Hyde, Sec. of Agriculture; Andrew Mellon, Sec. of Treas.; Henry L. Stimson Sec. of State; James J. Davis, Sec. of Labor.

Campsey who lives near Knox City, several hundred pullets and has other deliveries to make to Mr. Campsey soon. It is Mr. Campsey's intention to keep 500 White Leghorn hens for this years egg laying season. Many of our farmers are buying the baby chicks and are preparing to raise a flock of that famous breed of hens which will keep the bank roll better regulated the year round than any other sideline adapted to farm operation.

CO-OPERATIVE GIN ELECTS AND DECLARADS DIVIDEND

The meeting of the Stockholders of the Farmers Cooperative gin was held at the offices of the company this city on last Saturday afternoon. In their business session the following directors were re-elected: A. J. Gore, S. J. Reeves, and P. C. Lowrey. Mr. Gore was again elected president, Mr. Lowrey secretary and J. H. Ingraham manager for the ensuing year.

Directors held over are: J. S. Wilson, J. M. McMahan, W. H. Hodges, E. G. Parkhill, Lee Woodward and R. K. McBrayer.

A \$7.00 per bale dividend was declared this year, breaking all records for such an enterprise as far as the editor has been able to learn. 3,501 bales were turned from the presses of this gin during the ginning season, but not all of the number belonged to stockholders, and only the cotton ginned for the stockholders drew the dividend.

Checks for about \$20,800.00 were disbursed at the meeting and upon vote it was decided to increase the capacity of the gin this year by adding another unit of new structure and much new equipment for the enlarged plant.

The years business and proceeds have been most satisfactory to all interested in this cooperative enterprise and added interest will be gathered on the strength of the savings made to the farmer owners who have so successfully manipulated the facilities for handling their own products.






