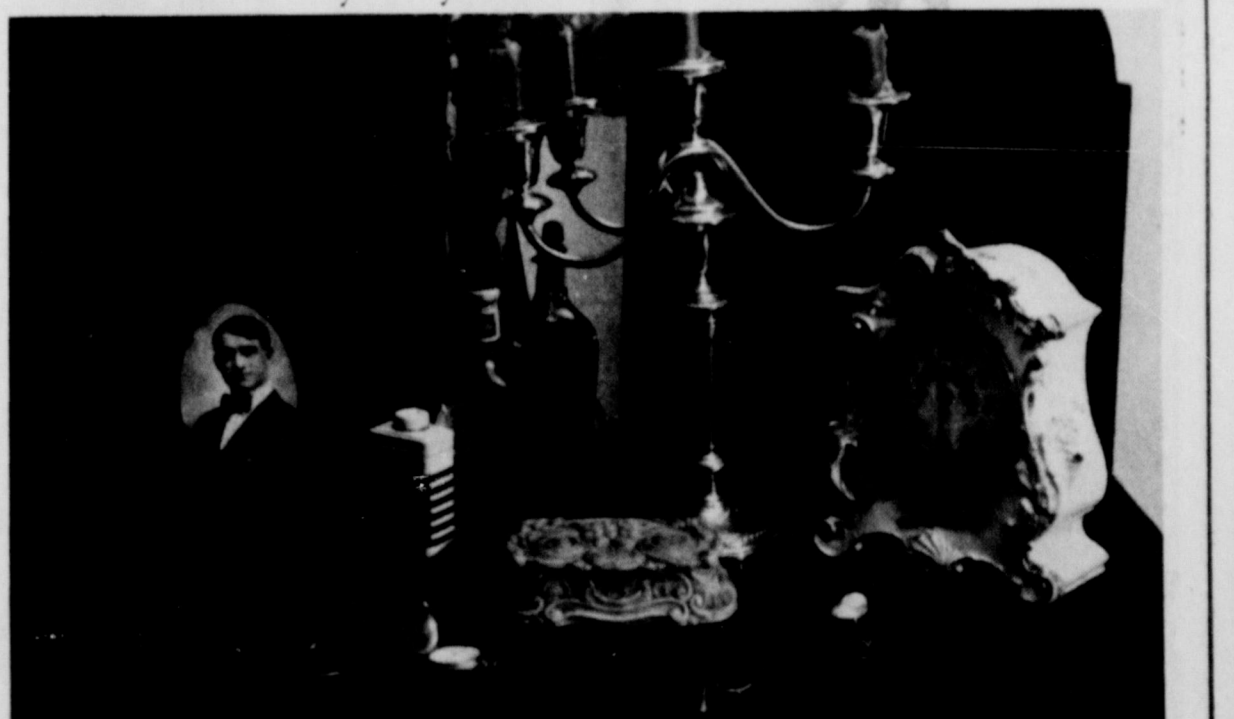

Farm-Ranch News

HORSE VACCINATION TIME

Warmer weather means the appearance of the mosquito and its threat as a disease carrier, especially as far as horse sleeping sickness is concerned.

All horses, asses, and ponies should be vaccinated for the three types of encephalomyelitis (Horse sleeping sickness)—Eastern, Western, and Venezuelan. The Venezuelan strain (VEE) caused the deaths of thousands of horses in Texas and Mexico when it first appeared in 1971.

A combined vaccine is available for the Eastern and Western strains of the disease and annual booster shots should be given after the initial vaccination. A separate vaccine must be administered to protect animals from VEE. The vaccine provides protection for about 18 months. Colts vaccinated last year while under six months of age should be revaccinated. Vaccines are available through veterinarians and should be administered only by them.

The Texas Animal Health Commission requires that all horses moving to shows or out-of-state be vaccinated for VEE.

Symptoms of the three diseases include depression, lack of appetite, and drowsiness. Animals may frequently grind their teeth and stagger when moving. They may also lunge uncontrollably and assume a "sawhorse" stance. Although there have been no horse deaths from VEE the past two years in the U.S., a number of animals were lost last year to the Eastern and Western strains of the disease in some 25 states.

VACCINATE BEEF ANIMALS

Dr. W.H. Stewart DVM, suggests beef cattle producers who have not vaccinated calves and stocker yearlings should consider using the 4-way vaccine soon for the (Cl. Chauvoei) types of diseases such as Black Disease and Blackleg.

Losses have occurred over the area from these diseases. According to Dr. Stewart the losses are not confined to one or two hot spots, but are showing up with one or more head lost on many different ranches or farms.

COTTON IS "KING" AGAIN

After years of oversupply, low demand and low prices, cotton again becomes "king" in 1973, contends an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. And the picture looks bright for 1974. Demand appears strong and the new farm program is encouraging plantings at near capacity. Prices for lint cotton should generally average about 55 cents a pound. Only a fraction of the 1974 crop has been contracted to date so mills will be competing strongly for the crop. The shortage of petrochemicals for synthetic fiber production has also been a "plus" for the cotton industry.

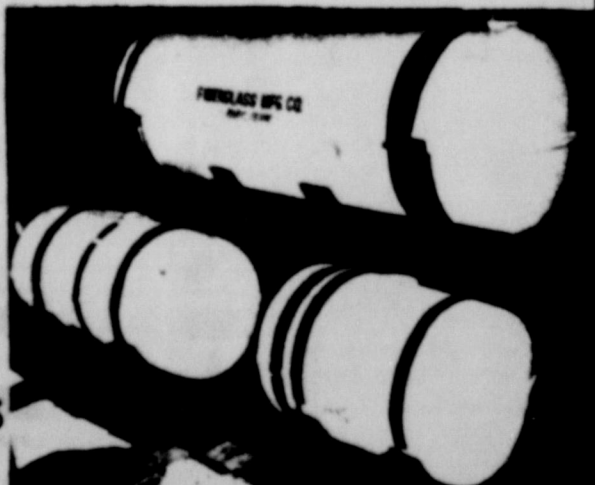

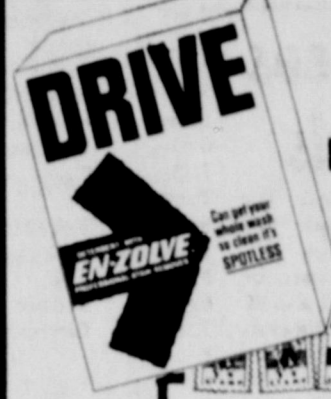

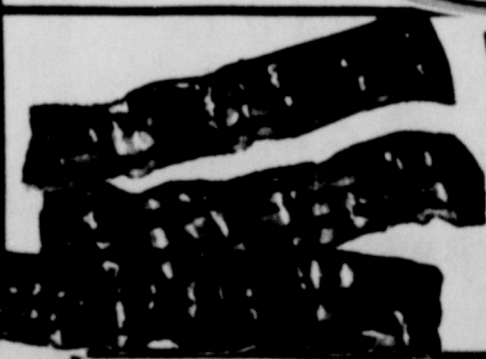
